RESTORED MALLETT-ROGERS HOUSE TO BE DEDICATED MAY 15

FAYETTEVILLE, NC--Methodist College and the Florence Rogers Charitable
Trust will dedicate the restored Mallett-Rogers House Sunday, May 15 at
5 p.m. The public is invited.

Now located on the southern edge of the campus near O'Hanlon Amphitheatre, the Mallett-Rogers House has undergone a two-year, \$150,000 renovation and will now serve as an art gallery. Paintings will be displayed on the first floor, sculpture on the second.

Dr. William C. Fields, portrait painter and amateur historian, will open the Invitational Exhibition of North Carolina Artists—the inaugural exhibit in the new gallery. A reception and tour will follow from 5:30-7:00 p.m.

Cumberland County's oldest house was donated to the college in 1985 by
the Florence Rogers Charitable Trust. The trust had the structure moved to
the campus in February, 1986, from a site off Stamper Road near Eutaw Village
Shopping Center. The college and the trust have jointly financed the restoration.

Built by James Council in 1735, the house was originally located off Gillespie Street, on property now occupied by the N. C. Dept. of Transportation. In 1778, Council sold the house to cotton manufacturer Charles Peter Mallett. In 1830, Charles Beatty Mallett (Peter's son) moved the house to Eutaw Springs.

The Mallett-Rogers House has two components—a one—and—a-half story structure which will serve as the gallery, and a small two—room cottage which is located to the rear of the main structure. The small cottage, which



was attached to the side of the main structure at the Eutaw site, is now attached by steps and a small stoop to the back porch of the main house. The college news bureau will be housed on the first floor of the cottage, which has been equipped with a small restroom and galley kitchen.

In the new configuration, the Mallett-Rogers House retains all of its original architectural features, including full-width porches, wide pine flooring, and four working fireplaces with hand-carved mantels. Brick walks have been laid in the front and along the south side--areas that are now being professionally landscaped. A wooden ramp will give handicapped persons access to the restroom in the cottage.
