



SIX PROFESSORS JOIN IN

METHODIST COLLEGE

Sixen professors have joined the faculty of Methodist College. They are Dr. John R. Kluttz, Dr. V. Dwight House, Regina Daniel and Linda Jackson. Dr. W. S. DeLoach and Eleanor Ninestein join Methodist College as visiting professors.

Dr. Kluttz, who recently retired from the U.S. Air Force, joins the faculty as assistant professor of education and psychology. He holds a bachelor of science (BS) degree from East Carolina University, a master of arts (MA) degree from Northern Michigan University and the doctorate and specialist degree in education from Ball State University. While at the U.S. Air Force Academy, Dr. Kluttz was voted the outstanding instructor in the Department of Psychology.

Dr. House joins the faculty as assistant professor of mathematics, coming to Methodist from Indiana State University and Wayne Community College. He received his bachelor of arts degree from Carlton College and the MA and doctor of philosophy (Ph.D.) degrees from Duke University.



ENROLLMENT UP

AT METHODIST

FAYETTEVILLE--Although final total enrollment figures will not be known until the Evening College of Methodist College concludes registration next Tuesday (Sept. 14, 1976), enrollment in the Day College is up 11 per cent over last year.

This marks the second consecutive year that student enrollment has increased at Methodist College. When the Day College enrollment period ended Tuesday (Sept. 7, 1976), 706 students were registered compared to 635 at the same time last year. Most of the growth came in the resident student population which increased from 252 last year to 327.

Last year's enrollment in the Evening College of 51 has already been surpassed. As of Tuesday (Sept. 7, 1976), 63 had registered with seven days left in which students can register.

Director of Admissions Thomas Yow attributes the growth to three main factors:

The Greatest Gift Scholarship Program of the Methodist College Alumni Association,

the financial support given by the North Carolina General Assembly to in-state

students attending independent colleges and an improved economy.

"I'm most pleased also with the high quality of the new students," noted Yow.

"Academically and socially they're a well prepared group who want the type of
education we provide."

ENROLLMENT UP 15 %

AT METHODIST COLLEGE

FAYETTEVILLE--Final enrollment figures at Methodist College show the student body numbers 15 per cent more this year than last.

G. Gordon Dixon, registrar, said today that the 82 registered for the Term I Evening College brings total college enrollment to 790 compared to 686 at the same time last year.

This is the second consecutive year of enrollment growth at Methodist College.

Last year's enrollment was 10 per cent above that in 1974.

Most of the growth is reflected in the resident student population which increased from 252 last year to 330, and in the Term I Evening College which grew from 51 last year to 82.

In the Day College there are 372 students from Cumberland County with 51 other North Carolina counties also represented. Thirteen different states, the District of Columbia and five foreign countries are also represented.

Pilot Club of Fayetteville has given the volume "Lafayette in America" to the


Davis Memorial Library.

VA REPRESENTATIVE

JOINS METHODIST

FAYETTEVILLE, N.C.--The Veterans Administration has assigned Richard

A. Marsh to Methodist College as its Veterans Education and Training Representative
for the 1976-77 academic year.

Marsh is headquartered at the Office of Veterans Affairs which is located in the Horner Administration Building on campus. He will have office hours from 8 a.m. - noon each Wednesday and Friday. Assisting him will be Veterans Administration work-study student Tom Edwards.

"I will assist veterans with their problems including pay, insurance and any benefits to which they are entitled," said Marsh who is living in Fayetteville.

Last year Methodist had 139 students who attended college with VA benefits.

The final number of students who attend Methodist College with VA benefits this year will not be known until registration is computated for the Term I Evening College which began Monday. Marsh will also be involved in assisting veterans who attend the Evening College.

"A qualified veteran attending college full-time receives \$270 a month if single, \$321 if married, \$366 if one has a spouse and one dependent and an additional \$22 per month for each additional dependent. Educational benefits can be paid for a maximum of 36 months," said Marsh. While in school, if a veteran so desires he can also hold a job without loss of benefits.

In addition MC had 21 bootstrapers last year. These are military personnel presently serving in the armed forces who have qualified to use their VA benefits before they leave active duty. Since they continue to receive their military pay, VA compensation is \$270 a month or tuition and fees—whichever is less.

"Generally, to be eligible for VA benefits one has to have served a minimum of 181 continuous days of active service and have an honorable discharge," Marsh said, adding, "Educational benefits must be used within 10 years of discharge."

Marsh, a native of New Jersey, is formerly the assistant dean of continuing education at Costal Carolina Community College. Prior to that he was a captain in the United States Marine Corps.

He holds a bachelor of arts degree from the University of Colorado and the master of education degree from North Carolina State University. He and his wife Judith have two children: Billy, 7, and Stacey, 4.

GRACE NASH MUSIC WORKSHOP
BEGINS MONDAY AT METHODIST

Some 150 educators are expected to attend the Grace Nash Music Workshop being held at Methodist College next week.

Although most of the participants are teachers in the Fayetteville and Cumberland County School Systems, others are coming from throughout the state and as far away as New Orleans.

Mrs. Nash, an internationally known expert in the Kodaly-Orff technique of music instruction, will teach two sessions each day beginning Monday (September 20). The 1:30 session will be attended by music specialists while the 6:15 session is for elementary education, physical education and special education teachers.

Jean B. Ishee, assistant professor of organ and piano at Methodist College and coordinator of the workshop, said the overall theme of this annual workshop is to show how children learn and especially how children learn music.

"We take children's natural love of language, movement and movement with music and channel these elemental actions, activities and language," said Mrs. Ishee. "What we do, in effect, is take the child's ways of learning rather than imposing adult's ways of learning. The children are involved in their learning, and the instructor does not lecture to a quiet group."


