



Formerly of Fayetteville, Sanford began his public service career as a special agent of the F.B.I., followed closely by a stint as Assistant Director of the Institute of Government at UNC. Prior to his term of office as governor (1961-65), Sanford served as president of the North Carolina Young Democrats Club, secretary-treasurer of the North Carolina State Ports Authority and a member of the North Carolina State Senate. Sanford has authored two books, But What About the People? in 1966 and Storm Over the States in 1967.
