REYNOLDS PRICE IS SUBJECT OF SOUTHERN WRITERS' SYMPOSIUM

FAYETTEVILLE, NC--Methodist College's seventh annual Southern Writers' Symposium, slated for April 15-16, will examine the works of North Carolina novelist, poet, and playwright Reynolds Price.

Entitled "Reynolds Price: From A Long and Happy Life to Good Hearts," the symposium will feature panel discussions, lectures by scholars and close friends of Price, a formal dinner, and a Cape Fear Regional Theatre presentation of Private Contentment, a Reynolds Price play.

Sue Laslie Kimball, Professor of English at Methodist, is organizing and coordinating the symposium. Lecturers will include: William S. Price, Director of the N. C. Dept. of Archives and History (and Mr. Price's brother); Frances Kestler of St. John's University; William N. Claxon, Jr. of the University of South Carolina at Aiken; Bes Spangler of Peace College; Jane Cherry of Fayetteville; Daphne Athas of UNC-Chapel Hill; Wallace Kaufman of Pittsboro; Michael Kreyling of Vanderbilt University; and two Methodist College staff members--Dr. Sue Kimball and Dr. Lynn Veach Sadler, Vice President for Academic Affairs.

Born in Macon, NC (Warren County) in 1933, Price became obsessed with poetry and fiction in his early teens. Although his family moved 13 times in 14 years, many of his childhood teachers encouraged him to read and to develop his writing talent. He began writing fiction and poetry at the age of 14.

Price attended Duke University and Merton College, Oxford, where he was exposed to the classics in literature and to world-famous teachers and writers. He began teaching at Duke in 1958 and continued for 30 years, attaining the rank of James B. Duke Professor of English. During this entire period, he has lived in rural Orange County.

In 1984, Price developed an astrocytoma in his spinal cord and became a paraplegic. Undaunted, he has continued to teach at Duke and has written two novels (Kate Vaiden and Good Hearts), a collection of poems, a collection of

essays, and a trilogy of plays. Fifty copies of his soon-to-be released novel, Good Hearts, will be sold at Methodist during the symposium. Price has indicated he will attend one of the performances of his play, Private Contentment.

The Reynolds Price Symposium is open to the public. There is a \$10 registration fee. Admission to the play is free for symposium registrants; for others the cost is \$6 per person.

Five meals will be served during the symposium, at costs ranging from \$5 for breakfast to \$15 for a formal dinner at the Fayetteville Country Club. Persons planning to dine with those attending the symposium must register in advance with Dr. Sue Kimball at Methodist.

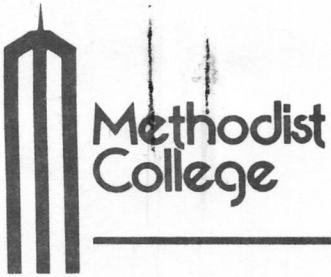

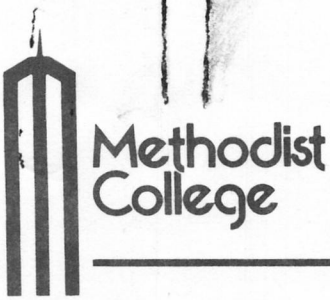

GOOD FRIDAY SERVICE TO INCLUDE FAURÉ REQUIEM

FAYETTEVILLE, NC--A community choir and orchestra will perform Gabriel Fauré's Requiem as part of a Good Friday Service April 1 at Methodist College. Scheduled for 8 p.m. in Hensdale Chapel, the service is open to the public.

Richard Butler, Jr., a senior music major from Fayetteville, will conduct the Requiem. The performance marks the culmination of Butler's research project on the French composer Gabriel Fauré. The project was supported by a grant from Phi Sigma Iota, a national foreign language honor society.

The Requiem will be performed by an eight-member orchestra, a 15-member choir, and Paul Tamblyn at the pipe organ. Written for the Requiem Mass, Fauré's musical composition reflects his acceptance of death as a "happy deliverance." Butler worked with Rev. William Green, the campus minister, to develop an appropriate liturgy for the service, which will include scripture readings and responsive readings between the seven movements of the Requiem.

