

## TOWNSEND, CULVERHOUSE AMONG NATIONAL LEADERS

FAYETTEVILLE, NC -- Two Methodist College basketball team members are listed among the leaders in statistics released this week by the NCAA. Lee Townsend, a junior forward from Fairmont, NC, is 14th in the nation among all NCAA III schools and Vivian Culverhouse, a junior from Fayetteville, is 12th in rebounding in women's Division III.

Through nine games, Townsend has scored 205 points (77 field goals and 51 free throws) for a 22.8 average. Marty Raynour of Fitchburg State leads Division III scorers with a 31.2 average.

Culverhouse is tied with Stacey Matulewicz of Bethany and Missy Brown of Lycoming. She has played in eight games, grabbing 108 total rebounds for an impressive 13.5 rebounds per game. Matulewicz has played in just six games and Brown's rebounding stats are based on only four games.

Townsend is also the leading scorer in the Dixie Conference. Through 14 games, he has scored 312 points for an average of 22.3 per game. Townsend also leads the league in rebounding with an average of 10.6 per game.

Culverhouse is fourth in the league among rebounders with 10.6 per game. (Conference statistics reflect games played through Jan. 11.)

MONARCHS FALL TO UNC-G, 80-59

FAYETTEVILLE, NC -- A hot shooting UNC-G team rolled into Fayetteville Wednesday night and handed Methodist an 80-59 setback, dropping the Monarchs to 1-4 in the Dixie Conference basketball standings.

Lee Townsend, who ranks 14th in the nation in Division III scoring, dropped in 23 points but got little help from his teammates as Methodist saw its losing streak stretch to six games. It was the third straight conference defeat for the Monarchs.

Townsend was the only player in double figures. Freshman Joe Frana added seven and senior Larry Townsend chipped in six.

UNC-Greensboro was led by Robert Bryant and Early Pickett with 16 each. Frazier Bryant was also in double figures with 10.

Methodist put up a strong battle through the first half, leading by three points in the early going. UNC-G tied the score at 13 midway through the period and then outscored the Monarchs 6-0. The two teams played evenly the rest of the half with UNC-G heading into the locker room with the scoreboard in their favor, 33-27.

The second half was all UNC-G. The Spartans used their height advantage and wore down the quicker Monarchs. Depth was also a problem for Methodist as UNC-G coach Bob McEvoy relied on his bench strength throughout the game.

Methodist will take a 2-12 record to Danville, VA, on Saturday night as they face league opponent Averett College.

Lady Monarchs Fall To Davidson

Preceding the match between UNC-G and the Monarchs, the Methodist women's team fell to non-conference opponent Davidson, 68-57.

Davidson placed four figures in double figures. Methodist was led by senior Barbara Allen with 16 points, Evette Doss added 13 and Vivian Culverhouse chipped in 11.

The following night, Thursday, Jan. 16, the Lady Monarchs faced another non-league foe, Coker College of Hartsville, SC, and were defeated 82-61.

Teresa Martin, Coker's 5-2 senior guard, pumped in a big 27 points to lead her team. Also in double figures were Jill Willard, 15; Lynn Owens, 14; Tina Blackmon, 11; and Lisha Morant, 10.

Allen, a 5-6 forward from Charleston, SC, again led the Lady Monarchs with 14 points. Doss, a 5-4 sophomore guard from Fayetteville, added 10 and Sonja Mixon, a 6-0 junior also from Fayetteville, had nine.

Mixon led Methodist under the boards with a big 12 rebounds. Culverhouse, 12th in the nation in NCAA Division III rebounding, was also a force under the boards with 10 caroms.

Methodist will take a 3-10 record to Laurinburg, NC, on Saturday afternoon against league opponent St. Andrews. The Lady Monarchs are 1-3 in league play and St. Andrews is winless in nine games this season, four of those losses coming at the hands of DIAC teams.

Next week, the Lady Monarchs travel to Greensboro twice, facing UNC-G on Tuesday and Greensboro College on Thursday. They return home to play Averett, a team they beat by 30 points last weekend, on Saturday in Fayetteville. Tipoff time is 7:30 p.m. in the Monarch gym.

The MC men travel to Averett that same night. Next week they face St. Andrews on Thursday, followed by a Saturday night rematch with UNC-G. Both games are on the road.

### METHODIST TO HOST INAUGURAL COMPUTER CONFERENCE

FAYETTEVILLE, NC -- Citing the "significant contributions that schools and colleges in North Carolina have made to educational computing," Dr. Lynn Sadler, vice president for academic affairs at Methodist College, has announced that Methodist will host an educational computing conference on Thursday and Friday, Feb. 6-7.

Sadler said the North Carolina Assessment of Educational Computing Conference will be the first of its kind in the state.

"This conference will focus on education, fine arts and humanities, including Computer-Assisted Composition (CAC), a program developed here at Methodist College," she explained. Next fall, a similar conference will focus on the social sciences and in the spring of 1987, a third educational computing conference will address the physical sciences and mathematics.

"The entire educational spectrum -- elementary, secondary and post-secondary -- will be included," said Sadler. "North Carolina educators who have made presentations at major national and international conferences in the last three years have been invited to update their presentations."

Steve Jobs, formerly of Apple, was invited to present the keynote address but

he his currently involved in litigation with that company and was forced to decline. Since leaving Apple he has founded a new computer company, NEXT. Sadler said that Jobs is currently working on a new project concerning a computer workstation for academics. Jobs hopes to appear at one of the later conferences.

Dr. C. Stuart Hunter, coordinator of computing at Guelph University in Guelph, Ontario, Canada, will present the keynote address at a banquet scheduled from 6-8 p.m. on Thursday, Feb. 6, in the Alumni Dining Room, located in the lower level of the college's Student Union.

The conference opens that afternoon with a pre-conference workshop, "An Overview of the Generic Functions: Word Processing, Spreadsheeting, Databasing," from 2-4 p.m. in Room 244 of the Trustees' Building on the Methodist College campus.

Registration will be from 3-5 p.m. followed by a reception from 5-6 p.m. in the lobby of Reeves Auditorium .

On Friday, Feb. 7, there will be four sessions beginning at 9:15 a.m., 10:45 a.m., 2:15 p.m. and 3:45 p.m., with conference participants choosing from among 37 different presentations throughout the day.

A post-conference workshop on "Diagrammatic Writing Using Word Processing" will be presented by Dr. Lynn Sadler, Dr. Emory Sadler and Dr. Wendy Greene at 3:30 p.m. on Friday.

Conference workshops will be presented by representatives from over 20 North Carolina educational institutions, including Methodist College, University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, Belmont Abbey College, High Point College, North Carolina State University, Meredith College, University of North Carolina at Greensboro, University of North Carolina at Charlotte, Haywood Technical College, Duke University and North Carolina A & T.

Workshop categories include the implementing of computers into the educational

system; philosophical presentations on computer literacy and liberal education; and computer education of teachers, adult students and K-3 students.
