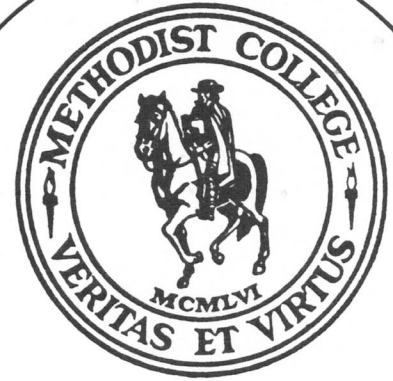

" You are the lifeblood of Methodist College," Dr. Pearce told Foundation members. " Without your support, many young people could not afford to attend Methodist College."

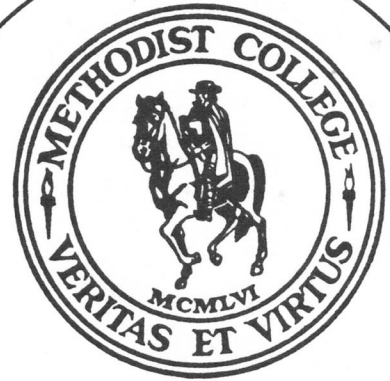
