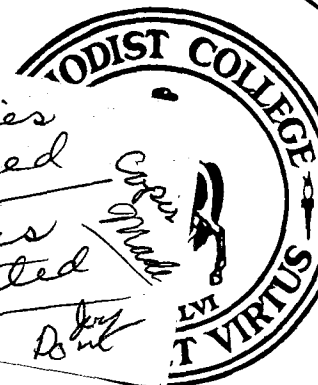

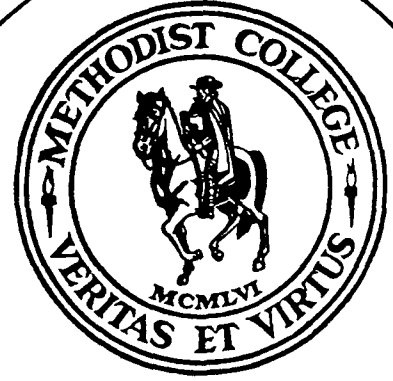

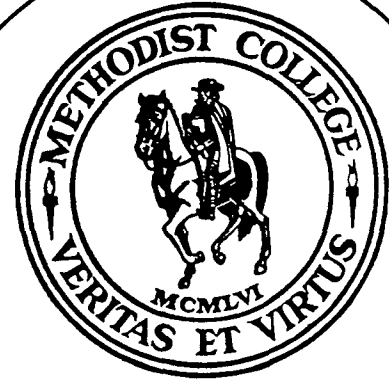

MacIvor is the wife of First Lieutenant Michael MacIvor. Saunders is a sergeant in the Charlie Battery of the 1/320th F. A.

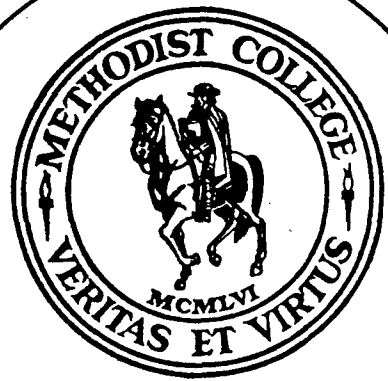
