

METHODIST COLLEGE TO HONOR REYNOLDS PRICE APRIL 15-16

FAYETTEVILLE, NC--With a little help from his friends, Methodist College will honor North Carolina novelist, poet, essayist, and playwright Reynolds Price April 15-16.

Dr. Sue Laslie Kimball, Professor of English at Methodist and organizer of the college's seventh annual Southern Writers' Symposium, promises a memorable and enlightening look at the life, times, and work of the Warren County native. "Reynolds is now at the peak of his career," notes Dr. Kimball, "having produced some of his best work in the last three years."

Entitled "Reynolds Price: From A Long and Happy Life to Good Hearts," the symposium will feature panel discussions, lectures by scholars and close friends of Price, a formal dinner, and two Cape Fear Regional Theatre performances of Private Contentment, a Reynolds Price play.

Lecturers scheduled to speak about Price and his work include: William S. Price, director of the N. C. Dept. of Archives & History and brother of Mr. Price; Frances Kestler of St. John's University; William N. Claxon, Jr. of the University of South Carolina at Aiken; Bes Spangler of Peace College; Jane Cherry of Fayetteville; Daphne Athas of UNC-Chapel Hill; Wallace Kaufman of Pittsboro; Daniel F. Daniel of Southwestern College; Mara McFadden of the Georgia Institute of Technology; Michael Kreyling of Vanderbilt University; and Frank Shelton of Limestone College.

Price wrote Private Contentment in 1981 as a 90-minute play for WNET-Channel 13 , New York. Filmed in South Carolina, the play was first presented on PBS' "American Playhouse" April 27, 1982. Lee Yopp, veteran director of the Fort Bragg Playhouse, will direct the Cape Fear Regional Theatre production of the play. Last year, Yopp wrote and directed "Listen to My Song," a tribute to Paul Green which premiered at Methodist and played later at the ArtsCenter in Carrboro.

The setting for Private Contentment is eastern North Carolina in March,

1945. Logan Melton, a 20-year-old Army lieutenant, returns home for his mother's funeral to discover that his father Paul, a 45-year-old piano salesman, has lived a double life for 17 years. After the funeral, Paul Melton introduces his son to Lena Brock, the elementary school music teacher who has been his mistress, and to Gail, their 15-year-old daughter. While Logan has mixed feelings about his father's "private contentment," he is immediately drawn to Lena and Gail.

Director Yopp has met twice with Reynolds Price to discuss how to adapt the film script to the stage, Price's view of the characters in the play, and the interpretation of key dramatic scenes. "I want the play to say what he wants it to say," said Yopp.

Yopp's cast for <u>Private Contentment</u> includes some well-known regional actors with impressive credits. Leonard McLeod, the man who played Paul Green last year, is Paul Melton. Veteran actress and CFRT director Bo Thorp will play Lena Brock, Paul's mistress. Michael Brocki, who played Stanly in CFRT's <u>Brighton Beach Memoirs</u> last season, is Logan Melton. Margaret Jemison, a recent graduate of UNC-Chapel Hill, plays Gail Brock, Paul and Lena's daughter.

Yopp is no stranger to Price's work, having read his first novel, A Long and Happy Life, and Early Dark, a play based on that novel. Of Private Contentment, Yopp says, "I think the spirit and style are representative of his work. He's writing about North Carolina and the people he knows. This is a strong piece that examines complex family relationships."

Because <u>Private Contentment</u> is not structured like a play, Yopp says it presents special challenges. "It consists of 23 short scenes," he explains. "Many scenes are subject to varying interpretations. The play has a very unorthodox ending, in which Logan Melton plays Chopin's "Prelude in D Flat" for four minutes, while the other characters are frozen in position."

Aside from the stage debut of <u>Private Contentment</u>, the Reynold Price Symposium will include a number of other firsts: the presence of <u>Price himself</u> (as a spectator on Saturday), the pre-publication release of <u>Good Hearts</u> (Price's latest novel)*, and a Friday evening dinner appearance by the Regiment Band of the 11th North Carolina Troops (1st N.C. Vols.).

Despite his three-year battle with cancer and paraplegia, Reynolds Price has produced a wealth of material during this period: two novels (<u>Kate Vaiden</u>

and Good Hearts), a collection of poems (The Laws of Ice), a collection of essays (A Common Room), and a trilogy of plays called New Music. During a time of prodigious writing and much pain and suffering, Price has earned national and international acclaim and has become a literary giant. Kate

Vaiden received the National Book Critics Circle Award for fiction in 1986.

In 1987, Price received the Distinguished Alumni Award from Duke University.

In May, he will be inducted into the Academy and Institute of Arts and Letters.

