





Calling for major growth in the microelectronics field, the Cumberland County Senator predicted a decline in manufacturing and agriculture for the state.





United States Congressman Charlie Rose urged local school boards to follow the example of Japanese management in treating teachers with respect and understanding.

Speaking to 1500 teachers at the regional NCAE meeting at Methodist College, Congressman Rose drew strong comparisons between the productivity of Japan and the productivity of education in the United States.

Rose told the group that administrators and school boards need to create the feeling of family with their teachers because they are the custodians of the future.

"Nothing is more powerful than the well and open mind of a child" said Rose. "Nothing is more disturbing than the wasted mind of a child who hasn't been challenged.

Teachers heard the dismal prediction that 55 thousand nationwide will lose their jobs this year as a result of cutbacks advocated by the current Reagan economic policy.

That figure computes to over 800 North Carolina teachers who will lose their jobs.

NCAE urged members to use their political clout to reverse this trend.
