WEEKEND TENNIS WORKSHOP


TO BE HELD AT METHODIST

FAYETTEVILLE -- Methodist College will sponsor a Weekend Tennis Workshop course in "Methods of Teaching and Coaching Tennis for Youth" beginning Friday, June 16 at 4:00 and ending Sunday evening, June 18 at 7:00. The course is offered by the Division of Continuing Education at Methodist College in conjunction with the college's Department of Physical Education.

Gene Clayton, athletic director at Methodist
College and registered tennis professional, will instruct
the 20-hour course. Clayton is a member of the USTPA,
the Professional Tennis Registry and the International
Professional Tennis Teaching Association. In the course
of his 15-year tennis teaching experience, Clayton coached
the Methodist women's tennis team to a national fifth-place
ranking with a record of 50 wins and 5 losses.

"This workshop is designed for teachers-elementary junior high and senior high physical education teachers-as well as tennis coaches coaches in recreational fields," states Clayton.







PASSES \$120,000 CAMPAIGN GOAL

FAYETTEVILLE--After an announcement that the Methodist College Foundation was \$176 short of their \$120,000 goal, Foundation members contributed enough to send the Loyalty Fund campaign over the top at the annual meeting of the Methodist College Foundation on Tuesday, June 13.

The campaign received another substantial boost with the \$7500 additional contribution of the Allen Foundation, bringing the total to \$127,500.

Dr. Charles Speegle, campaign coordinator, and Joseph Vogel, Foundation president, were credited with the implementation of the Developmental Team concept that took the campaign beyond the goal.

"I wish all Fayetteville could be here," stated Dr. Richard Pearce, president of Methodist College, "but as representatives of the Fayetteville community I thank all of you for the tremendous support this year."

Speaking at the luncheon meeting held at Highland Country Club, Pearce stated, "This has been the best of my five years here, but the best is yet to come."

He cited an anticipated enrollment of 775-800 for the coming academic year, an additional 300 in the evening division, a faculty composed of 52% doctorates, comprehensive testing for sophomores and a vastly improved guidance program as tangible evidences of college growth.







The scholarship will provide \$200 per year for a student attending Methodist College.



METHODIST ROTC INITIATES
NATION'S FIRST SCUBA TEAM

The Army ROTC program at Methodist College has received certification as the first organized SCUBA (Self-Contained Underwater Breathing Apparatus) team of ROTC cadets in the nation.

Three months of training Special Forces style ended in a qualifying week for the National Association of Underwater Instructors (NAUI) Certificate. The training consisted of class-room instruction, physical conditioning, scout swimming and SCUBA dives at nearby Lake Teresa.

Cadets traveled daily to Tucker Field House at Fort
Bragg for extensive swimming manuvers and conditioning exercises.
Instruction on safety, marine life and ocean conditions was provided at Wrightsville Beach from the Coast Guard unit stationed there.
The team conducted an ocean swim and received water skiing instruction also.

After a four-day diving exercise at Lake Teresa, team members received a certificate and SCUBA trophy from Brigadier General W. D. Barnes, Commander of the First ROTC Region.

Registration for these courses are currently being accepted at Horner Administration Building on the Methodist College campus and at Building MT-3110 on the Fort Bragg campus.


