ENDANGERED SPECIES SYMPOSIUM SLATED FOR APRIL 11-12, 18-19

FAYETTEVILLE, NC -- Aiming to increase awareness of the problems of rare, threatened and endangered animals, Methodist College will host an Endangered Species Symposium on Friday and Saturday, April 11-12, and Friday and Saturday, April 18-19.

Project WILD, a workshop for science teachers, will be held the first weekend of the symposium. Rick Estes, who has led 30 Project WILD Workshops, will conduct the workshop at Methodist's symposium. Estes holds a B.S. in biology and an M.S. in middle grade education from Western Carolina University.

Registration is required for Project WILD. The symposium gets underway on Friday, April 11, with registration from 5:30-6 p.m. followed by a four-hour workshop. Instruction resumes the following day with workshops scheduled from 9 a.m. to noon and 1-4 p.m.

The programs slated for April 18-19 are open to the general public. Rob Sutter, coordinator/endangered species botanist for the Plant Conservation Program for the North Carolina Department of Agriculture, will open the symposium on Friday with an "Endangered Plants of North Carolina" lecture from 7-9 p.m.

Julie Moore, who has been with the Natural Heritage Program for seven years, will present "Registered Natural Areas" from 9-10:30 a.m. on Saturday, April 19. Debbie Paul of the Wildlife Resources Commission will follow at 10:45 a.m. with "Endangered Animals: Non-Game Program of the Wildlife Resources Commission."

At 1:15 p.m., Jesse Perry will present "Endangered Animals: Success Stories." Perry works with the North Carolina Museum of Natural History, designing and implementing field trips, workshops and lectures for both children and adults.

The Endangered Species Symposium will close with a movie, "A Time for Choice," at 3 p.m. followed by an evaluation period.

BASS LEADS MC PITCHING STAFF

FAYETTEVILLE, NC -- A big win over North Carolina Wesleyan (7-5, with five runs scored in the bottom of the eighth inning) boosted freshman Mark Bass' season mound mark to 5-0. Bass, a freshman who prepped at North Duplin High School, Faison, NC, had an ERA of 2.21 in his first four games. Through 24 1/3 innings, he had struck out 19 batters.

Other team pitching records prior to the NC Wesleyan game have Henry Bowden, a junior from Fayetteville (Douglas Byrd High School) at 3-0, ERA 2.25; Carlos Baserva, sophomore from Miami, FL, (Miami Senior High School) at 3-0, 4.06; David Horne, junior from Fayetteville (Cape Fear High School) 2-0, 2.14; Richard Seagroves, junior from Fayetteville (Pine Forest High School) at 1-0, 1.42; and Juan Santana, Brentwood, NY, (Brentwood-Ross High School) at 1-0, 3.60. The team ERA is 2.98.

Mike Brewington, a freshman from Fayetteville (Seventy-First High School), leads the hitting corps with a .451 average. In 23 games and 71 trips to the plate, Brewington has pounded out 32 hits, scored 34 runs, 32 RBIs, two doubles, three triples and four home runs. On the base paths, he has successfully stolen 15 bases.

MC BASEBALL 2-2-2-2

Danny Hartline, in 82 at-bats, has pounded out 33 hits and scored 38 runs to lead the team in both categories. A sophomore from Laurel Hill, NC, and prep standout at Scotland County High School, Hartline leads the team in stolen bases with 24. He has hit eight doubles, one triple and three round-trippers. In 23 games he has batted in 27 runs.

Other top hitters for Coach Tom Austin's Monarchs are Neal McDonald, freshman, Greys Creek, NC, (Southview High School) .452; Horne at .400; Stan Mozingo, junior from Goldsboro, NC, (Goldsboro High School) .365; Doug Garner, senior, Beaufort, NC, (East Carteret High School); and Mark Council, senior from Lake Waccamaw, NC, (Hallsboro High School), .298.

Through 23 games, Methodist has (in 671 at-bats) 282 runs, 235 hits, 42 doubles, 18 triples, 21 home runs and 145 stolen bases. Team batting average is .350.

MONARCHS DOWN NO. 7 NC WESLEYAN; MOVE UNDEFEATED MARK TO 23 GAMES

FAYETTEVILLE, NC -- And the streak continues....

A big 7-5 win over North Carolina Wesleyan, the seventh-ranked team in NCAA Division III baseball, on Monday, March 31, at Shelley Field stretched Methodist College's unbeaten string to a whopping 23 games.

After an opening loss to Armstrong State in Savannah, GA, the Monarchs have reeled off 21 straight victories with no defeats. Included in the string are two ties and an upset of Montclair State, the number two team in Division III. Methodist is ranked 14th.

The victory over NCW was sweet revenge for the Monarchs. The two colleges —both developed in 1956 and opened for classes in the fall of 1960 — have become strong rivals. Both teams are regarded as small college baseball powers. Monday's win over the Battling Bishops was Methodist's first in four years. The two teams will have a rematch on Sunday, April 13, at 2 p.m. on Wesleyan's home diamond in Rocky Mount, NC.

