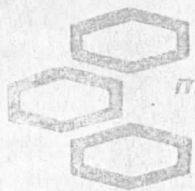
Hall will become chief photographer and Miss Edwards has been named co-editor.

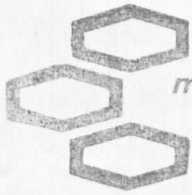

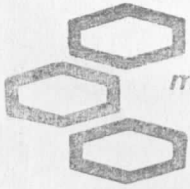

### MC SUMMER ACTIVITY AT FEVER PITCH

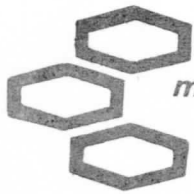
