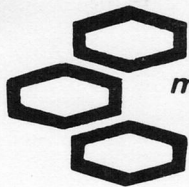

The Methodist College Chorus will present its annual Spring Concert on Wednesday evening, April 12, in Reeves Auditorium at 8:00.

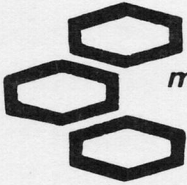
