Dr. Paul F. Sharp, Chancellor of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, delivered the commencement ad-





To qualify a student must have met the highest standards of character and academic achievement. Academically the student must have an average of 3.75 at the end of the Junior year; 3.60 at the end of the first semester of the senior year or 3.50 at the end of the Senior year.

Jerry Wood, President, Class of '64, announced the results of the ballot for Alumni officers.


William P. Lowdermilk, Assistant Director of Public Relations, conducted the installation service for the new Alumni officers.