METHODIST TO HOST N.C. CHEERLEADING CHAMPIONSHIPS

FAYETTEVILLE, NC--Methodist College will host the second annual North Carolina State Cheerleading Championships Saturday, March 26.

Forty-three (43) high school cheerleading squads will be competing for top ranking in their school's athletic classification--4A, 3A, 2A, 1A-Independent, or Coed. Sponsored by the North Carolina Cheerleading Coaches' Association, the state championships are designed to give high school cheerleaders the opportunity to compete for a state championship title, like other high school athletes.

Each cheerleading squad will perform a five-minute routine before a panel of six out-of-state judges. Squads will be judged on technique, creativity, crowd appeal, voice projection, and precision. Trophies will be awarded to the top three squads in each division--a champion and two runners-up. Squads will be ranked within each classification, based on the scores received.

A new feature of this year's championships is the selection of All-Star Cheerleading Teams. Working in conjunction with the North Carolina High School Athletic Association, the cheerleading coaches association selected two 12-member all-star teams, one from eastern North Carolina and one from western North Carolina. Selections were based on videotaped auditions.

The members of the All-Star Cheerleading Team/East and the All-Star Cheerleading Team/West will be announced Saturday afternoon. These teams will cheer at the East-West All-Star Basketball Game slated for July 28 in Greensboro.

The North Carolina State Cheerleading Championships will be held from 9 a.m.-4 p.m. in Reeves Auditorium. The event is open to the public. Admission is \$3 for adults and \$2 for students.

FAYETTEVILLE, NC--The Center for Entrepreneurship at Methodist College is now accepting nominations for two new awards to be given at its seventh annual Stock Market Symposium ^{Tuesday} Monday, April 18.

An "Outstanding Woman Entrepreneur of the Year" award will be made to a North Carolina resident who owns, has established, or manages a small business. The Award Committee will consider the individual's creativeness, innovativeness, and personal contributions to and involvement with the community.

A "Small Business Excellence Award" will be made to an outstanding small business employing fewer than 500 persons with annual revenues of less than \$15 million. The Silver Spoon Award, traditionally given at the Stock Market Symposium, will be continued. This award is given to a person who, "though not born with the proverbial silver spoon in his/her mouth, has originated and built a successful business recognized for its uniqueness in planning, production, or some other aspect of its operation."

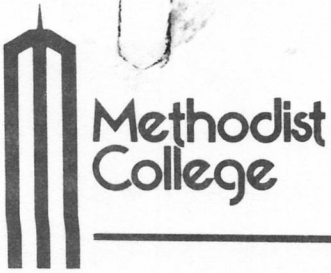

METHODIST COLLEGE ANNOUNCES PLANS FOR SUMMER SEMESTER

FAYETTEVILLE, NC--Registration will begin April 18 for the summer semester at Methodist College. A total of 106 courses will be offered during five different terms at Methodist.

Daytime courses will be offered during three different terms--Term I: May 10-June 15; Term II: June 21-July 20; and Term III: July 21-Aug. 18. Classes will meet every weekday during each term.

The Evening College will offer two terms: Term IV: May 2-June 25; and Term V: July 5-Aug. 27. In addition, a special term is slated for May 31-July 30 at Pope Air Force Base. (Course offerings for the Pope Air Force Base term will be announced later.) Evening classes meet either Monday, Wednesday, and Friday OR Tuesday and Thursday of each week.

Tuition rates for the summer semester are \$85 per semester hour for daytime courses and \$70 per semester hour for evening courses. Tuition is free for senior citizens age 65 and older.

Registration for all classes opens two weeks prior to the beginning of each term. Registration will be held Monday-Friday from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m. in the Registrar's Office (Horner Administration Building) at Methodist, at the Army University Center at Fort Bragg, and at the Education Center at Pope Air Force Base. In addition, evening students may register from 5 p.m. until 8 p.m. weekdays at the Evening College office in the Trustees Building on the Methodist campus.

Summer schedules and registration forms are available in the Registrar's Office, Horner Administration Building, and will be mailed upon request. The college reserves the right to cancel scheduled classes for which there is insufficient enrollment.
