"Go into the world with wonder, because there is still much to wonder about, and there are still people who believe there are truths which are self evident, and that life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness are rights for all to enjoy."

In other special presentations during the exercises, Dr. Ragan was presented an honorary Doctor of Letters degree from Methodist College for his contributions to the profession of journalism and for his unfailing support of the arts in North Carolina.


