





AT METHODIST COLLEGE

FAYETTEVILLE--An overflow crowd jammed Methodist College's Hensdale Chapel October 27 for the Dedication Service of the new Schantz pipe organ.

The Reverend William P. Lowdermilk, assistant to the president, led the Litany of Dedication. Dr. T. Garland Knott, chaplain, gave the invocation and benediction.

Jean Ishee, assistant professor of piano and organ, played: "Toccata and Fugue in D Minor" by J. S. Bach; "Herzlich thut mich verlangen" by Johann Kirnberger; "Aria con varazione" by G. Martini; "Allegro pomposo" by Thomas Roseingrava; choral preludes from "Zu Bethlehem geboren" and "Morgenglanz der Ewigkelt" both by Helmut Walcha; and "Prelude and Fugue on BACH" by Franz Liszt.

Also participating in the service was the College Chorus, under the direction of Prof. Alan Porter, singing "Little Organ Mass" by Joseph Haydn.

Soloist was Betty Neill Parsons, soprano. Mrs. Parsons is a 1964 graduate of Methodist College, and is a member of the Hay Street United Methodist Church choir. Instrumentalists in the service included six violinists, a cellist, a double bass and two trumpeters.

The new 706-pipe organ was especially designed for Henadale Chapel and was installed in May.

Prof. Ishee received the bachelor of music degree from Greensboro College and the master of arts degree from the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill.

She has completed additional graduate study at the Juilliard School of Music. New

This past summer Mrs. Ishee toured Europe studying and playing some of the oldest and most famous pipe organs in the world.

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

THREE GENERATIONS COME

TOGETHER AT METHODIST

FAYETTEVILLE, N.C.--Occasionally one hears of a parent and child attending college at the same time. But this year Methodist College has three generations of the same family.

In her 80th year Mrs. Alice Pearce is taking three classes after dropping out of Indiana University 59 years ago. Her son, Dr. Richard W. Pearce, is president of the college. And one of her 12 grandchildren, Ed, is a sophomore on the 700-member campus.

Mrs. Pearce's attendance this semester was a last minute decision, and Ed first encountered his grandmother on campus when she walked into his history class with an armload of books. "All I could think to say was 'What on earth are you doing here,'" he says. She replied, "Well, you can't sit around doing nothing or you'll go crazy."

They are both now into the swing of things, and Mrs. Pearce plans to enroll full-time next semester in order to earn a bachelor of arts degree in English, hopefully within three years.

Ed, who skipped his senior year at E. E. Smith Senior High School, Fayetteville, in order to enroll in 1975 under a special advanced program at Methodist, said he has not had any difficult adjustments to make even though his grandmother is a fellow student and his uncle the president.

"I'm thought of as just another student although some people now call me 'Doc'--no doubt because of my uncle's honorary and advanced degrees."

Mrs. Pearce said she has noticed only a few changes from the 1917-18 school year at Indiana University. "I really can't see that much change because the core (more)

requirements are very similar," she says. "One difference I do note is that now when we discuss ancient history in Western Civilization, I remember the events first-hand," she laughs.

Mrs. Pearce remembers that after graduation from the eighth grade in a one-room school each student was asked if they wanted to attend high school. She did and graduated from LaPorte High School, LaPorte, Indiana. In 1920 she married and dropped out of Indiana University.

"It was just as well," she says, "because I was completely lost on that campus of 1,500 students." Indiana University now has an enrollment of 31,000.

"Another difference is that there seems to be so much more to learn now," she notes. "But the freshman class of 1976 is just as wonderful as the freshman class of 1917."

Ed, who is a mathematics major, physics minor, plans to become a physicist. He is the son of Dr. and Mrs. William Pearce of Fayetteville.

Sitting around doing nothing is something Mrs. Pearce is obviously not fond of doing. She has kept busy in many ways: as a hospital volunteer, a volunteer reading aide in the local schools, an active member of Hay Street United Methodist Church and a cellist for the Fayetteville Symphony Orchestra.

Ed is a member of the cross country team, a Methodist College delegate to the North Carolina Student Legislature, and attends meetings of the Science Club and the Fayetteville Chess Club which meets on campus.

Mrs. Pearce said she enjoys college now more than she thought she would and is happy to be back.

And what does Dr. Pearce think about his mother attending Methodist. He says it's great but laughs, "I want her grade reports send to me."

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
