Attendance is limited to 30, and reservations must be made with Methodist College professor Sid Gautam by Friday (April \$, 1977).



EARNS NATIONAL RANKING


FAYETTEVILLE--sMALL TALK, the biweekly student newspaper of Methodist College, has received a Second Class Honor Rating in national competition.

Issues produced during the fall semester were judged on: coverage and content; writing and editing; editorial leadership and opinion features; physical appearance and visual communication; and photography, art and use of graphics. Over 2,100 publications were judged by the Associated Collegiate Press at the University of Minnesota, School of Journalism.

sMALL TALK received a total of 3,525 points of a possible 4,500. Judges, who were professional journalists, said the newspaper is a "very good publication which has been doing its job in a workmanlike manner."


Miss Poole is a music major, and she plans to pursue graduate work in piano performance after graduating from Methodist College.
