Program details have been worked out and explained by college officials. Here's now it will operate:

Any high school graduate who feels that his background already includes some work at the introductory level of undergraduate study, or who feels that he has a special competency in one or more such introductory fields, may for a small fee take one or more CLEP examinations in subjects of his choosing at a CLEP testing center.

If he wishes to enter Methodist College, he simply requests CLEP to forward his test scores to the College Registrar and submits his application for admission. If he has achieved a sufficiently night score on any examination approved by Methodist College, he will be given academic credit fort the course covered, as though he had completed that course by attending college classes. Credits so earned will be counted toward requirements fulfilled for a Methodist College degree.

Since Methodist College specifies completion of 128 semester hours for a degree, average credits normally earned by any student in a single semester would be 16, or one eighth of the total. In the new program, approved recently by the college faculty and Board of Trustees, any student entering college for the first time will be permitted to complete up to 33 semester hours of CLEP subject examinations to apply toward his degree total. This would be the virtual equivalent of one full

year (two semesters) of college work for credit, officials explained.

The new three-year program does not mean simply crowding into three years, by use of summer sessions, what the student would normally complete in four full years of regular college work. Successful scores on approved examinations would mean complete by-passing of equivalent courses in the college program, with the same amount of credit attained.

however, officials pointed out that only the exceptional student will be able to completely by-pass his freshman year via the CLEP route. A larger number of students will be able to pass examinations leading to credits of less than the 33 semester-hour maximum, but such students may either utilize the college's summer sessions or seek approval for taking more than 16 to 17 semester hours of work during the regular college semester in order to bridge the gap and complete a baccalaureate degree program within three academic years.

Since some CLEP examinations are also available at the sophomore level, the exceptional student possibly may complete part of his freshman and part of his sophomore requirements with CLEP examinations. Subject areas in which examinations are now offered include: history, English literature, science, sociology, psychology, education, economics and business and mathematics. Methodist college, in establishing its new plan, will be participating in a national program involving some 1,000 colleges and universities.

#### Earn Your Degree In Three Years At Methodist College

A three-year degree program is now in effect at Methodist College. Area high school graduates with exceptional academic qualifications may speed up the educational priocess and cut the cost of a degree.

Approved for the fall of 1972 and primarily designed for freshmen, the three-year program will run concurrently with the standard four-yeur program. In the new program academic credits will be awarded to students who successfully complete specific subject examinations of the College-Level Examinsa ation Brogram (CLEP) of the College Extrance Examaination Board based in New York. Some 27 specific subjects now are included in CLEP, a program being used by over 1,000 manual colleges. Thus, adequate scores on examps in areas of history, literature, science, sociology, psychology, education, businessmand economics and mathematics enable students to queckly "earn" up to 33 semester hours of college credits in face scalege.

It is recognized, of course, that the number of scphomore-level examinations a student might be able to pass as a college freshman might wall be quite limited. However, the entire program is designed to serve the interests of the abler student, who might wall have exceptional background and qualifications in some subjects and for whom even sophomore-level courses might prove repetitious in terms of knowledge already acquired.

In order for a program of this kind to function, it would be essential that Methodist College be designated at least a "limited CHEP Center", where certain CHEP examinations could be administered to Methodist College students once or twice per year (e.g., during the Christmas holiday period, which now covers virtually three weeks, and during the spring holidays or in the summer vacation period). Entering freshmen, of course, would be expected to have utilized IN ADVANCE the services of any one of the 59 or more regular testing centers operated by the CHEP program in major cities of the U.S.

At the present time it is proposed that Mothodist College utilize only CLEP examination credits in lieu of in-residence academic work for fulfillment of degree requirements in the "Three-Year Program." This would avoid the problem of trying to crowd into three years all of the contact-hours of work normally performed in a four-year program. However, since it is expected that virtually all students capable of succeeding in the "Three-Year Program" would be sufficiently shove-average in their scholastic qualifications extint they might easily be allowed to take academic over-loads in work done in residence at Methodist College, if this would be useful in achievement of 128 semester-hours of credits in a three-year period.

Such a program should prove attractive to the exceptionally able student who desires a more intellectually challenging experience in his college years than traditional programs now afford. It should be attractive economically, in that it could, potentially, out the cost of the college education by one-fourth. It woulds erve the in-

in addition to its present standard four-year program, through awarding of academic credits to students who successfully complete specific subject examinations of the College-Level Fourination Program of the College Entrance Examination

Board, Designed primarily for the entering freshman, the Methodist College program would provide for a maximum of 33 semester-hours of such examination credits, or roughly one-fourth of the total of 128 semester-hours of credits required for the Bachelor's degree. The average freshman will complete approximately 32 to 34 semester hours of academic credits in his first year of college. Thus, for those who achieve sufficiently high scores on examinations covering 33 semester hours of Methodist College credits, it is possible to bypass the freshman year entirely and begin immediately to enroll in sophemore year courses.

In the event that a student should not be able to complete all 33 semester hours of examination credits at his initial enrollment, he would be permitted to take CLEP examinations that are available later (including some at the sophomore level) until he had reached the maximum of 33 semester-hours of credits by such means. It would also be possible for the student to combine credits carned by examination with work completed in the summer sessions in order to qualify for the sward of the degree at the end of three years.

For example, suppose an entering freshman has earned 12 samester-hours of credits via CLEP exams taken at or prior to his entrance upon residence work at Methodist College. At a designated time during his freshman year he might be able to take more CLEP examinations and earn an additional 12 samester hours of credits, either on freshman-level courses not yet taken in residence, or sophomore-level courses covered in the CLEP program. He might then enroll for a summer session at bethodist College and add 9 more semester-hours of credits, which would mean that at the end of his first year at Methodist College he would have gained a total of 33 semester hours of credits in addition to those earned as a resident student engaged in traditional class work. The not effect would be that of reducing the total time of his college involvement by one year.

terests of the more impatient members of the present college generation, who seem amnious to get an education in a hurry. It would avoid the dulling effects of the repetitiousness of college introductory courses if and when such courses overlap or duplicate entirely work taken at the secondary school level. It would permit the abler student to move more rapidly into areas of academic specialization in which he is actively interested and provide a greater degree of motivation. It would to some extent free faculty members from the more "routine" responsibilities of introductory courses and permit them to offer a higher percentage of upper-level courses which are more challenging to instructor and student alike.

Such a program, of course, could be successfully utilized only by the better student and honce would have somewhat limited application to the student population in general. The great majority would still find it necessary to follow the more traditional pathway to the degree, so little, if any, reduction of course offerings or class sections would automatically follow upon inauguration of the "Three-Year Program." It is hoped that the primary benefit to follow upon adoption of such a program will be the attraction of a greater percentage of students with exceptional academic qualifications and abilities.

Highly-qualified high school graduates now may earn a Bachelor's degree in three years at Methodist College.

A new "three-year degree" program begins this fall. It is being made possible through the College-Level Examination Program (CLEP), administered on a nationwide basis by the College Entrance Examination Board. Over 1,000 colleges and universities in the United States are currently participating in the CLEP program.

In the program, students preparing to enter college for the first time may substitute examinations in some 27 special subject areas for freshman-and sophomore-level courses. Examinations are administered monthly at testing centers in more than 59 major cities throughout the U.S. Methodist College has applied for approval as a testing center.

According to college officials, a student in the new three-year program can reduce the overall college-education cost by approximately one fourth and enter graduate school or the job market earlier than the average student. Officials stressed, however, that only an exceptional, above-average student will be able to completely by-pass his freshman year in the CLEP program.
