METHODIST SETS REGISTRATION FOR SPRING SEMESTER

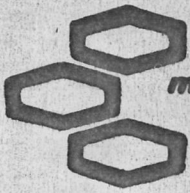
FAYETTEVILLE--Registration for spring semester at Methodist College will take place on Wednesday, January 11 in the Student Union Building from 8:00 until 4:00.

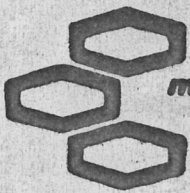

FAYETTEVILLE--Methodist College Drama Department will present "Hedda Gabler" by Henrik Ibsen on February 23 and 24 in Reeves Auditorium at 8:15 p.m. In connection with the presentation, a symposium with various community leaders and members of NOW will be held immediately following "Hedda Gabler" in the lobby of Reeves.

Norwegian playwright Henrik Ibsen observed, "There are two kinds of moral laws, two kinds of conscience, one for men and one, quite different, for women. They don't understand each other; but in practical life, woman is judged by masculine law, as though she weren't a woman but a man. . . ."

In explanation for his radical stand on the liberation of women, Ibsen continued "A woman cannot be herself in modern society. It is an exclusively male society, with laws made by men and with prosecutors and judges who assess female conduct from a masculine standpoint."

Modern writers find it interesting that Ibsen wrote these words one hundred years ago as he embarked upon the writing of three plays which dramatize the frustration of being a woman in his society.

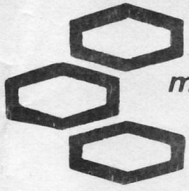

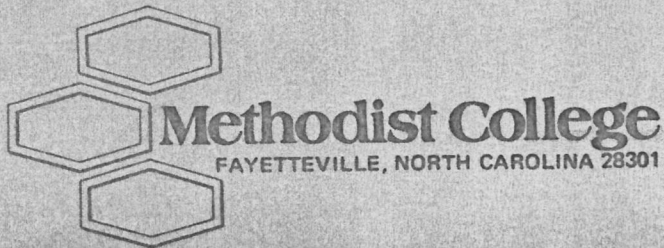

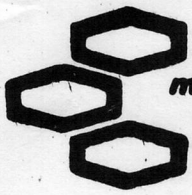

Taking the grueling 8-hour exam is the first step toward a ^{an academic} presidential scholarship, ^{and/or} or instant college credit at Methodist College. The exams are given twice a year--this year on January 21 and February 11.
