

RESTORED MALLETT-ROGERS HOUSE TO BE DEDICATED MAY 15

FAYETTEVILLE, NC--Methodist College and the Florence Rogers Charitable
Trust will dedicate the restored Mallett-Rogers House Sunday, May 15 at
5 p.m. The public is invited.

Now located on the southern edge of the campus near O'Hanlon Amphitheatre, the Mallett-Rogers House has undergone a two-year, \$150,000 renovation and will now serve as an art gallery. Paintings will be displayed on the first floor, sculpture on the second.

Dr. William C. Fields, portrait painter and amateur historian, will open the Invitational Exhibition of North Carolina Artists—the inaugural exhibit in the new gallery. A reception and tour will follow from 5:30-7:00 p.m.

Cumberland County's oldest house was donated to the college in 1985 by
the Florence Rogers Charitable Trust. The trust had the structure moved to
the campus in February, 1986, from a site off Stamper Road near Eutaw Village
Shopping Center. The college and the trust have jointly financed the restoration.

Built by James Council in 1735, the house was originally located off Gillespie Street, on property now occupied by the N. C. Dept. of Transportation. In 1778, Council sold the house to cotton manufacturer Charles Peter Mallett. In 1830, Charles Beatty Mallett (Peter's son) moved the house to Eutaw Springs.

The Mallett-Rogers House has two components—a one—and—a-half story structure which will serve as the gallery, and a small two—room cottage which is located to the rear of the main structure. The small cottage, which


MALLETT-ROGERS HOUSE DEDICATION

was attached to the side of the main structure at the Eutaw site, is now attached by steps and a small stoop to the back porch of the main house. The college news bureau will be housed on the first floor of the cottage, which has been equipped with a small restroom and galley kitchen.

In the new configuration, the Mallett-Rogers House retains all of its original architectural features, including full-width porches, wide pine flooring, and four working fireplaces with hand-carved mantels. Brick walks have been laid in the front and along the south side--areas that are now being professionally landscaped. A wooden ramp will give handicapped persons access to the restroom in the cottage.

METHODIST TO HOST NATIONAL CHEERLEADING COACHES CONFERENCE

FAYETTEVILLE, NC--Cheerleading coaches from 41 states across the nation, as well as Canada, will attend the second annual National Cheerleading Coaches Conference May 12-15 at Methodist College.

More than 200 persons are registered for the three-day national conference, which will feature over 37 instructional sessions for the college/university coach, the high school coach, and the junior high school coach, as well as networking sessions and safety seminars.

Instructors for the National Cheerleading Coaches Conference include:

Cathy Buckey, cheerleading coach of the 1986 national champion N. C. State

University cheerleaders; Don Collins, cheerleading coach at UNC-Chapel Hill;

Gwen Sykes, coach of the 1988 top-ranked NCAA Division III cheerleading squad

at Methodist College; Lynda Chappell, cheerleading coach for the Kansas City

Chiefs; and Lisa Kubinski, cheerleading coach at St. Cloud State University

(MN) and a former Minnesota Vikings cheerleader.

Sykes, who also serves as executive coordinator of the conference, said the key issues to be addressed by the National Cheerleading Coaches Conference include the standardization of terminology and safety guidelines, the credibility of cheerleading as a sport, the need for a resurgence of spirit-promoting cheerleaders, and the prevention and treatment of cheerleading injuries.

"Coaches have always wanted to be better than they are, to increase both their knowledge and their expertise in coaching," added Sykes. "There just



METHODIST COLLEGE AWARDS 102 DEGREES AT 25TH SPRING COMMENCEMENT

FAYETTEVILLE, NC--Methodist College awarded 102 degrees to 99 students at its 25th spring commencement Sunday afternoon, May 8.

Brigadier General Stephen Silvasy, Jr., Deputy Commandant of the U.S. Army War College in Carlisle, PA and the father of a graduating senior, challenged members of the Class of '88 to "make things happen" and to "become history makers." He also stressed the importance of maintaining high standards of personal integrity and asking oneself "What is the right thing to do?"

Gen. Silvasy expressed his gratitude to the college faculty and staff for giving the graduating seniors the potential to make things happen. He concluded his address by suggesting that class members adopt three mottoes used by various military units—"Follow me. . .All the way. . .Let's go."

Rev. Helen Crotwell, Fayetteville District Superintendent, N. C. Conference of the United Methodist Church, delivered the baccalaureate sermon Sunday morning. She urged the candidates for graduation to beware of "wolves in sheep's clothing" and to adopt Christian values over worldly values.

Richard Butler, Jr. of Fayetteville, who graduated Summa Cum Laude with degrees in music and French, received the Lucius Stacy Weaver Award, given in honor of the college's first president. Butler was chosen by the faculty as the senior who best exemplified academic excellence, leadership ability, devotion to Christian ideals, and humanitarian service.

Fayetteville resident David Craig Melvin, who graduated Summa Cum Laude with a degree in biology and chemistry, finished first in the class with a perfect 4.0 (straight A) average. Two other students graduated Summa Cum Laude with grade point averages of 3.9 or higher, while eight made Magna Cum Laude (with 3.7 or higher), and 17 graduated Cum Laude (with 3.4 or higher).

College President Elton Hendricks conferred an honorary Doctor of Letters degree upon J. Roy Parker, Jr., editor of <u>The Fayetteville Times</u>. Parker was

cited for his editorial support of education, human rights, the arts, and the preservation of local history.

Three international students presented President Hendricks with the flags of their native countries, continuing a tradition begun in May, 1985. These gifts bring to 16 the number of flags in Methodist's international collection.

Five graduates of Methodist's ROTC program--John Pecoraro, Karen Grant, Gregory Creech, Angela Close, and Cynthia Clagett--took the Oath of Allegiance and were commissioned second lieutenants in the U.S. Army.



PIANO AND CHORAL MUSIC CAMP SLATED FOR METHODIST COLLEGE


FAYETTEVILLE, NC--Methodist College's second annual Piano and Choral Music Summer Camp will be held July 3-8, 1988.

May 14 at the N.C. State Twilight Meet (Raleigh, NC) with a new school


record time of 3:17.24. Their time is among the six fastest in the country