* In <u>Good Hearts</u>, Price brings Wesley Beavers and Rosacoke Mustian, the characters of his first novel, forward in time to "the near destruction but rescue of a marriage." The novel opens with Wesley walking out on his wife of 28 years. Soon thereafter, Rosa is raped by an intruder in her own bed. A painful reconciliation follows between Wesley and Rosa. <u>Good Hearts</u> is a Literary Guild Main Selection for May.

METHODIST COLLEGE ANNOUNCES SCHOLARSHIP WINNERS

FAYETTEVILLE, NC--Methodist College has awarded \$681,664 in academic scholarships to 193 applicants for the 1988-89 freshman class.

Director of Admissions Fiore Bergamasco said 21 students were awarded Honors Scholarships worth \$7,100--full tuition and room--based on outstanding achievements in high school. These students are ranked in the top 15 percent of their high school class and have scored 1,200 or better on the Scholastic Aptitude Test.

Twenty-nine students received Honors Scholarships worth \$6,150 each (full tuition), while 22 students qualified for Honors Scholarships worth \$4,612 each (three-fourths tuition). Another 121 students received Incentive Scholarships in amounts ranging from \$550-\$4,700, depending on their class rank and SAT score. Thirty-eight of the 193 scholarship winners are residents of the Fayetteville/Cape Fear region.

Methodist's Honors and Incentive scholarship programs are funded entirely by the college, largely from endowment earnings. Other college-funded scholarships include Transfer Scholarships (to those transferring from two-year institutions with a GPA of 3.2 or better), Greatest Gift Scholarships (onefourth or one-eighth tuition for those recommended by MC alumni), General Scholarships (based primarily on high school GPA), Music Performance Scholarships, Military Achievement Scholarships, Drama Scholarships, and Art Scholarships.

METHODIST COLLEGE SCHOLARSHIPS

The college expects to award another \$500,000 in scholarships funded from outside sources. Included in this category are endowed scholarships totalling \$175,000 and N. C. Contractual Scholarships (for needy North Carolina residents) amounting to \$325,000.

While scholarships are the cornerstone of most financial aid packages, grants, loans, and campus employment are often included. North Carolina residents and active duty military personnel (and dependents) stationed here automatically qualify for N. C. Legislative Tuition Grants worth \$1,100 during 1988-89.

During the current academic year, Methodist College awarded \$1.4 million in scholarships, \$705,134 in federal grants and loans, \$808,692 in N. C. Legislative Tuition Grants, and \$285,900 in N. C. Contractual Scholarships.

METHODIST TO HOST CONTEST FOR LOCAL FOREIGN LANGUAGE STUDENTS

FAYETTEVILLE, NC--The Department of Foreign Languages at Methodist College and the Cumberland County Schools will conduct a Poetry Declamation Contest Saturday, April 23 from 8 a.m.-1:30 p.m. at the college.

More than 200 students of French, German, Latin, and Spanish will compete, each one reciting a required poem appropriate for his level of study and a second of his own choosing. Contestants will be judged on pronunciation, fluency, and interpretation by a teacher of that language and a native speaker from the community. Native speakers of the particular language will compete in a special category.

Junior and senior high school students will compete in separate contests. Prizes will be awarded for the highest number of points earned in each language at each level and for the school which earns the most points overall in each language. The public is invited to the awards ceremony, which will be held at 1 p.m. in the Science Building Auditorium.

This is the first year that such a contest has been held in Cumberland County. The event is modeled after a poetry contest held in Durham and Wake counties last year, an event sponsored by the Wake County Collaborative (a group of foreign language teachers).

The Cumberland County Second Languages Council joined with Methodist College in May, 1987 to become a collaborative under the auspices of Academic Alliances. This is the first countywide project to be undertaken by the group and coincides with the recently designated "Cumberland County Schools Second Language Week" by the Hon. J. L. Dawkins, mayor of Fayetteville.

METHODIST COLLEGE CHORUS TO GIVE CONCERT

FAYETTEVILLE, NC--The Methodist College Chorus, under the direction of Alan M. Porter, will present its annual spring concert April 26 at 8 p.m. in Reeves Auditorium. Admission is free.

The concert will open with the "Symphony of Psalms" by Igor Stravinsky, a major work in three movements for mixed chorus and orchestra. The chorus performed this work for the first time in February, during a concert tour of Charleston, SC. This will mark the first performance of the Stravinsky work in the Fayetteville area.

Stravinsky is considered by many to be the greatest composer of the 20th century. He wrote the "Symphony of Psalms" in 1930, choosing Psalm texts to express his praise of God. The music has a certain mystical quality that makes it appealing to contemporary audiences.

The chorus will end the program with anthems from various periods, including G. F. Handel's "Blessed Be God," Vaughan Williams' "O How Amiable", and Randall Thompson's "The Best of Rooms." Four student conductors will be featured--Suzie Hager, Meta Mercer, Sheri Shelby, and Valerie Morris.

A portion of the program will be presented by the honors ensemble, The Rainbow's End.




