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

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



Pfeiffer, current Carolina Conference champions, will face Florida Institute of Technology in the kick off game Wednesday at 2 o'clock. Coach Darryl Saunders' Pfeiffer team boasts the best 1979 record coming into the pre-season tourney with 11-5-0. Key victories were over Miami, Guilford and Belmont Abbey.

Host Methodist College meets regional rival Pembroke State
University in the second game on Wednesday, at 4 o'clock. The
Pembroke Braves have a new coach in Mike Schaffer; formerly of Providence Day School in Charlotte, N.C., where he posted a 42-13-3 record.

The Monarchs of Methodist College are out to avenge a heartbreak second-place finish in the Dixie Conference last season with a 4-1-2 conference record (6-4-4 overall) and hope to start with key wins in their home tournament. Coach Sykes feels confident about his scoring potential but sees a problem with lack of fullback experience.

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

ESTELLE HILLMAN--'THE WORLD HAS BEEN HER PARISH'

Estelle Hillman, reknown church woman of the United Methodist
Church, delivered the Summer Commencement Address at Methodist

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

Knott has published numerous articles in Christian magazines and has authored several United Methodist teaching curricula.

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

Monarch Soccer Opens With Big Win



Methodist Monarchs opened the 1980 season in fashionable style with a sweep of their own invitational tournament, Sept. 10-11.

The Methodist College Invitational Soccer Tournament, featuring three of the top teams in the area, got underway Friday, September 10 at noon with a clinic held by Olympian Shep Messing. Tournament play began at two.

The tournament kicked off with a match-up between Pfeiffer College, current Carolina Conference champions, and Florida Institute of Technology. Pfeiffer emerged victorious in a hard-fought struggle, 1-0, the lone score coming late in the second half.

The second pairing of the afternoon featured the Methodist Monarchs against regional rival Pembroke State University. Methodist broke to an early lead and went into halftime leading by the score 2-0. The Monarchs doubled the score in the second half to shut-out Pembroke. Final score, 4-0. Monarch scoring was divided between Atsuo Kumazaki (Kuma) 1, Kenny Morgan 1, and Denny Laird 2. The stage was set for the final match-up scheduled for 4 o'clock, September 11.

Goalie Billy Thomas sustained a severe sprain on his left ankle early in the first half, but remained in the goal until halftime. Phil McAllister finished the game as goalkeeper and played the entire second game. Thomas is expected to return to action by October.

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
Methodist began what appeared to be a replay of their earlier match-up as they once again broke to a 2-0 halftime lead in the championship game against Pfeiffer. Two more second period scores brought the Methodist score even with the previous day's results. Pfeiffer refused to be shut out and scored a final goal to finish the tournament. Final score 4-1--Methodist Monarchs, tournament champs.

Tournament runner-up Pfeiffer had three standouts in the form of Marty Evans, Robbie Church and Brad Wilson. Methodist had its share of star material with Atsuo Kumazaki, Denny Laird and Thomas Ntuk. Laird and Kuma led tournament scoring with three goals each, while Ntuk sparked an almost flawless defensive effort.

With the tournament under their belt, "Methodist is ready to play soccer," according to coach Mason Sykes. "We have practiced to the point that we're ready to play. We have progressed as much as we can. Now what we need is playing experience with which to coordinate our defense."

"Allowing only one goal in two tournament outings, it appears that the defense is well-coordinated, but we're still lacking in crucial experience."

Coach Sykes is looking forward to the start of the regular season, opening Thursday against Pembroke.

"I'm looking forward to a fine season. Everyone we play has improved. The conference teams to beat are Virginia Wesleyan and Averett. We've come in second the last two seasons; this year I'm looking to take it all."

But that is not the only goal Coach Sykes has for his 1980 Monarchs.

BILL COBEY SPEAKS TO METHODIST STUDENTS



Explaining why anyone would decide to leave a position as director of athletics at the prestigious University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill to seek the office of lieutenant governor of the state of North Carolina is no easy task, even for the man who made that decision.

Bill Cobey told a convocation of Methodist College students that he asked himself three questions and made his decision based on his answers: "Who cares?"

"If not me, who?"

"If not now, when?"

The qualities that served him well as athletic director of a major university—working within a specified budget, distributing the revenues equitably among units, etc—will also serve him well as lieutenant governor, says Cobey.

Cobey addressed the college community at the invitation of the Young Republicans Club. The political conservative is seeking to unseat the incumbant Jimmy Green in the lieutenant governor's race. Terry Hutchens, Republican candidate for the North Carolina legislature, introduced Cobey to a crowd of some 500 people in Reeves Auditorium.

The candidate drew spontaneous applause from the audience as he responded to questions about the Equal Rights Amendment, federal funding for abortion and capital punishment.

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The candidate drew spontaneous applause from the audience as he responded to questions about the Equal Rights Amendment, federal funding for abortion and capital punishment.

"I am opposed to the ERA. I support equal rights and equal access, but I do not wish to place interpretation in the hands of the federal courts," asserted the 41-year old Cobey.

"I am not only opposed to federal funding for abortion; I am opposed to all abortions except in the case of danger to the health of the mother or rape."

Calling for stronger and more stringent enforcement of the laws of this land, Cobey affirmed his belief in capital punishment for capital crimes. He described himself as a friend of higher education.

"We need more, not fewer private colleges," said Cobey.

"And I am a strong supporter of public aid to private institutions.

Private colleges get more for our tax dollars than public institutions do."

Cobey expressed major concerns for the preservation of freedom among peoples of the world, citing complacency of Americans who have always been free. Major threats to world peace and the American freedom are the Soviet Union and American military inferiority, according to Cobey.

The Republican Cobey was pessimistic about the fiscal future of American free enterprise.

"Your future and my future have been mortgaged," said Cobey.

"And we are quickly approaching a time when the producers of this nation are going to refuse to produce for the non-producers."

calling for involvement of all citizens, Cobey advocated imposing tax and spending limitations on government spending not to exceed personal gains in expenditure; giving the right to initiate a referendum to the citizens of the state of North Carolina; limiting the intervention of federal government in state matters; electing people who will put principle over politics and holding them accountable for their voting record.

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"Christians are called upon to be the light of the world," stated Cobey. "We must also be the salt of the earth, preserving the freedoms of man."


Cobey said each citizen has unlimited potential to make a difference.
