METHODIST COLLEGE SCHEDULES ADMINISTRATION OF NEWLY REVISED CLEP GENERAL EXAMS

Methodist College announced today that the first administration of the newly revised General Examinations of the College-Level Examination Program (CLEP) will be given Oct. 16-21 at Methodist College.

CLEP General Exams -- in English composition, mathematics, humanities, social sciences and history and natural sciences -- evaluate knowledge of liberal arts subjects acquired outside the classroom for college credit and placement purposes.

These tests, recognized by more than 1,800 colleges and universities throughout the country, recently were revised to strengthen the validity of their content and to offer more options to colleges interested in evaluating a student's writing ability. This was done by lengthening all five tests from 60 to 90 minutes and by adding an essay section as an alternative on the English composition exam.

One version of the new English composition test will include a 45-minute essay section and a 45-minute multiple choice section. It will be offered in October and again in June. The other version is a 90-minute multiple choice exam which will be offered at all of the administration's during the year.

The revisions are the results of two years of study, including a national survey of college policies on awarding credit by examination.

CLEP General Exams -- in English composition, mathematics, humanities, social sciences and history and natural sciences -- evaluate knowledge of liberal arts subjects acquired outside the classroom for college credit and placement purposes.

These tests, recognized by more than 1,800 colleges and universities throughout the country, recently were revised to strengthen the validity of their content and to offer more options to colleges interested in evaluating a student's writing ability. The revisions are the results of two years of study, including a national survey of college policies on awarding credit by examination.

The CLEP program, sponsored by the College Board, is designed to permit both traditional and nontraditional students to demonstrate college-level competency, no matter where or how their knowledge was acquired -- on-the-job, through informal study, private reading, noncredit courses, or military training.

A Course in preparing for the U. S. Civil Service Examination (PACE) will be given at Methodist College October 10, 12, 17, and 19, 1978, from 7:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. in the Classroom Building.

The course will teach shortcut methods for solving mathematical problems; interpreting written passages and extracting essential information; understanding analogies in both grammatical and geometric designs. Col. Cleatus Cox will be the instructor and the cost will be \$20.00 for the four classes.

Registrations will be taken until October 10, 1978 in the Continuing Education Division Office at Methodist College. Those persons wishing to take the exam may register with the Civil Service Office between September 18 and October 12, 1978. The exam is slated to be given November 4 through December 9, 1978.

FAYETTEVILLE--Hypnotist Larry Garrett will perform at Methodist College on Thursday evening, Oct. 12, at 9:00 in the Student Union Ballroom.

Performing as part of the week-long Homecoming activities at Methodist, Garrett will produce an audience-participation show demonstrating the "super-heightened relaxed state" called hypnosis.

"Our schedule is not as strong as last year's" said Miller. "But it is strong nevertheless." The 24-game schedule includes games with Division I members Virginia Commonwealth and Campbell along with Wingate, Elon, Longwood and Hampton-Sidney, new teams on the Methodist slate.

"The league will be very strong this year," said Miller of the Dixie Intercollegiate Athletic Association. "Virginia Wesleyan is the favorite because of their play in the conference tournament last year. Averett and Greensboro College didn't lose any starters off of last year's team and Christopher-Newport lost only one. UNC-Greensboro, North Carolina Wesleyan and St. Andrews should be improved over last year," finalized the Methodist coach.

Lloyd Nick is currently preparing for his 8th One-Man exhibition which will take place at the Nicholas Roerich Museum in New York City on October 15 through November 12. Nick will display his particular specialty, landscapes, which he paints in oils. Nick admits a preference for mountainous scenery because of its majesty and points to the beautiful mountains in North Carolina as part of the states appeal to him.

About half the works to be exhibited were painted in North Carolina and give different views of the scenery. The rest of the works will be landscapes of areas in Bulgaria and Yugoslavia where Nick has spent a goodly amount of time.
