

The 17-member Methodist College Cheerleading Team finished fourth among eight teams competing in the small college division.


Mathieu is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert R. Mathieu of 25 Rachel Blvd., Lewiston.

METHODIST CHEERLEADERS FINISH FOURTH IN NATIONAL COMPETITION (FOLLOW-UP TO RELEASE OF DECEMBER 30, 1987)

FAYETTEVILLE, NC--The Methodist College Cheerleading Team finished fourth among nine small college teams competing in the National Cheerleading Association Championship Jan. 3 in Dallas, TX.

Rose State Junior College from Midwest City, OK won the Division II championship. Trinity Valley College (Texas) finished second, and Abilene Christian University (Texas) finished third. Cheerleading squads from nine colleges were invited to compete in Division II, based on videotapes they submitted.

Monarch Cheerleading Coach Gwen Sykes said her team scored highest in the spirit and enthusiasm category and in dance. The Methodist squad scored second in creative choreography.

Director of Student Activities Chris Ryan, who accompanied the team to Dallas, said the Monarchs received a thunderous ovation from the audience at the Dallas Convention Center as they ended their three-minute routine by dancing to "Good Golly, Miss Molly."

Noting that 10 members of her 17-member squad are freshmen, Coach Sykes said she was very pleased with the group's showing. The latest accomplishment means the Monarchs have achieved the highest ranking of any NCAA Division III cheerleading squad in the nation for three consecutive years.




ELIZABETH DOLE TO MAKE CAMPAIGN APPEARANCE AT METHODIST

FAYETTEVILLE, NC--Elizabeth Hanford Dole, wife of Republican presidential candidate Robert Dole, will make a campaign stop at Methodist College Monday, January 18. She is expected to urge Cumberland County and North Carolina Republicans to vote for her husband in the Republican presidential primary March 8.

Marion Browning-Baker, Fort Bragg coordinator of the Dole for President Campaign, said Mrs. Dole is scheduled to arrive at the Student Union around 2:50 p.m., make a brief speech, and answer questions from faculty, students, members of the news media, and other interested citizens. She will depart campus at approximately 3:40 p.m. for a Fayetteville reception sponsored by the Dole for President Committee in Cumberland County.

Mrs. Dole is a native of Salisbury, NC and a 1959 graduate of Duke University. She has held several staff positions in the Reagan Administration. Last fall, she resigned her post as U.S. Secretary of Transportation to campaign for her husband.

Mrs. Browning-Baker said her committee will bring county registrars along to register any Methodist College student or staff member not yet qualified to vote in North Carolina's Super Tuesday presidential primary. She said Mrs. Dole was invited to speak to the Fort Bragg Officers' Wives Club, but that "the post commander said 'No' to her appearance," prompting the Fort Bragg coordinator to ask Methodist College to give Mrs. Dole a forum.

FAYETTEVILLE, NC--Methodist College will host a free lecture series on three nineteenth-century North Carolina novels Feb. 1, 8, and 15 at 7:30 p.m. in Hensdale Chapel.

STATEWIDE STUDENT FINANCIAL AID AWARENESS WEEK PROCLAIMED BY GOVERNOR MARTIN

Student Financial Aid: what it involves and how to get it to help meet college expenses will be the subject of a statewide consumer information effort by the North Carolina Financial Aid Administrators during the week of January 25, 1988, through January 29, 1988. In proclaiming this week as "Student Financial Aid Awareness Week", Governor Martin recognized that, due to ever increasing educational and living expenses, more and more students are finding it necessary to seek student financial assistance to further their educations beyond the high school level.

The underlying theme in student aid, since its inception, has been that of assisting qualified students who have inadequate financial resources with aid so they may be able to attend the postsecondary educational institution of their choice. Because student financial aid programs and dollar amounts are ever-changing it is essential that prospective students and parents become aware of the funds for which they may be eligible.

Much media attention has been given to education as a national priority. With the increasing costs of postsecondary education, the need for student financial assistance to meet these costs has become vital to many students and parents.

The North Carolina Association of Student Financial Aid Administrators has made a commitment to provide to North Carolina students more comprehensive information on student financial aid resources available for the 1988-89 academic year. The purpose of the "Student Financial Aid Awareness Week" is to create awareness of the student financial aid programs that are available to students. Now, more than ever, it is imperative for students to understand student financial aid programs and institutional philosophies.

Students should begin the application process as soon as possible. Typical student financial aid application procedures include the filing of financial information with a recognized need analysis service(such as the American College Testing Program or the College Scholarship Service). Many institutions also require that students file an institutional application in addition to the need analysis documents. For a particular institution's application procedures, students should contact the Student Financial Aid Office at that school.

Information about financial assistance is available at local high schools and at the Student Financial Aid Offices in the colleges, universities, and technical/community colleges throughout the state. Individuals interested in obtaining more information about student financial assistance are encouraged to contact the Student Financial Aid Office at the postsecondary educational institution of their choice.


METHODIST RECEIVES GRANT FROM SEARS FOUNDATION

FAYETTEVILLE, NC--Methodist College has received a grant of \$600 from the Sears-Roebuck Foundation.

James Babb, manager of the Sears retail store at Cross Creek Mall, presented the gift to the college January 20. The Sears-Roebuck Foundation will distribute more than \$50,200 to 38 privately supported colleges and universities in North Carolina this year.

Nationally, the foundation will contribute \$1.75 million to 934 private accredited two and four-year institutions during the 1987-88 academic year. Funds may be used as the colleges and universities deem necessary.

In addition to its unrestricted grant program, the Sears-Roebuck Foundation each year conducts a variety of other programs in elementary, secondary, and higher education. Altogether, the foundation spent more than \$3.5 million in 1987 for its education activities.

Methodist College Athletic Director Tom Austin said Methodist will likely play an eight-game schedule during the initial 1989-90 season. NCAA Division III members who have agreed to play Methodist include: Hampden-Sydney College, Randolph Macon College, Ferrum College, Frostburg State College (Md.), Newport News Apprentice School, and Wesley College (Delaware). Other opponents may include: Guilford College, Tennessee Wesleyan College, and St. Paul's College (Lawrenceville, Va.).

Methodist College currently offers 15 intercollegiate sports and will add a 16th--field hockey--next year. A liberal arts college with a fulltime enrollment of 1,100 students, Methodist has enjoyed considerable athletic success during the '80's in baseball, women's golf, women's soccer, and men's and women's track.
