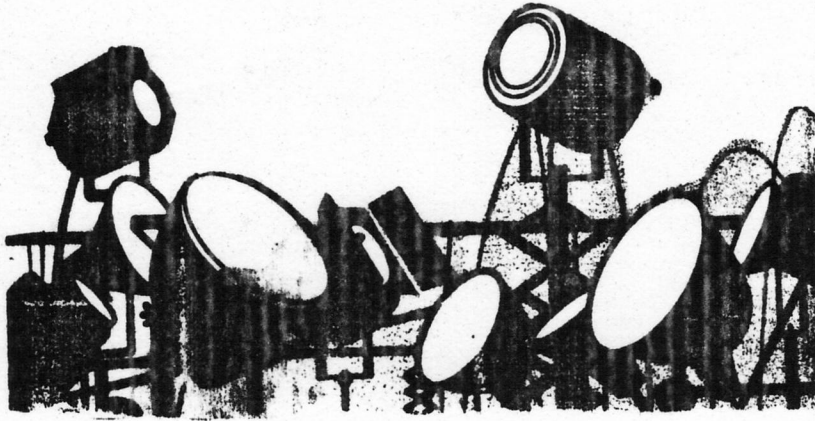
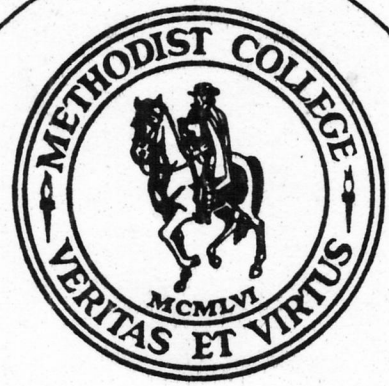

Moliere's GEORGE DANDIN is about to strike. You know THE IMAGINARY INVALID, THE DOCTOR IN SPIRE OF HIMSELF, THE MISER, THE MISANTHROPE, AND TARTUFF---but few know GEORGE DANDIN--a typical Moliere farce which is now infrequently produced.

The good news for you and your students is that the Methodist College Masque-Keys have chosen this farce for their outdoor Homecoming production this year. So, at 4 o'clock on October 8, 9, and 10, in Methodist College's O'Hanlon Outdoor Theatre, George and his friends(?) will come to life in a riotous free performance.

The action takes place in front of George's French Provincial Mansion in 1688 France. Wealthy George is a social non-entity who married poor Angelica DeSontenville who is socially prominent. The play shows how George's wife, servants, in-laws, and neighbor all cuckold him. The delightful farce ends on a frustrating note (as so many of Moliere's plays do) as the audience realizes there is no change for George. He observes, "When anybody has married a wicked wife as I have done, the best method he can take, is to leap into the lake head-foremost."

This free late afternoon (1 hour and 45 minute) production should delight you and your students. Perhaps you could bring picnics and have supper in the theatre during the play (there will be soft drinks sold before and after the performance). The whole atmosphere is to be one of fun and frivolity as Moliere holds the mirror up to an affected society (not unlike our own).

Claire Ann Wilson will teach piano for children in the CMP. A graduate of Florida State University in piano and choral concentration, Ms. Wilson previously taught in the Robert Pace Group Piano Method in Griffin, GA.

Ms. Wilson has studied piano with Despy Kavlas of the University of Georgia and Edward Kilenye of Florida State University.

An exciting addition to the Community Music Program at Methodist is the instruction of Suzuki violin for children. Kyoko Kawamoto Fuller will teach Suzuki violin, having studied under Dr. Suzuki in Japan.

Ms. Fuller is a native of Northern Japan and a graduate of the Suzuki Talent Education Institute in Matsumoto where she also taught. After coming to United States, Ms. Fuller taught in the University of Tennessee Department of Music and performed with the Knoxville Symphony Orchestra. She is now a member of the Fayetteville Symphony Orchestra.

Suzuki violin theory embraces the teaching of children at an early age. According to Ms. Fuller, the ideal age for children to begin violin in the Suzuki method is three to four years old.

Children begin by using a violin scaled to their size, then proceed

Suzuki violin theory embraces the teaching of children at an early age. According to Ms. Fuller, the ideal age for children to begin violin in the Suzuki method is three to four years old. Children begin by using a violin scaled to their size, then proceed quickly by learning proper posture and simple music.

According to Ms. Townsend, the advantages offered by the Community Music Program are professional instructors, three levels of instruction which include a music theory course at no cost, student recitals within each semester and the musitronic lab for piano instruction.

METHODIST COLLEGE LAUNCHES SILVER ANNIVERSARY CAMPAIGN

FAYETTEVILLE--Methodist College launched the Silver Anniversary year with the announcement of a three-part expansion program called "The Next Step."

Included in the program to be submitted to the college's Board of Trustees in November are recommendations to renovate the exteriors of the four dormitories, to build the long-awaited gymnasium, and to found a Shakespearean Summer Theatre on the Methodist campus.

In his State of the College address given during the formal Opening Convocation today, Methodist president Richard Pearce asserted that the college is "ready to take the plunge--to take the proverbial Next Step" in greeting the next 25 years.

Renovation of the dormitory exteriors will involve the installation of energy-efficient window walls in each room and the sandblasting of the brick buildings. A mini-drive is already underway to raise the \$210,000 necessary to complete the renovation and Dr. Pearce announced that 160 of the 420 windows needed were already pledged. Each window costs \$500. However, with the reduction in energy costs and the elimination of glass replacement the windows are expected to amortize in 3 years.

Initial plans for the building of a gymnasium/physical education complex have been submitted by the coaching faculty at Methodist.

However, with the reduction in energy costs and the elimination of glass replacement the windows are expected to amortize in 3 years.

Initial plans for the building of a gymnasium/physical education complex have been submitted by the coaching faculty at Methodist. Dr. Pearce pledged his efforts to encourage the Board of Trustees to accept the challenge of completing the original architect's plan of the Methodist College campus by building the permanent gymnasium now. Currently, Methodist College athletes and students are using a temporary gymnasium which will eventually convert to a warehouse/storage facility for the physical plant operations.

METHODIST COLLEGE LAUNCHES SILVER ANNIVERSARY (continued)

The third phase of "The Next Step" calls for the establishment of a Shakespearean Summer Festival to be held annually on the Methodist College campus. Successful Shakespearean summer theatres are currently in operation in limited locations across the United States. This project will involve the staging of several plays of William Shakespeare during the summer utilizing local, regional and campus talent.

Dr. Pearce also addressed the issue of energy conservation for students.

"At today's prices, each student uses \$400 worth of energy on campus," says Pearce. "With concern and cooperation, we can reduce that consumption to \$300 per student."

A program called TEMP (Total Energy Management Program) will be implemented by a committee of both students and staff to plan ways to accomplish the reduction proposed.

In other business, Dr. Pearce announced substantial support from the Fayetteville community (\$161,000 thus far in the year), the North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church (\$236,000) and the Methodist College Alumni (\$6,623 thus far in the fiscal year).

Methodist College students began classes on Tuesday, September 1 on the campus which was founded in November, 1956.
