FAYETTEVILLE - The Rev. Charles Hubbard posed the question, "Who Am I" at the Monday morning chapel service opening Religious Emphasis Week on the Methodist College campus.

Speaking to the assembled students and faculty, Hubbard, spiritual leader for the week, said that individuals are to blame for the world situation in which they find themselves.

Correcting the frustrated state of the world depends upon man's correctly answering the question, Who am 1?, He said.

"Man refuses to believe anything but the best about himself,"
the Methodist minister pointed out. He blames everything but himself
for the problems of the world.

"Don't build on a lie," Hubbard said.

The spiritual leader pointed to the parable from the Gospel of Mark in which Christ, speaking of unclean foods, explains that there is nothing outside a man that comes into him that defiles him.

Rather it is what comes out of a man that defiles him.

Pressing home the problems man faces today, the speaker, pastor of the First Methodist Church in Wilson, N.C., pointed to the scholarly research being done in many fields to apparently no avail. He said that knowledge in the field of child psychology is greater than ever before, yet the rate of juvenile delinquency is rising; extensive research goes on in the field of alcoholism, yet the ranks of alcoholics grows hourly.

Correctly answering the question Who Am I is based upon faith, Hubbard said. Everyone has a faith, even if it is believing in nothing.

Hubbard will examine the question further tonight at the 7p.m. evening worship in the student union. The service is open to the public.

FAYETTEVILLE - "Who Am I?" will be the theme of the Eithth Annual Religious Emphasis Week at Methodist College, scheduled for February 26-March 3.

Featured speaker for the week's programs, planned by the Student Interfaith Council and the Faculty Religious Life Committee, will be the Rev. Charles Hubbard, First Methodist Church, Wilson, North Carolina. Mr. Hubbard has held several pastorates in North Carolina, among them Trinity in Raleigh and University Church in Chapel Hill.

Mr. Hubbard will suggest possible approaches to the theme question, Who Am I?, during morning chapel services on Monday and Wednesday and pursue the question further at evening services on Tuesday and Thursday. The public may attend the evening services which are scheduled for 7 p.m. in the student union. At Friday morning chapel a student panel will question Mr. Hubbard on matters of concern to them.

Student pianist, Brenda Teal and Susan Rowe, and soloists, Jan Cranford and Sharon Wicker, will provide music at the evening services.

A native of North Carolina, Mr. Hubbard attended the University of North Carolina and Duke University and holds the A.B. and B.D. degrees. Active in the North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church, he was one of the organizers of the Methodist Foundation, Inc., and president of the board of Christian Social Concerns. He is currently serving on World Service and Finance.

GARDEN CLUB JOINS HANDS WITH METHODIST COLLEGE SCIENCE CLUB

Working hands, willing hearts and strong backs are all involved in a beautification project now in progress at Methodist College.

In cooperation with the over-all city HANDS program, under the direction of Mrs. Jackson Lee, the Town and Country Garden Club of Fayetteville has joined hands with the college's Science Club in an effort to beautify the south courtyard of the Science Building.

For several months P. J. Crutchfield of the college's biology department and adviser to the Science Club has worked with the Science Club in developing a plan for the aesthetic as well as scientific use of the courtyard.

The Town and Country Garden Club learned of the need for help with this project and immediately the cooperative effort began. Mrs. V. E. Hollinshed, Jr. is president of the club; Mrs. E. C. Griffin is vice president and Mrs. David Drake is club chairman for the project at the college.

A third bed will show the effects of different kinds of soils on the distribution of plants.

Commenting on the garden club's involvement in the project Mrs. Drake said, "We felt that we should be interested in North Carolina plants and through helping to gather the plants and by participating in the entire project it would be for us an educational venture."

So, another HANDS project for the beautification of the Fayetteville Community moves toward completion.
