Methodist College is a four-year residential college of liberal arts and sciences located on a 600-acre campus overlooking the Cape Fear River Valley.





Like an independent young woman establishing herself in a new community.

Indeed, Barbara seems the clicke of a liberated woman, fitting all the categories we see depicted in "relevant" feminism. Yet in the midst of 20th century lifestyle Barbara Bryan is anything but clicke. Her unique perspective and commitment to family set her apart from other divorced women who face similar situations.

"My general attitude is that if I get carried out feet first tomorrow, someone will unearth my poetry; but my most lasting monument will be three beloved, bright and beautiful boys," states Barbara.

"Being a single parent has influenced my writing career by making it, of necessity, nearly non-existent. Some years back I learned that when I had major assignments, the children's already unpredictable needs became sources of major irritation. They didn't need memories of witch/mom. It eventually occurred to me, slow learner that I am, that I was irritated at myself for overloading the already too-full circuits.



"There is no way I can describe single parenting with three sons" two in the first grade and 'big brother' in second—at age 40. Even with a devoted father and weekday household help, years ago, it was still overwhelming. As it is, I often begin work before 6 a.m. and end close to midnight. Often that may be seven days a week and, folks, that's life. If I were totally dependent upon my earnings from writing (with the leftover energy I have for 'production'), life would

be leaner than it needs to be now," says Barbara with a smile that denies any bitterness or self-pity.

Free-lance writing carries with it images of rustic alcoves and bigtime bylines. The realities of the profession are quite different, according to Barbara.

"Writing pays well for some people who write appealing pieces and have access to those who purchase them. Notice I did not stress 'talented' people because, unfortunately, that is often immaterial. A writer with a love of money and disregard for scruples can make a bagful grinding 'porn' pulp. There can be sufficient pay in public relations and advertising to at least support one person while working overtime on more serious literature.

"Nobody in his or her right mind, for instance, would drop everything (or anything for that matter) to delve into a life of poetry writing--although that's my first love," projects Barbara.



"I am extremely happy that Kenneth is planning to attend Methodist College. I am looking forward to having him on campus and in our basketball program."







VIRGINIA R. WILLIAMS:

GENEROSITY and GENTLENESS

FAYETTEVILLE- Generous gifts and contributions are not ununcommon on college campuses. Trustees, alumni, community leaders and faculty members frequently make substantial gifts to their colleges. Methodist College is no exception.

Yet, the Methodist College community was taken by surprise when a gift of over \$55,000 from the estate of Virginia R. Williams was announced. Although Mrs. Williams was widely known in the Godwin community and at Black's Chapel Church, she had never been associated with Methodist College directly.

Who was Virginia R. Williams and why did she name Methodist College as recipient of the bulk of her estate? The answers to these questions were found in her diaries, her souvenir books and in the memories of those who loved her.

Virginia R. Williams was born March 1, 1891, the daughter of William Edgar Rhodes and Melissa Tillman Rhodes. According to old envelopes dated 1922, Virginia attended N.C.S.College in Raleigh. In 1923 she married William C. Williams on Christmas day. And in 1926 Virginia and William returned to the old home place in Godwin, N.C. where she lived until October, 1973. At that time she entered the Golden Years Rest Home, Falcon, N.C. where she died Jan. 21, 1977 at the age of 85.

Virginia and William had no children but the closeness of the Williams' and Rhodes' family provided Virginia and Will with nieces and nephews to love. According to these nieces and ers and faculty members frequently make substantial gifts to their colleges. Methodist College is no exception.

Yet, the Methodist College community was taken by surprise when a gift of over \$55,000 from the estate of Virginia R. Williams was announced. Although Mrs. Williams was widely known in the Godwin community and at Black's Chapel Church, she had never been associated with Methodist College directly.

Who was Virginia R. Williams and why did she name Methodist College as recipient of the bulk of her estate? The answers to these questions were found in her diaries, her souvenir books and in the memories of those who loved her.

Virginia R. Williams was born March 1, 1891, the daughter of William Edgar Rhodes and Melissa Tillman Rhodes. According to old envelopes dated 1922, Virginia attended N.C.S.College in Raleigh. In 1923 she married William C. Williams on Christmas day. And in 1926 Virginia and William returned to the old home place in Godwin, N.C. where she lived until October, 1973. At that time she entered the Golden Years Rest Home, Falcon, N.C. where she died Jan. 21, 1977 at the age of 85.

Virginia and William had no children but the closeness of the Williams' and Rhodes' family provided Virginia and Will with nieces and nephews to love. According to these nieces and nephews, Virginia was known for her keen intelligence and strong character. She taught school for a number of years, substituting at Godwin, South River, and Wade schools.

An insight to Virginia's personality is seen in her refusal to join the United Daughters of the Confederacy although her grand-father had served as a captain in the first N.C. Infantry in the Confederate Army.

"This sort of organization was not of any interest to her,"

states LeeGrey Rhodes, her niece.

"Her main interests were religion and education, not fortune or fame. It isn't that she was not proud of her heritage but rather that she chose not to make a show of it."

"Virginia Williams was a pillar in the Black's Chapel United Methodist Church at Godwin. Her great grandfather donated the land on which the chapel is built and was instrumental in its early organization. Black's Chapel was one of the first Methodist Church founded in Cumberland County (1876) and still stands today with its original grace and beauty.

The wit the wisdom and the depth of Virginia Williams is found in the diaries she kept. An inscription found on the first page from the diary of 1977 states in her handwriting: "This is more of a scrapbook or diary kept (or half-way kept) by Virginia R. Williams." There is nothing in the memorabilia of Virginia Williams that speaks of a specific interest in Methodist College, but throughout her life the guiding forces remained religion and education. One can only assume that she saw a successful merging of these two on the Methodist College campus. How like her to

The Methodist College community now knows the woman behind the gift—a gift that will provide scholarships for deserving students who share Ms. Williams interest is education and religion. Ms. Williams in her quietly efficient way has insured that her church and its college will continue to flourish.
