One other fraternity and one sorority are presently organizing at the Fayetteville campus.

Mr. John Wilson, of Washington, D.C., and National Vice President of Pi Kappa Phi, will represent the governing board of Pi Kappa Phi. Mr. Wilson has recently retired as the Executive Vice President of the American Red Cross. The chartering officer will be Mr. James L. Daley, Jr., of the Chase Manhattan Bank, New York, New York. The chartering activities will be under the direction of Mr. Durward Owen, the Executive Director of Pi Kappa Phi Fraternity, operating from its National Office in Charlotte, North Carolina. Pi Kappa Phi is the only national fraternity having a national headquarters in North Carolina.

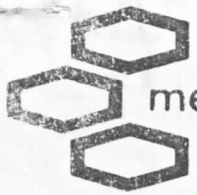

Daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Edward Marlowe of 6614 Winthrop Road, Miss Marlowe recently won second place in the sculpture division of the 8th annual Methodist College Student Art Exhibition. A member of the college's Art Club, she hopes to work toward a master's degree in library science this fall.

Explaining her feelings on art, Miss Marlowe says she "likes precise, fine details." She sees her drawings and paintings as exaggerated but not abstracted. "I'm primarily concerned with realism. My sculpture has as much feeling and strength as I can muster." The artist explained she hopes to develop this trait further.

Her exhibit includes sculpture, pencil, portraits and pastel drawings and oil paintings.

Mrs. Stotts, who recently captured the two top prizes in the 8th annual Methodist College Student Art Exhibition, lives at 1713 Kisco Drive, with her husband, Lt. Larry Gene Stotts.

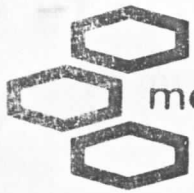

The field was dedicated in honor of the Monarch baseball coach, Bruce Shelley, who modestly said, "I was in the right place at the right time. The field is the result of lots of hard work and determination, and dedication on the part of my boys (the baseball players.) There were days when the players would have rather relaxed than paint bleachers. I gave them an ultimatum...paint the bleachers...or run 10 miles. Of course, they painted the bleachers. This is really their field."

Presenting a plaque to Coach Shelley was SGA President, Bob Peele. Methodist College President, Dr. Richard W. Pearce, praised the coach for the work he's done for the college and the team.

Dean of Students, Gene Clayton, introduced Mrs. Janet Mullen, wife of former Monarch baseball star, Phil Mullen, now a professional baseball player.

Mrs. Mullen read a letter to Coach Shelley from her husband. It read in part... "Coach Shelley taught me and the other players how to live. It's because of him and his dedication that I am able to pursue a professional baseball career. I only regret not being able to be there in person to express how I feel."

Co-captains of the current team, Doug Nicol of Rutherford, N.J. and Barry Willard of Charlottesville, Va., unveiled the sign, which says "Shelley Field, Dedicated April 20, 1974."

MUSICAL TOUR

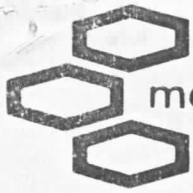
