

The Minister-In-Residence program offers the conference colleges and conferences ministers an opportunity for interaction.



Fayetteville--Joe Miller, Methodist College Basketball coach, has set eight goals as he looks toward the 1980-81 season. Oddly enough, none mention winning.

"We are trying this year to play hard basketball," states Miller. "If we obtain all eight goals, we'll win. If we obtain half of them, the games will be close if not wins."

The eight set by Miller are (1) to shoot 50% as a team from the field; (2) to shoot 70% from the free throw line; (3) to have less than 12 turnovers per game; (4) to hold opponents to a less than 45% per shooting average from the field; (5) to force 20 turnovers: (6) to take eight charging violations; (7) to out rebound opponents; and (8) to hold opponents to fewer than 65 points. This set of specific goals that every coach strives for may bring the Monarch basketball team back to its feet after a disappointing 3-18 season last year.

The Monarchs still lack experience going into the new season. With two players currently ineligible, senior David Smith of Fayetteville is left as the sole returning varsity player. Two other players returning with playing experience are Rick Emerson with Junior Varsity and limited varsity action, and Ken McLamb with Junior Varsity experience. 




