METHODIST COLLEGE EARNS TOP CASE AWARD

FAYETTEVILLE, NC -- A photograph entered by Methodist College in the 1986 Council and Advancement for the Support of Education (CASE) District III Communications Awards Competition has earned a first-place Grand Award.

The photograph, used in the college's admissions literature (athletic poster), was one of five top winners in the Photography/Non News category. Methodist and Radford University earned the highest award. One Excellence Award went to Rollins College, and Merit Awards went to East Carolina University, James Madison University and Georgia Tech.

Methodist's entry, designed by Hodges Associates Inc., a Fayetteville advertising agency, edged out a number of major colleges and universities in the 13-state CASE Southeast District.

Methodist was awarded Merit status (third place) for an illustration from a recruitment poster in the Illustrations category. Radford was the top winner with second place awards (Excellence) going to UNC-Chapel Hill, University of Kentucky and University of Mississsippi School of Pharmacy.

"We're very pleased with our admissions literature and we're getting some very positive reactions to it," said Al Robinson, director of public information and publications at Methodist. "A lot of people have worked very hard on this literature here at the college and at Hodges Associates."

COLLEGE HOSTS SCHOLARSHIP COMPETITION

FAYETTEVILLE, NC -- Methodist College recently held its 1985-86 Scholarship Competition, hosting 41 high school seniors from North Carolina and states along the East Coast. These students competed for scholarships ranging from \$750 to the Presidential Scholarships which are valued at approximately \$20,000 each.

This year's recipients of the Presidential Scholarships are Sharon Renee Daniels, Fayetteville, and Danielle Hargett, New Bern.

In recognition of academic achievement, Methodist College has held a scholarship competition for more than 20 years. Last year, the monies awarded varied from \$750 to \$2,000. In 1985, more than \$500,000 was awarded in scholarships. In addition, the two full-tutition Presidential Scholarships awarded through the annual competition are renewable for four years, contingent upon maintaining a 3.0 grade point average.

During the competition weekend activities, students toured the campus, dined in the college cafeteria, were entertained at a residence hall reception and met Dr. M. Elton Hendricks, president of Methodist, at a breakfast he and his wife, Gerri, hosted in the President's Home on the Methodist campus.

The actual scholarship competition consisted of one required English CLEP examination and one CLEP test selected from the fields of social studies, natural

sciences, mathematics or humanities. In addition, each student was interviewed by a panel consisting of one Methodist College administrator, two faculty members and one current Methodist student.

Scholarship winners were determined by totaling interview scores and CLEP test results.

NOVAK PRESENTS KEYNOTE ADDRESS AT OPENING OF REEVES SCHOOL OF BUSINESS

FAYETTEVILLE, NC -- Methodist College announced today the establishment of the Charles M. Reeves School of Business. The announcement was made at a noon luncheon held in the dining hall of the college's Student Union. Over 200 business and community leaders attended the luncheon and program.

The School of Business has been named in honor of Charles M. Reeves of Sanford, NC. Reeves, president of the Provident Finance Company in Sanford from 1949 to 1977, a firm that he founded, is a former state banking commissioner. He has been successfully involved in banking, railroad car leasing, real estate development and other business and economic ventures.

The keynote address at the luncheon was presented by Michael Novak, a writer, scholar and activist, and the George Frederick Jewett Chair in Religion and Public Policy at the American Enterprise Institute in Washington, D.C.

A Pennsylvania native, Novak graduated summa cum laude from Stonehill College in 1956 and from the Gregorian University in Rome (cum laude) in 1958. He later studied at Catholic University in Washington, D.C., and earned a master of arts degree in history and philosophy from Harvard University in 1966.

He was an assistant professor of humanities at Stanford University from 1965-68. Twice in three years the senior class there voted him one of the two "most influential professors."

From 1968-73 he taught at the newly formed experimental college at the State University of New York at Old Westbury. He then launched a new humanities program for the Rockefeller Foundation. In 1976 he accepted a tenured chair as the Ledder-Watson Distinguished Professor of Religion at Syracuse University. He joined the American Enterprise Institute two years later.

Novak is the founder of the Ethnic Millions Action Committee (EMPAC) and in the mid-1970's he campaigned for the creation of a White House Office of Ethnic Affairs. This office was opened during the Ford administration and continued under President Carter. Novak served as advisor during both administrations.

