

Campus Minister Appointed

The Reverend Paul D. Granger has been appointed the first full-time campus minister of Methodist College.

As spiritual life leader of the College, he will be responsible for the Sunday morning worship services in Hensdale Chapel, counseling students, working with Koinonia in broadening campus religious life opportunities, meeting on a regular basis with students who plan to enter church vocations and assisting with church relations and events.

The Reverend Mr. Granger comes to Methodist from a pastorate at Longhurst United Methodist Church, Roxboro. He received his bachelor of arts degree from the University of North Carolina at Wilmington and his master of divinity degree from Duke University Divinity School.

President Richard Pearce stated that he was very pleased that Granger has become the College's campus minister. "Mr. Granger's interest in this field of ministry, his enthusiasm for working with

New members of the board of trustees are: Dr. Lucille W. Hutaff, Fayetteville; James C. Crone, Goldsboro; the Rev. F. Beldon Joyner, Jr., Mebane; the Rev. Samuel D. McMillan, Jr., Henderson; and the Rev. Emerson M. Thompson, Jr., Wilmington.

Six trustees were re-elected for four year terms. They include: R. R. Allen of Fayetteville, chairman of the board of trustees; Norman J. Campbell, Burlington; M. F. Grantham, Rockingham; the Rev. James H. McCallum, Raleigh; Dr. William M. Spence, Elizabeth City; and J. Bernard Stein, Fayetteville.

Dr. Hutaff is a retired staff member of the Bowman Gray Hospital, Winston-Salem, with 29 years of service. She received a B.S. from the University of Wisconsin and the M.D. degree from the University of Rochester. She is a member of the Cumberland County Community Planning Council and is a director of the Southeastern Speech and Hearing Services.

Crone, a certified public accountant, received a B.S. from the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill and a M.S. from Columbia University. He is a member of the North Carolina Association of CPAs, the American Institute of CPAs, the Wayne County Heart and Cancer Association and the United Fund. He is a trustee of St. Paul United Methodist Church and a director of First Union Bank, Goldsboro.

Joyner, pastor of Mebane United Methodist Church, received his B.D. degree from Drew University School of Theology in 1961. He received an A.B. from Duke in 1957. He is former president of the Alamance County Heart Association, vicepresident of the Mebane Kiwanis Club and chaplain of the Mebane Fire Department.

Since 1972, McMillan has been pastor of First Methodist Church in Laurinburg and was appointed pastor of First UMC, Henderson, at the 1977 Annual Conference. He is active in Boy Scouts, the United Way and the PTA. He received his bachelor's and divinity degrees from Duke.

Thompson also received his bachelor's and divinity degrees from Duke. He has been pastor of Grace United Methodist Church in Wilmington since 1975. Thompson is a member of Kiwanis and Rotary International.

Sports Cap Banner Year

Methodist College climaxed a banner year in athletics by sending three teams into national competition. Two spring sports, baseball and women's tennis, followed the basketball team into national tournaments.

The women's tennis team carried a 36-1 overall record into the Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women national playoffs, held in Ada, OK, June 7-12.

Delphine Badzinski, a freshman from Petersburg, VA, captured a national consolation title after being defeated in the quarterfinal round.

Jeanne Edwards, a native of Hamlet, and the doubles team of Rhonda Moon-Jenny Wright reached semifinal action before bowing out.

Miss Edwards triumphed in her quarterfinal match by downing the number two seed. She rallied to win the bout in three sets.

Moon and Wright had only played together in competition on three previous occasions but fared well.

Other Monarchs who lost in quarterfinal battles were: Elaine Lewis, Kay Crawford, and the doubles team of Cinni Finn—Turtle Marshall.


Stanley Named Dean of Men

James R. Stanley, an admissions counselor the past two years, has been promoted to dean of men effective July 1.

After graduating from Dunn High School in 1968, he served a tour of duty with the U.S. Navy. While at Methodist, Stanley was chairman of the Student Union Board, a member of the Bicentennial Committee and the President's Council, a Dean's List student and was elected to Who's Who Among Students in American Colleges and Universities.

Earl Bunn, Methodist's All-American pitcher, was saddled with both the defeats but ended up with a superb 13-6 record. The Parkton resident was also named to the **Greensboro Daily News**' All-State Baseball Team, the first time a Monarch has ever so been honored.

Two Join Staff

Two staff additions have been announced at Methodist College.

Conrad D. Swick has joined the staff as director of veterans' affairs, and William G. Morgan, Jr. becomes comptroller July 1.

Morgan comes to MC from the U.S. Army's control branch, Central Finance and Accounting Office, Europe. He attended Bryant College in Providence, Rhode Island.

Swick, also a U. S. Army veteran, comes to Methodist from nearby Ft. Bragg where he was career counselor supervisor for the John F. Kennedy Center for Military Assistance.

Swick will assist veterans and their dependents informing them of federal and state educational programs and benefits they may be eligible for, aiding them in applying for same, and solving any problems that may develop. He also will coordinate the college's participation in the Degree Completion Program, a program in which military personnel can take a leave of absence from the armed forces and use Veterans' Administration benefits before retiring from active duty, and the Army's Project AHEAD.
