FAYETTEVILLE--Methodist College's Department of Foreign Languages is offering a study-sightseeing tour to French Canada during the May term of summer school. Students and non-academic participants will be accepted to join the low-cost 10-day tour to Montreal and Quebec City.

Mrs. Elaine Porter, tour director, has announced that a minimum of 15 is needed to obtain the lowest group rates on Amtrak and on the guided tours in Canada. Departure will be at midnight from Fayetteville on Tuesday, May 12, and the group will return at 7 p.m. on Friday, May 22.

Academic credit may be earned in the French language (2 s.h.) or in foreign culture (3 s.h.) and is offered through the Division of Continuing Education at evening college tuition rates. For those not seeking academic credit, the cost is \$350. This fee will cover the roundtrip Amtrak ticket, all lodging and breakfasts in Canada, tickets, admissions and transportation to all scheduled activities during the 3 1/2 days in each city.



"We have abundant energy from numerous sources—we simply haven't perfected the technology to harness it yet, but we will," predicts Dr. Elleman.

Speaking to Methodist College students during a National Energy Week seminar, Dr. Elleman asserted the moderate view that there is no single solution to meeting America's energy needs—not solar, nuclear or fossil.

"Solutions are to be found in a combination of all energy sources," Dr. Elleman says. "The American people must also be more realistic in their safety expectations—realizing that there is no energy source that can be used without risk."

Statistics cited by Dr. Elleman show natural gas as the safest source of energy, followed closely by hydro-energy and nuclear energy. Solar energy is further down the list because of the high copper and mineral needs.

Dr. Elleman, who currently serves as vice-president of nuclear safety and research in the Carolina Power and





He does not believe that the American people will allow the energy crisis to be a disaster for this society.





The exhibit is open to the public daily from 8 A.M. until 5 P.M. in Horner Administration Building through March 28.






