

WOMEN'S BASKETBALL
HAS 'BIG SHOES TO FILL'

FAYETTEVILLE--Coach Terry Benson will head the young but vigorous Methodist College women's basketball team in what looks like a promising 1980-81 season. Benson, in her first year as head coach, will take three seniors, one sophomore and six freshmen and attempt to mold the team into a repeat championship squad.

Benson certainly has her work cut out for her. She is nonetheless encouraged.

"We have a small but quick team that is really putting forth a great deal of enthusiasm."

Benson's small team is led by returnees Conni Dickens of Roxboro; Ilean Phillips of Farmville; and Josie Gause of Ash, N.C. Dickens, who was All-Conference last year, will start as point guard and play a major role in the team's development throughout the season. Coach Benson is hoping that Dickens' experience will influence the rest of the team.

Centering for the team will be sophomore Renate Larry, standing 6', who will give the team great rebounding and inside strength. The four upperclassmen will be complimented by six freshmen: Ginny Ward of Gates; Nancy Curtain of Clifton, N.J.: Robin Baxley of St. Pauls; Michelle Brisson of Dublin; Marion Stancil of Candor; and Donna Gore of Nakina.

"I'm looking forward to this year's season," says Benson. "There seems to be more interest, at least with the student body. I'd like to see more support of girls sports at Methodist."

Despite an early five point lead and three players in double figures, the Methodist Girls Varisty fell to St. Andrews, 75-62, in a tough conference match-up.

"We lost the game in the last ten minutes," states head coach Terry Benson. "The first half was back and forth. At one point, we were up by five then at half they had us by seven."

The Monarchs had three players in double figures. Ilean Phillips headed the squad with 18. Connie Dickens contributed 15 and Almarie Chalmers threw in 12. Lyndora Gaden led St. Andrews with the fine game of 29 points.

Benson was pleased with the teams defensive play.

"I was pleased with our defense. Our offense was a little weak, though. Especially in the second half against their zone defense."

The Monarchs also were hurt from the foul line shooting a meager 38%. They shot 43% from the floor.

Connie Dickens, senior all-conference guard, is optimistic for the 1980-81 team.

"I think we have a good chance of repeating as state champs. Our team strength is quickness and a good attitude. As the season goes on we will get more familiarized with each game and improve."

Dickens also states that a lot of the credit should go to Coach Benson.

"Coach Benson relates well to the players on an individual basis."

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The ladies hope to get on the winning track December 2 as they take the court against N.C. Wesleyan at Rocky Mount. The Monarchs will open their home season on Dec. 4 against Meredith College.

Winter graduation exercises officially conclude the fall semester at Methodist. Students are scheduled to return for classes on Monday, January 12.

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
