Pate, president of the Fayetteville Area Chamber of Commerce, who will discuss "The Economic Outlook for Fayetteville;" Hector McGeachy Jr., president of the Fayetteville Downtown Development Association, who will speak on "The Outlook for Downtown;" and Charles Burgess, manager of the Employment Security Commission, who will speak on "The Employment Outlook for Fayetteville."

The panel will be moderated by Dr. Sid Gautam, chairman of the Business Administration and Economics Department of Methodist College. Dr. Richard W. Pearce, president of the College, will introduce Gregory.

He served as a pilot and instructor in the Air Force from 1952 until 1956 and was discharged as a first lieutenant.

When that bank merged into Branch Banking and Trust Company in 1968, he was named a vice-president, elected to the Board of Directors and assigned to the Wilson Office for several months. Gregory served five terms as a member of the North Carolina House of Representatives and during successive sessions was committee chairman of Federal and Interstate Cooperation, Banks and Banking, Highway Safety and Finance. He has served on the Advisory Budget Commission, the Federal and Interstate Cooperation Commission, as a member of the Governor's Commission on Aviation and the Atlantic States Marine and Fisheries Commission and the North Carolina Board of Higher Education.

Council of the association. He is chairman of the Legislative Committee of the

North Carolina Citizens Association and serves on its board of directors. He

is a member of the board of the Medical Foundation of N.C. Inc., the Business

Foundation of N.C. Inc., and of the Roanoke River Basin Association.



FAYETTEVILLE--Due to the success of the fall course offering, the Methodist College Continuing Education division will again offer the PACE examination preparation course in January.

Many positions in the U.S. Civil Service require a satisfactory score on the PACE examination. The course teaches shortcut methods for solving mathematical problems, how to interpret written passages and extract essential information, and how to understand analogies in both grammar and geometric designs.

The cost will again be \$20 for the eight-hour course which will meet from 7:30-9:30 p.m. on Jan. 10, 13, 17 and 20 in the Trustees Classroom Building on campus.

The instructor again will be Colonel Cleatus J. Cox, deputy installation commander, Ft. Bragg, and admission is open to anyone interested.

Registration is now being conducted weekdays from 9-5 in the office of continuing education, Horner Administration Building. Registration can also be accomplished through the mails.

FAYETTEVILLE--One of North Carolina's oldest religious observances was celebrated at Hensdale Chapel on the Methodist College campus Dec. 12.

A Christmas Moravian love feast was sponsored by Koinonia, the student religious fellowship at Methodist College.

"The Christmas eve love feast is one of the biggest events of the year in the Winston-Salem area," says Rick Wilson, a Moravian student at Methodist College who coordinated the event. "At my home church Winston-Salem's Trinity Moravian Church with a seating capacity of over 500/we usually have to have two feasts to accommodate all the visitors.

"North Carolina Moravians are centered around the Winston-Salem area, and people come from all over the South to partake of the love feast," says Wilson.

Although the history of the Moravian love feast goes back to 1727,

it was first celebrated in North Carolina in 1762 at Bethabara, near Winston-Salem,

soon after the Moravian settlement there was founded as one of the first

communities in North Carolina.

"Although the food and drink are not consecrated, it is considered a religious service for the purpose of friendship and fellowship," says Wilson.

The drink is usually coffee with a slightly sweetened bun baked according to an old Moravian receipt.

He said, "They were always employed, always cheerful themselves and in good humor with one another." After visiting in Herrnhut, Wesley added, "I would gladly have spent my life here..."



NEW ATHLETIC FIELDS

BEING BUILT AT MC

FAYETTEVILLE—Methodist College is in the midst of some major construction work which is designed to improve the present physical education, intramural and intercollegiate athletic facilities on campus.


Three projects currently underway are the construction of an asphalt track around an enlarged soccer field, the leveling of two new intramural fields, and the construction of new concrete basketball-volleyball courts.


The soccer field is being enlarged by 75 yeards and a quarter-mile track is being built around it, making possible home track meets and a more extensive track program. A track team was formed two years ago, and is now coached by Joe Miller.

The two intramural fields being built southeast of the tennis courts behind the Student Union will provide a place for intramural sports such as flag football and softball. These fields will be seeded with grass.

The outdoor basketball-volleyball courts will be located northeast of the Student Union in the area known in the past as the "bonfire area." The concrete surface,  $150 \times 75$  yards, will provide an area for playing intramural basketball and volleyball as well as other recreational activities such as roller skating.

Athletic Director Gene Clayton is "extremely excited" with the improvements. He sees convenience as the main advantage to these projects. "Bringing all the facilities closer together also brings them to the main campus, to the spectator, and to shower and dressing facilities and equipment," he says.








WEEKEND COLLEGE

After leaving Penn. State, Mitchell worked 12 years in research and development and then was promoted to area supervisor of the chemical division production department.


