JEAN ISHEE TO BE HONORED AT CONCERT

FAYETTEVILLE, NC -- Sanford native Jean Ishee will be honored at a concert to be held Wednesday, Oct. 15, at 8 p.m. in Reeves Auditorium on the campus of Methodist College.

Ishee, who recently stepped down after 26 years on the music faculty at Methodist, will be feted at the premier concert of the college's new nine-foot concert grand piano.

The concert will also honor the contributors to the piano fund. Over \$27,000 was raised to purchase a new piano, replacing a rebuilt one used in Reeves Auditorium since 1968.

Roya Weyerhaeuser, a concert pianist who has studied at the Tehran Conservatory of Music and at Julliard School of Music in New York, will be the featured performer. A native of Iran, she is married to Henry Weyerhaeuser and they reside at Figure Eight Island, off the North Carolina coast near Wilmington. Weyerhaeuser has presented a number of concerts in the Wilmington area.

Ishee, the former Jean Bowers, was born and raised in Sanford. She earned a bachelor of music degree at Greensboro College and a master's degree from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. She has done further graduate work at (more)

Julliard, Westminster Choir College, Peabody Conservatory of Music, and the Royal School of Church Music in England.

Ishee joined the music faculty as a part-time instructor in keyboard when the Methodist first opened in the fall of 1960. She became a full-time faculty member in 1962. Upon her retirement in August 1986, Ishee was an associate professor of piano and organ and chair of the music department.

Reflecting on her 26 years at Methodist, Ishee said, "My greatest joy has come through association with the students. Music faculty members at Methodist College have the opportunity to become closely involved in the training and the individual development of their students. This close relationship has usually resulted in friendships which have continued through the years.

"As a faculty member, I saw extraordinary changes occur in students during the four years they spent at Methodist. Frequently they arrived exhibiting evidence of shyness, uncertainty, and apprehension. During these years their lives began to open up like beautiful flowers. They left college as well-educated, competent, responsible citizens. Many have achieved heights beyond their fondest dreams and my own expectations. There is great satisfaction for me in having been a part of this success."

Ishee has seen the music department expand from a upright piano in the auditorium in the Science Building and a classroom downstairs, to quarters in the faculty apartments, to its present location in the modern, spacious Reeves Auditorium and Fine Arts Building.

In addition to teaching and college performances, she has been active in several state and local musical groups. She is a member of Chaminade Music Club and former president of the North Carolina Music Teachers Association.

Ishee is married to Bert Ishee, who retired five years ago as assistant superintendent of the Fayetteville City Schools. They have two children, Jeff, who

who lives in New York. Suzanne has starred in a touring production of "Jerry's Girls" and recently performed in a national tour of "La Cage aux Folles."

The Ishees live in the Kinwood subdivision near the Methodist campus in northeast Fayetteville. Their future plans include some travel and spending more time with their family. Jean Ishee's mother, Lucy Bowers, resides in a nursing home in Fayetteville.

BRYAN TO PRESENT HULL HOUSE PROGRAM

FAYETTEVILLE, NC -- The Methodist College Fine Arts Division will present Mary Lynn Bryan, historian-in-residence, in "The Arts As A Social Synthesizer: The Hull House Experience" on Monday, Dec. 1, at 8 p.m. in Hensdale Chapel.

Hull House is a Chicago settlement institution founded by Jane Addams, winner of the Nobel Peace Prize in 1931. 'A TOUCH OF GREECE'

FAYETTEVILLE, NC -- The sights, sounds, smells, and tastes of Greek life will be presented at a performance of Greek pantomimes and dances on Friday, Oct. 31, and Saturday, Nov. 1, at Methodist College. "A Touch of Greece," featuring Richard Briggs, will be presented both evenings at 8 p.m. in the auditorium of the Science Building.

Briggs, a Methodist College senior majoring in fine arts/management with an emphasis in theatre, stars in his senior project. The project is the culmination of his theatre study. Briggs is also the producer for this evening of Greek culture.

Upon arrival at the Science Building, the audience will be greeted by the goat mascot for the production. In ancient Greek theatre, the goat was the prize awarded the playwright of the best tragedy (which means "goat song").

The halls will be filled with Greek mementos and art; the air, with Greek music and incense. Upon entering the theatre, the audience will see a Greek garden in which the pantomimists and dancers will perform. Afterwards, the players will join the audience for Greek refreshments.

The program will include "The Labyrinth" -- a Classical dance based on the myth of the Minotaur, "Matchmaker" -- a literary mime set in a house in Kos, 200 (more)

B.C., "Never on Sunday" -- a dance based on the theme from the movie, "The Manager on Trial" -- a literary mime set in a court in Kos before 226 B.C., "Calamatiano" -- a Greek dance, "The Schoolmaster" -- a literary mime set outside a grammar school in Alexandria, "Tsamiko" -- a Greek dance, "A Private Talk Between Friends" -- a literary mime set in a private house in Alexandria, "Syrtaki" -- a contemporary dance based on the theme from "Zorba the Greek," and "The Shoemaker" -- a literary mime set in a shoe store in Alexandria.

The location is a Greek garden in Athens from the Second Century B.C. to the present.

The word "mime" comes from the Greek for "to imitate" and orginally meant a literal imitation, a specialty of some of the casual performers in the market places of the ancient world — wandering acrobats, jugglers, and the like. Their status was hardly above that of beggars, and their living was extremely precarious.

Ancient Greece had two types of pantomime. "Popular mime" included short playlets, mimetic dances, acrobatics, juggling, and other types of wordless performances. "Literary mime" was short and provided relatively subtle and realistic presentations of scenes from daily life. These had dialogue and were strongly influenced by mythological burlesque.

Herondas (300-250 B.C.), is a Greek dramatist from Alexandria. His literary mimes were discovered in some Egyptian papers in 1891 and were first translated in 1922. The mimes represent vividly, and with some coarseness, scenes from ordinary life. One actor performed all the roles in these raucous, broad, and hilarious comedies comparable to today's "street theatre."

The dances will be performed by a group of young dancers from Saints Constantine and Helen Greek Orthodox Church. Under the direction of Amphitrite Manuel, with the assistance of Linda Parrous, they perform, in costume, dances from the ancient as well as the contemporary world.
