AT METHODIST CONVOCATION


FAYETTEVILLE--McNeill Smith, candidate for the United States Senate, will address the Methodist College student body, Wednesday at 10:30 a.m.

Lura Tally, Cumberland County legislator, will introduce N.C. Senator Smith during the convocation in Reeves Auditorium.

The Guilford County legislator had distinguished himself in N.C. politics during his tenure in the N.C. State Legislature, Smith was responsible for the establishment of statewide public kindergartens, the repeal of the N.C. Speaker Ban Law, the restructuring of the N.C. public university system, and the time-of-day pricing of electricity.

Prior to his legislative career, Smith was Chairman of the N.C. Advisory Committee to the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights. The North Carolina report received the distinction of being the only state report to be published.

Senator Smith is speaking on the Methodist campus at the invitation of the Student Life Committee. All political candidates are being invited to speak to the Methodist student body.



SEASON AGAINST CAMPBELL

FAYETTEVILLE--Methodist College Monarchs open their 1977 season in soccer against the Camels from Campbell College Wednesday night in Buies Creek. Kick off is 7:30.

The Monarchs boast 13 returning players to the team and a host of new talent. Campbell, currently 1-2 for the season, is relying heavily on John Yu and Greg Gunsalles to pull the team together, according to coach Wayne Cunningham.

Methodist Coach Mason Sykes goes into this one with questions still to be answered as his team is as yet untested. "I don't know what to expect from this year's team," states Sykes. "It's better than teams of the past and has remarkable depth, but we'll have to out-hussle Campbell to win this one."

Monarchs see further action next week as they travel to Pembroke on Tuesday and Baptist College of Charleston (S.C.) on Friday.

Key players for the Methodist team are expected to be captain Bruce Fritz of Tacoma, Washington; junior Marty Martin, also of Tacoma, Washington; and Gary Hall, junior of Winston-Salem, N.C.




FAYETTEVILLE--Earl D. Martin, associate professor of Socialogy at Methodist College, has received a doctor of philosophy degree from Walden University, Naples, Florida.

Dr. Martin was awarded this degree after completion of his dissertation entitled "Kin Group Substitute Utilizing By Isolated Nuclear Families Having Teen Aged Members".

The study was conducted in Fayetteville of 23 families interviewing each member of the family. It began in October of 1976 and lasted to February of 1977 in which he interviewed families nominated by their ministers.

The results of the study proved the original theory of Talcott Parsons to be true in that a family will substitute close friends in the place of deseased family members.

Martin has been a member of the Methodist College staff for the past eight years, teaching sociology, anthropology and criminology.



METHODIST SELECTED AS TEST CENTER

FAYETTEVILLE-Methodist College has been selected to serve as an area test center for the ACT Proficiency Examination Program (ACT-PEP), an examination-for-credit service being made available nationwide by The American College Testing Program(ACT).

The ACT-PEP Program features 47 college-level proficiency tests based on course requirements and covering a broad range of subject areas, including arts and sciences, business, criminal justice, education, health, and nursing.

The tests are designed for use by individuals interested in obtaining course credit at a college or university on the basis of test scores representing an appropriate level of knowledge in a specific subject area.

The ACT-PEP tests are offered on four national weekday test dates each year at area test centers located in educational institutions and agencies throughout the nation. The test center at Methodist College is supervised by Mr. Gordon L. Joyner, Dean of Students. The center here is established to serve individuals in the surrounding area.

The test center at Methodist College has descriptive materials about the tests and detailed information about the procedures to follow in registering to take one or more of the examinations.



RECEIVES DOCTORATE


FAYETTEVILLE--Earl D. Martin, associate professor of sociology at Methodist College, has received a doctor of philosophy degree from Walden University in Naples, Florida.

Dr. Martin, a native of Lynchburg, Virginia, was awarded **
this degree after completion of his dissertation entitled "Kin Group
Substitutes Utilized by Isolated Nuclear Families Having Teenaged Members."

The study was conducted in the Fayetteville area and involved 23 families, interviewing each member of the family and composing an overview of the family units. The study began in October of 1976 and was concluded in February of 1977. Dr. Martin selected the families to participate from names provided by the ministers of local churches.

Dr. Martin concluded, based on his research, that the original theory of Talcott Parsons, a noted sociologist, was true in this region. Families will choose substitutes for aumts, uncles, and grandparents who either live large distances away or are dead from friends, teachers, and church personnel.

Courses taught by Martin, who has been a member of the Methodist College faculty for eight years, include areas of sociology, anthropology, and criminology.

FAYETTEVILLE--"M.C. is the place to be!" That's what the T-shirts say and that's what more and more students say.

Methodist College has continued to increase enrollment for the thirdconsecutive year by registering 737 students for the 1977-78 academic
year, according to Dr. Richard Pearce, president of the Fayetteville institution.

Fall enrollment figures have been declared official as of September 15, last day for dropping or adding a course. These figures indicate a continual rise toward the 1000 mark predicted by Pearce for 1980.

"We feel we can grow to 900 or 1000 students in the next few years—say 1980," explained Pearce, "and that's all we ought to be, anyway—1200 at the most."

The college reached 1069 in 1967 before experiencing the six years of financial woes that plagued the majority of small colleges. The upsurge in enrollment was triggered in 1975 when Pearce came to Methodist from Florida Southern University.

Current enrollment breakdown shows 369 males and 368 females as





Methodist, which won the title by nine points over High Point last fall, finds itself paired with East Carolina in many flights.

"If we're going to win this tournament, it looks like we'll have to beat East Carolina first and worry about everyone else later," Clayton said.

The two best players in the tournament, in Clayton's opinion, will be East Carolina's Debbie Spinazzola, a freshman ranked number three among Pennsylvania's 18's and who was an high school All-American last year, and Vicki Williams of High Point, the number seven player in Virginia.

Singles action is set to begin at 10 a.m. Friday, the doubles getting underway that afternoon. Semifinals in both events will take place Saturday morning and the finals are set to be held Saturday afternoon.

"I have good feelings about this tournament," Clayton said. "I expect it to be a very close, very tight tourney."

"Some of the good players and teams could get beat in the early going and that would spread the points around. I predict the winner will be the victor by two or three points. It will be that tough."

Methodist, which won the title by nine points over High Point last fall, finds itself paired with East Carolina in many flights.

"If we're going to win this tournament, it looks like we'll have to beat East Carolina first and worry about everyone else later," Clayton said.

The two best players in the tournament, in Clayton's opinion, will be East Carolina's Debbie Spinazzola, a freshman ranked number three among Pennsylvania's 18's and who was an high school All-American last year, and Vicki Williams of High Point, the number seven player in Virginia.


