ENROLLMENT INCREASES AT METHODIST COLLEGE

FAYETTEVILLE, NC -- Methodist College has enrolled 1,438 students for the fall semester, an increase of 4.6 percent over last fall's 1,375.

A 73 percent increase in Evening College enrollment more than offset a 19 percent decrease in the day program. Evening registration totalled 608, compared to 830 for the day program. Last fall, the college enrolled 1,025 day students and 350 evening students.

A total of 359 students are living in the residence halls, four more than last year.

"We are delighted that Methodist College has, for the fifth year in a row, experienced an increase in enrollment," said Dr. Elton Hendricks, college president. "I think the visibility and reputation of Methodist College in and beyond North Carolina continues to increase," he added.

Methodist enrolled 304 new students this fall, representing 25 states and three foreign countries. Sixty-four of these students received academic scholarships.

LECTURE-RECITAL SLATED AT METHODIST

FAYETTEVILLE, NC-- The Methodist College Music Department will present a free lecture-recital entitled "Music and Shakespeare" Tuesday, Sept. 22 at 8 p.m. in Reeves Auditorium. The featured performers will be Alan Porter, tenor, and Jane Weeks, pianist.

Porter is chairman of the Methodist College Music Department and director of the college chorus. An honors graduate of the University of Illinois, he has sung and directed musical productions throughout the Fayetteville area. He also directs the choir at Hay Street United Methodist Church.

Ms. Weeks, assistant professor of music at Methodist, teaches piano and basic musicianship. A Fayetteville native, she attended Salem College and the New England Conservatory. Since joining the MC music faculty in September, 1981, she has taught piano, directed the community music program, and served as staff accompanist.

The musical program is designed to last approximately one hour and includes music by Purcell, Haydn, Schubert, and five other composers who were inspired by Shakespeare's work.

Porter and Weeks will be assisted by Dr. Robert Downing, trumpeteer; and Janice Trudel, flutist.

ELDERHOSTEL SLATED FOR NEXT WEEK AT METHODIST COLLEGE

FAYETTEVILLE, NC -- Methodist College will open its first Elderhostel Sunday, Sept. 20, launching a week of courses, tours, and social activities for 27 senior citizens.

Elderhostel is a national educational program for adults age 60 and over. Participants spend a week on a college campus taking mini-courses and socializing with other senior citizens. Brochures describing the programs offered at participating colleges (there are 19 in N. C. alone) are distributed nationwide by the national Elderhostel office in Boston, MA.

Project Directors Elaine Porter and Walt Swing report that 27 persons are registered for the week-long event at Methodist. They include: couples from North Carolina, Maryland, Georgia, Florida, Virginia, and Kentucky; single individuals from Wisconsin, Texas, Kansas, and Massachusetts; and five commuters from the local area.

Program participants will take courses in psychology, sociology, and biology during the morning hours. Special evening activities include a reception Sunday at President Hendricks' home, a lecture/recital Tuesday ("Music and Shakespeare" with Alan Porter and Jane Weeks), a talent night with group singing (featuring a barbershop quartet from the college chorus) Wednesday, and a dinner party Thursday.

The Elderhostel participants will take afternoon field trips to the Museum of the Cape Fear, historic Fayetteville, the Fayetteville Museum of Art, and Fort Bragg.

METHODIST COLLEGE TO PRESENT MEDIEVAL COMEDY

FAYETTEVILLE, NC -- The Methodist College Theatre Department will present "Ralph Roister Doister," a medieval English comedy, Friday, Oct. 9 at 7 p.m. and Saturday, Oct. 10 at 9:30 a.m. and 5:30 p.m. in the Student Union Snack Bar. Admission is free.

Slated as part of Methodist's Homecoming Weekend, the play will be done as a "popcorn theatre," with Shakers and Movers (Student Entertainment Committee) serving free popcorn. ENROLLMENT INCREASES AT METHODIST COLLEGE

FAYEFTEVILLE, NC -- Enrollment at Methodist College has increased to 1,375 students for the fall 1986 semester compared to 1,226 students enrolled at the college this time last year.

Enrollment is up in the day program, evening program and in the residence halls.

The total enrollment increase is percent. The day program has increased from 942 to 1,025, an eight percent gain, and the evening program has increased from 284 to 350, a 23 percent increase.

The number of students living in the residence halls has also increased. There are now 355 students living on campus compared to 315 last fall, a 12 percent increase.

Dr. M. Elton Hendricks, president of Methodist, attributes the increases to expanded academic and athletic programs, better student life programs, an active admissions staff, and better advising and counseling systems.

"Overall, the day enrollment at Methodist has increased 60 percent in the last 39 three years," said Hendricks. "We have gone from 632 students to 1,025. Of these 400 students, 200 are military students, 100 are residential and 100 are non-traditional students."

Hendricks also noted that some of the increases can be attributed to expanded programs in the new Charles M. Reeves School of Business and the bachelor of science in nursing degree completion program.
