In addition,

two increasingly popular financial aid programs are the Incentive Scholarship ship program and the student-work program. Incentive Scholarships are awarded on the basis of a student's class rank and college board performance; the amount awarded can be as much as \$3000. Also, every residential student is given the opportunity to work on campus a maximum of five hours per week for minimum wage.

Methodist College is a growing, vital community where young adults learn to become productive citizens. The campus is open year-round and anyone interested in finding out more information about Methodist is encouraged to visit.