In 1981 and 1982, he was appointed by President Reagan as the Chief of the United States Delegation to the United Nations Human Rights Commission in Geneva. His highly acclaimed speeches from the 37th and 38th Sessions, "Rethinking Human Rights: Vols. I and II" were published in 1982 and 1983.

Novak has written two novels and nearly 20 influential books in the areas of philosophy, theology and culture. He has written a nationally syndicated weekly column and his articles have appeared in <u>The New Republic</u>, <u>Commentary</u>, <u>Harpers</u>, <u>The Atlantic</u>, <u>National Review</u> and numerous other popular and scholarly journals.

His writings have appeared in every major Western language, and in Bengali, Korean and Japanese. He has received numerous awards including 10 honorary degrees.

SPRENG NAMED DIRECTOR OF METHODIST'S CHARLES M. REEVES SCHOOL OF BUSINESS

FAYETTEVILLE, NC -- President M. Elton Hendricks has named Dr. Frank Spreng as director of the Charles M. Reeves School of Business and professor of economics and business at Methodist College.

Dr. Spreng is presently chairman of the Division of Business at Brescia College in Owensboro, KY, where he also held the Chair of Private Enterprise.

He holds both bachelor's and master's degrees in business administration from Duquesne University in Pittsburgh, PA, and he has earned master of science and doctor of philosophy degrees in economics from the University of Pittsburgh.

Dr. Spreng has been on the faculty at Duquesne University, Point Park College, Pennsylvania State University—Beaver Campus and was a tenured member of the faculty at Hampden—Sydney College. Dr. Spreng chaired the Division of Business Administration and Economics at Richmond College, Richmond Surrey, England, where he developed, administered and taught in the business administration program.

Spreng's areas of interest are micro, managerial and labor economics; managerial accounting -- planning and control; law and economics; and the history of economic thought.

He has published in the Virginia Social Science Journal, Journal of Economic

Literature, Kentucky Economic Journal and Western Pennsylvania Historical Magazine.

He has been named a recipient of the Economic Education Award from the Freedom Foundation in Valley Forge, PA.

A member of numerous professional associations, Spreng serves as director of the Kentucky Business Society and the Audubon Center for Economic Education. He is a member of Rotary International and Investigators of Owensboro. He is president of the Kentucky Economic Association and directed and organized the association's annual meeting held last fall.

The mayor of Owensboro appointed him to the Owensboro Civic, Cultural and Economic Development Commission. He has served as secretary of the commission and was appointed chairman in June 1982.

Dr. Spreng is married to L. Jane (Fitzgerald) Spreng and they are the parents of two daughters.

METHODIST COLLEGE

Methodist College was founded in 1956 as a joint effort involving the North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church and the citizens of Fayetteville and Cumberland County. Dr. Terry Sanford, former governor of North Carolina and former president of Duke University in Durham, NC, served as chairman of the first board of trustees.

Dr. L. Stacy Weaver was the college's first president. He was succeeded by Dr. Richard Pearce. Three years ago, Dr. M. Elton Hendricks assumed the presidency of Methodist College.

The college opened its doors to a freshman class of 128 students on Sept. 19, 1960. That first class, which graduated in 1964, was subsequently joined by the Classes of 1965, 1966 and 1967 to fulfill the dream of the church and the community to bring a four-year institution of higher education with a Christian emphasis to southeastern North Carolina.

Methodist began operation at the dawn of a new decade. At that time there were three buildings -- the Trustees' Building, the Science Building and the Student Union.

As the student body and faculty grew, so did the physical plant. Four residence halls, an administration building, a gymnasium, an auditorium/fine arts facility, library, and chapel were all added to the campus in less than 10 years.

Today, two and one-half decades later, Methodist College has grown to an enrollment of nearly 1,400 students. The student body is represented by states throughout the Eastern Seabord and several foreign countries. The college offers 34 majors in a wide range of academic areas.

The college hosts many community events in Reeves Auditorium, including the Fayetteville Symphony, the Fayetteville Dance Theater, the Fayetteville Symphonic Band, the Community Concert Series and the North Carolina Symphony. The college sponsors many cultural events for the community at no admission charge, including the annual Fine Arts Festival, Southern Literary Symposium, Iterations, Economic Outlook Symposium, and a number of dramatic and musical performances in the Fine Arts Department.

Now in its third decade -- a young but strong institution -- Methodist College remains committed to its mission -- a liberal arts education based upon Christian ideals and beliefs.
