CIRCUIT PLAYERS TO PRESENT MORALITY PLAY

FAYETTEVILLE, NC -- The Methodist College Circuit Players will present "The Exorcism of Pride," a 30-minute morality play, Sunday Mar. 15 at 11 a.m. in Hensdale Chapel. The public is invited.

The play takes place in a modern health club and features Richard Lane as Gabriel, Kelly Dickerson as Faith, Rob Metzger as Man, Fran Mizell as Grace, Charles Passacantando as Hell, and Leslie Hendricks as Pride.

"The Exorcism of Pride" dramatizes the conflict between Pride and Grace for man's soul, with Gabriel as referee. The "good news" is that Grace wins the conflict, sending Pride and Hell into exile and enabling man to live with Faith and Grace in his Christian life.

The play tells us that grace cannot be confined to the reach of man's own efforts or to the instrumentalities and channels of any church. Grace is at work in the world in places that are not ecclesiastical and in ways that do not appear religious.

**METHODIST TO HOST N.C. CHEERLEADING CHAMPIONSHIPS**

FAYETTEVILLE, NC -- Methodist College will host the first annual North Carolina State Cheerleading Championships Saturday, Mar. 14.

Approximately 48 high school cheerleading squads will be competing for top ranking in their school's athletic classification--4-A, 3-A, 2-A, 1-A, Coed, or Independent. Sponsored by the North Carolina Cheerleading Coaches' Association, the state championships are designed to give high school cheerleaders the same opportunity to compete for a state championship title as all other high school athletes.

Each cheerleading squad will perform a five-minute routine before a panel of six out-of-state judges. They will be judged on execution, creativity, level of difficulty, showmanship, and voice projection. Trophies will be awarded to the top three squads in each division and squads will be ranked within each classification.

The North Carolina State Cheerleading Championships will be held from 9 a.m.-4 p.m. in Reeves Auditorium. The event is open to the public. Admission is \$3 for adults and \$2 for students.

PAUL GREEN'S CELEBRATION OF MAN

FAYETTEVILLE, NC -- "Paul Green's Celebration of Man" is the subject of the Southern Writers' Symposium scheduled for Mar. 27-28 at Methodist College.

A special feature of the 1987 symposium is the premiere of an original play about the Pulitzer Prize-winning playwright entitled "Listen to My Song." Written and directed by Lee Yopp, artistic director of the Fort Bragg Playhouse, the play will star Leonard McLeod as Paul Green. The play will be staged Saturday, Mar. 28 at 8:15 p.m. in Reeves Auditorium.

Yopp, 58, is no stranger to Green's work. When the Paul Green Theatre opened on the UNC-Chapel Hill campus, Yopp directed the opening play, "Native Son," at Green's invitation. In 1981, Yopp directed a Fort Bragg Playhouse production of Green's play, "Hymn to the Rising Sun."

A native of Trenton, NJ, Yopp headed the drama department at Rider College and served as artistic director at the Bucks County Playhouse in Pennsylvania before coming to Fort Bragg in 1974. Supported by a grant from the Paul Green Foundation, Yopp took a leave of absence from his Fort Bragg post to write the play about Green.

Paul Green is considered the "father of symphonic drama" in America. From 1931-1978, he produced 15 symphonic dramas, six of which will be staged during the 1987 summer season. The dramas still in production include: The Lost Colony-Manteo, NC (celebrating its 50th anniversary this summer), Cross and Sword-St. Augustine, FL, The Stephen Foster Story-Bardstown, KY, Texas-Canyon, TX, Trumpet in the Land-Dover, OH, and The Lone Star-Galveston, TX.

"Paul Green's Celebration of Man" will include lectures by 12 guest scholars who either knew Green or have studied his work, three films, special music from Green's symphonic dramas (presented by the college chorus), and the premiere of Yopp's play. Scholars and friends slated to speak about Green include: Sue L. Kimball, Janet Green Catlin, Rhoda Wynn, Frances R. Kestler, Paul Wilson, John Ehle, Shelby Stephenson, Laurence G. Avery, Glenda E. Gill, Ed Devaney, Rev. W.W. Finlator, and Lynn Veach Sadler. The NC Dept. of Public Instruction will award one renewal credit to teachers who complete the symposium.

Persons wishing to attend "Paul Green's Celebration of Man" may register in advance, or Friday, Mar. 27 between 8:30 and 9:30 a.m. in the lobby of Reeves Auditorium on the Methodist campus. Lunch and dinner Friday, as well as breakfast and lunch Saturday, will be served on the college campus at prices ranging from \$5-\$6. A special dinner is planned for Saturday evening at the Fayetteville Country Club (formerly Green Valley). Accommodations are available on campus Thursday-Saturday at a cost of \$7.50 per night.

The Paul Green symposium and play were made possible by grants from the Grassroots Fund of the Arts Council of Fayetteville/Cumberland County, the NC Humanities Committee, the Broyhill Foundation, the Adele M. Thomas Trust, Methodist College, and the Paul Green Foundation.

BB&T PLEDGES \$25,000 TO METHODIST COLLEGE

FAYETTEVILLE, N.C.--Branch Banking and Trust Co. has pledged \$25,000 to the Methodist College "Come of Age" campaign to build a Physical Activities Center.

Al Beard, BB&T's city executive in Fayetteville, presented the bank's first installment to College President Elton Hendricks during Loyalty Fund Week.

College Vice President for Development Gene Clayton said BB&T'S gift is "one of the largest corporate donations" received to date. As of March 18, 50 corporations had pledged a total of \$254,000 to the campaign.

Six months into the capital campaign, Methodist College has received gifts and pledges of \$2,341,839 toward a goal of \$3.5 million. In addition to \$254,000 from the corporate sector, the college has received gifts and pledges of \$1,861,000 from the college trustees, \$112,000 from alumni, and \$112,000 from faculty, staff, and friends.

Over a three-year period, the Methodist College Foundation is seeking to raise \$2 million from the college trustees, \$300,000 from alumni, \$700,000 from the Fayetteville community, and \$500,000 from national foundations.

Methodist's Physical Activities Center is being designed by Hayes, Howell & Associates of Southern Pines. It will house a 1,000-seat basketball arena, swimming pool, racquetball and handball courts, weight rooms, classrooms, and administrative offices. The new facility will replace a metal building which has been used as a temporary gymnasium since 1963.
