



METHODIST TO CELEBRATE HOMECOMING

FAYETTEVILLE, NC -- Methodist College will employ a "South Seas Weekend" theme for Homecoming '87, Oct. 9-11.

At least two dozen events are planned for returning alumni. The following reunion classes will be honored at Saturday's homecoming parade and luau: Class of '67 (20th year), Class of '72 (15th year), Class of '77 (10th year), and Class of '82 (5th year). The Methodist College Alumni Association's Finance Committee and Board of Directors will meet Saturday afternoon.

Current students at Methodist will be actively involved in the three-day celebration. They will decorate the residence halls, elect a homecoming queen, stage a bonfire/pep rally, cheer on the Monarch soccer teams as the men face USC-Aiken and the women face Erskine, and attend their first semi-formal dance of the school year.

Groups slated to entertain alumni during the weekend include: the cheerleaders, the jazz dance team, the theatre department, the stage band, and the college chorus. At least 14 hours of activities are planned for Saturday: two popcorn theatre presentations of "Ralph Roister Doister" (a medieval comedy), a sidewalk carnival, a tennis tournament (men's singles, women's singles, mixed doubles), an invitational track meet, a volleyball game, two varsity soccer games, the alumni luau, and the homecoming dance.

On Sunday, Rev. Mike Safley ('72) will speak at the 11 a.m. worship service in Hensdale Chapel. A brass ensemble will provide special music. The annual alumni baseball game between alumni and varsity is slated for 2 p.m. Sunday at Shelley Field.

In the event of rain, most activities will be moved into the Student Union.

FAYETTEVILLE, NC -- The Cape Fear River Research Institute will hold its 14th annual meeting Thursday, Oct. 29 in the main dining room of the Methodist College cafeteria, located on the lower level of the Student Union.

A symposium is slated for 5 p.m., followed by a banquet at 6 p.m. and the keynote address at 7 p.m. John D. Wray, deputy director of the N. C. Division of Water Resources, will deliver the keynote address at the banquet. His topic will be: "Drought—How North Carolina Will Cope". A question/answer session will follow.

The following panelists will discuss water conservation measures during the 5 p.m. symposium: A. T. Rolan, director, Dept. of Water Resources for the City of Durham; Everett Billingsley, executive director, Orange Water and Sewer Authority in Carrboro; Theresa G. Pereira, environmental compliance specialist with the Fayetteville Public Works Commission; and Kenneth Fanfoni, director, Water and Sewer Utility, Fayetteville Public Works Commission.



Fayetteville, NC--A special subcommittee of the Methodist College Board of Trustees has selected Player, Inc. of Fayetteville to build the proposed Physical Activities Center.

Gene Clayton, vice-president for development at Methodist, said the Player firm was one of eight general contractors that made presentations to a trustees' subcommittee Oct. 1.
