SET FOR NOV. II AT METHODIST

FAYETTEVILLE--"The Cape Fear River--A Symposium" will take place this Monday evening at 7:30 in the Science Building Auditorium on the campus of Methodist College. The symposium, which is free and open to the public, is being sponsored by the Economics and Business Club.

"This event will offer a unique opportunity to have a detailed look at the Cape Fear River and Valley," said Dr. Sudhakar Gautam, chairman of the Economics Department at Methodist, and moderator of the program. "The audience will be urged to ask questions and raise the issues of concern to all people in the Cape Fear area."

Topics to be discussed include: agriculture, conservation, economic development, industry, transportation, recreation, wildlife and water supply.

The program will begin with a sound and slide presentation entitled "Our River: The Cape Fear."

A panel discussion will follow featuring Earl B. Merril, chief of the planning division--U.S. Army Corps of Engineers; Marshall White, environment resource supervisor for Federal Paper Board Company; Charles Clark, executive director of the Fayetteville Area Chamber of Commerce; and Joe Stowe, Jr., assistant manager of the Fayetteville Public Works Commission.

AFRICAN SYMPOSIUM SET
FOR TUESDAY AT METHODIST

FAYETTEVILLE--Methodist College will host an "International Affairs Symposium on Africa" this coming Tuesday at 8 p.m. in the Science Building Auditorium. Admission is free and the public is invited.

Dr. William C. Brown, vice-chancellor for academic affairs at Fayetteville State University, and Dr. Cornelius N. Bushoven III, assistant professor of politics at St. Andrews Presbyterian College, will be the featured speakers.

Dr. Brown's topic will be "West Africa and Its Higher Education." Dr. Brown spent most of last summer in Africa studying the educational systems of the developing nations.

Dr. Bushoven will moderate a slide presentation entitled "Africa in Transition." Dr. Bushoven, whose doctoral dissertation was on "National Courts and National Law in the Gold Coast and Ghana, 1874-1966," spent 1967-68 and the summer of 1974 in Ghana. In 1967-68, Bushoven was the recipient of a Shell Fellowship for research in Africa. In addition, he took a summer course in 1972 on the people, culture, and politics of Africa and toured southern Africa.

After these two presentations, a panel of Africans will give responses and offer additional insights. Scheduled to take part are: Joe. N. Uduchukwu, a Nigerian economics and business administration major at Methodist; Archibald







URBANIZATION SEMINAR

The first of four seminars on the urbanization of Cumberland County is schedules on Nov. 21 at 8 p.m. in the Science Building Auditorium on the Methodist College campus. The public is invited to the free seminar.

The program will be devoted to the question "Urban Growth: Have We Had Emough?" according to Project Director Dr. Sudhakar Gautam, who also serves as chairman of Methodist's economics and business administration department. The research project is supported by a \$3,170 grant from the North Carolina Committee for Continuing Education in the Humanities.

Panelists and their topics will be: Dr. James C. Wallace of North Carolina State University, "Critical Review of Current Growth policies;" Dr. William M, Alexander of St. Andrews Presbyterian College, "Future Dimensions of Man's Physical and Cultural Environment;" and Mr. Roy Parker, editor of the Fayetteville Times and panel moderator, "An Overview of Urban Growth."

Future seminars which will tackle the problems of economic, population and cultural growth of Cumberland County will take place on Feb. 5 ("Urban Growth: Who is Calling the Shots?"), March 5 ("Urban Growth: Who Wins and Who Loses?"), and April 3 ("Urban Growth: What Does Good Growth Look Like?").

Dr. Sudhakar Gautam

To Address Conference

FAYETTEVILLE--Dr. Sudhakar Gautam, chairman of Methodist College's economics and business administration department, will present a paper entitled "Benign Neglect of Water Supplies in the Developing Countries" to the American Water Resources Association which is meeting Nov. 18 in San Juan, Puerto Rico.

Gautam, who already has had two books published, is putting the finishing touches on his third book which will be entitled "Problems of Water Resources Development in Developing Countries." In addition, he has written articles on water problems for "The Financial Express" and "The Economic Times."

"By 1980, worldwide fresh water demands will increase 240 per cent over present levels of use," said Gautam. "Without proper planning, there will soon be a serious water crisis much worse than the food crisis one hears so much about today. For example, at the recent World Food Conference in Rome, it was estimated that 300-400 million people are hungry. But there are over 500 million suffering from diseases spread by impure water."

Gautam said the food and water crises are tied together very closely. Much of the hunger today is caused by lack of rain and weathermen are forecasting continued drought.

However, poor quality water cannot be blamed entirely on the weather as Gautam shows in his study.

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

"Most of the governmental authorities in the developing countries have a tendency to look at this problem as one of inconvenience to the people rather than seeing its deeper economic implications. Studies, however, made by the World Health Organization have shown a clear relationship between safe and ample water supply and economic growth. Inadequate water supply poses problems of the most elemental level of challenges to the people at the precarious level of survival and in terms of social cost, the loss of man-hours as a result of diseases caused by unsafe water is stupendous.

"Most of the big cities have a long-standing problem of inadequacy in water supply for meeting present population needs, much less for coping with the projected growth of population over the coming years. Thus, the systems are operating far above capacity, resulting in the deterioration of quality of services to all consumers.

Orderly advance planning is rare. A brief review of the governmental policy in some countries brings home the startling fact that most of the projects were undertaken in response to a crisis rather than in anticipation of needs.

"Last, but not lease, most of the water utilities in these countries are poorly organized and elementary principles of public utility management have not been observed. Therefore, better financial planning and strengthened management policies are needed to improve the efficiency of the operation," Gautam concluded.

MC PROFESSORS CERTIFIED

AS ACCREDITATION EXPERTS

FAYETTEVILLE--Three Methodist College professors have been certified as consultants to serve in any junior high or high school in North Carolina working in the pursuit of initial or continuing accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. They are: Dr. Fred C. McDavid, professor of education and psychology; Mr. Robert L. Crisp, assistant professor of education; and Mr. Bruce R. Pulliam, assistant professor of social studies.

Thus far, from the eastern part of the state, only Methodist and UNC-Wilmington have had professors become certified consultants. According to Roy R. Blanton, chairman of the SACS Secondary Committee, "Beginning in the fall of 1975, only those consultants who have been certified will be permitted to work with schools preparing for initial or reaccreditation."

Invitations to become certified consultants are issued to professors on the basis "if.t. of their interest, knowledge, and commitment to quality education for all students and are willing to complete the prescribed course of study," said Blanton.