The Easter Monday game saw the Bishops jump ahead early. They were comfortably in command in the fifth inning with a 5-2 lead. But despite the fact most of the MC students were still away on Easter break, a good crowd of Monarch

supporters was on hand and slowly the momentum began to swing toward the home team's favor.

Henry Bowden started on the mound for the Monarchs but was relieved by Mark Bass in the fifth innning. Everything fell into place in the bottom of the eighth when Wesleyan's starting pitcher went to the dugout. MC went to work quickly and when the inning had ended, five runs had come across the plate -- Methodist smelled victory with a 7-5 lead.

Bass quickly disposed of the NCW line-up, three up and three down, to get the win.

Doug Garner and Danny Hartline each drove in two runs. Methodist pounded out seven hits to NC Wesleyan's six. The Monarchs defense allowed three errors and NCW as guilty of two.

Methodist is now 21-1-2 and 1-0 in the Dixie Conference. North Carolina Wesleyan fell to 2-1 in the league and 25-3 overall.

COLLEGE ADDS INSTANT HISTORY WITH FLORENCE ROGERS HOME

FAYETTEVILLE, NC -- The Florence Rogers home located near the amphitheater is now a permanent part of Methodist College. When restoration is complete, the oldest home in Cumberland County will be a museum and art gallery.

In late 1985 the Florence Rogers Charitable Trust, a non-profit trust fund established in Rogers will in 1961, let out the word that they wanted the home to go to a non-profit organization who would preserve it. The home, formerly located near the Fayetteville Museum of Art, was being destroyed by vandals.

Methodist was in dire need of another building on campus so Dr. Sue Kimball, professor of English and grants coordinator, began searching for a house to fill this need. She found a large brick home, but Dr. M. Elton Hendricks, president of the college, felt the cost of moving the home was too high.

Kimball read an article in the Fayetteville Times about the Florence Rogers home. She figured the cost of moving this home would also be too expensive so she threw the article in the trash. Bruce Pulliam, chairman of Social Sciences, telephoned Kimball and urged her to pursue the article.

Kimball presented the article to Hendricks who immediately liked this home because it would give the college instant history.

The home is a traditional North Carolina Coastal Plain cottage and was built in 1735 on the west bank of the Cape Fear River by Hardy Council, Jr. It was first moved prior to 1805 by subsequent owner Peter Mallett, to a site near Gillespie Street. The second move occured in 1830 when the home was moved by wagon to the site near the Fayetteville Museum of Art. Rogers, one of the first graduates of the nursing school at Highsmith Memorial, purchased the home in 1923 where she lived till her death in 1961.

Many famous people have been entertained in this old home, among them General Pershing and General A.J. Bowley.

The house is of colonial architecture with a gabled roof forming the dormer windows and an early period chimney. It has one mantel, carved of pine by hand with a medallion and a mahogany staircase. There are also handmade wooden door locks, handles and handmade nails used in portions of the home.

The college has hired local architect Gordon Peebles, who is planning and advising Methodist on the restoration of the home.

Peter Sandbeck, a young art historian who works at the Department of Archives in Raleigh and specializes in old architecture, is also advising the college on the restoration of the home.

It will probably take five years before the restoration is fully complete, but part of the home may be ready for use in about a year.

LADY MONARCH GOLFERS SNARE MC'S FIRST NATIONAL TEAM CHAMPIONSHIP

FAYETTEVILLE, NC -- Led by Holly Anderson's three-day total of 236, the Methodist College women's golf team won the Small College Nationals Division III championship held Thursday-Sunday, April 11-13, at Wilmington, NC.

Anderson, a freshman from Cumberland, ME, shot an 83 in the first round of competition on the par-72, 5,900-yard Echo Farms Country Club course. She followed that with a 77 on Saturday and a 76 on Sunday. The championship was the first national team title in the 25-year history of Methodist College. Just last month, Lady Monarch Karen Grant brought home Methodist's first individual national championship with a first place in the triple jump at the NCAA Division III indoor track meet held in Minneapolis, MN.

The four-member Methodist golf squad, coached by Darci Wilson, shot a three-day total of 998. The team rolled to a 30-stroke lead the first day of competition and increased that advantage to an incredible 90 strokes at the end of the tourney. Central College (IA) finished as runner-up at 1,088 and the University of Wisconsin at Whitewater was third with 1,106. Rounding out the field were three other Iowa schools: Loras College, Luther College and Wartburg College.

The top six Division II and III squads, respectively, were extended bids to (more)

the invitation-only Seahawk Azalea/Small College Nationals.

Troy State (AL) took top honors in Division II with a 947 total, followed by Florida Atlantic and Rollins.

Rounding out the Methodist scores were Joy Bonhurst, a freshman from Melville, NY, with a 78-88-82 -- 248; Rose Turner, a freshman from Salisbury, MD, with a 90-86-80 -- 256; and Darcy Krumme, a freshman from Stuart, FL, with an 86-87-85 -- 258.

Anderson, Bonhurst and Turner were named Divison III All-American.

Each team member received a national championship plaque and each All-American received a plaque. The championship team trophy was presented to Dr. M. Elton Hendricks, president of Methodist, at the college's annual Awards Day Convocation held Wednesday morning, April 16.
