





BASEBALL HONORS AT METHODIST

FAYETTEVILLE--David E. Roller, catcher for the Methodist College Monarchs, has been named to the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Division

III All-American team.

Roller is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Russell Roller of Laurel Hill, and he is a graduate of Scotland High School in Laurinburg.

He was selected by writers and coaches attending the NCAA Division III baseball playoffs at Marietta, Ohio, based upon his performance for Methodist this past spring. He was named to the second All-American team after leading the Monarchs in runs batted in (32) and batting .385 including four home runs, two triples and seven doubles.

This past spring Roller was also named to the All Conference team of the Dixie Intercollegiate Athletic Conference.

At Methodist College Roller is a political science major and physical education minor. He is married to the former Debbie Casstevens of Winston-Salem.

Athletic Association (NCAA) Division III All-American team.
