METHODIST COLLEGE BEGINS 29th YEAR WITH RECORD ENROLLMENT

FAYETTEVILLE, NC--Methodist College enrolled a record 1,527 students for the fall semester, an increase of six percent over last year.

The college began its 29th academic year with 955 students in the day program and 572 students in the Evening College. The day enrollment increased 14.6 percent over Fall, 1987, while the evening enrollment declined six percent. A total of 441 students are living on campus, 23 percent more than last fall's 359.

The college enrolled 417 new freshmen and transfer students. Of that number, 157 are residential students and 260 are commuting students. The students represent 25 different states and five foreign countries.

Aside from more students, Methodist has recruited better students for 1988-89. The average SAT score for the freshman class is 907, up 70 points from last year. The college received a record 1,249 applications for the fall semester, up 35 percent from last year.

College President Elton Hendricks attributes this year's quantitative and qualitative gains to increased visibility for the college, a growing reputation for excellence, improved retention of students, and "hard work by the admissions staff and all who recruit for Methodist College."

At an opening dinner for college personnel Aug. 19, Dr. Hendricks said that 1988-89 will be remembered for a marked gain in residential enrollment, construction of a \$3.2 million Physical Activities Center (now under way),

and a self-study for reaffirmation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. He also expressed his pride in the college faculty and staff, saying he would be proud to entrust his own son or daughters to them.

The self-study to which Dr. Hendricks referred at the opening dinner is required every 10 years of SACS members. The Methodist faculty and staff began working on the new study in 1986. A committee of college educators will visit Methodist April 10-13, 1989 and then offer its recommendations to the college and the full association regarding reaffirmation of accreditation.

President Hendricks said the self-study "requires that we take a serious look at ourselves and evaluate our facilities, programs, and processes." He said an "outcomes assessment" approach is a new element in the self-study process, one that "requires measurement of the impact of what we do on students." He also noted that more attention is being given to long-range planning.

Dr. Garland Knott, chairman of the faculty Steering Committee for the self-study, said the process will help Methodist "become the best it can be." He also stated, "I'm very confident we will be reaffirmed (for SACS accreditation) and that we will benefit greatly from this study."

During an opening convocation Sept. 2, President Hendricks urged Methodist students to use their time in college to read, reflect, worship, and think about becoming better human beings.

METHODIST COLLEGE TO BREAK GROUND FOR PHYSICAL ACTIVITIES CENTER

FAYETTEVILLE, NC--Methodist College will hold a groundbreaking ceremony for its \$3.2 million Physical Activities Center Saturday, Oct. 8 at 1 p.m. The public is invited.

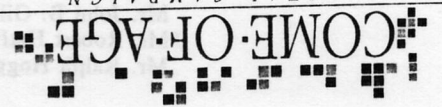
The groundbreaking was planned to coincide with Homecoming Weekend. Site preparation for the facility began in August, after the trustees voted in July to proceed with construction. The Physical Activities Center will replace a steel building that has been used as a temporary gymnasium since 1963. A two-year capital campaign for the PAC has yielded gifts and pledges of just under \$3 million.

Fourteen persons are slated to participate in the turning of the earth (see attached program). They will represent the North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church; the Methodist College Board of Trustees; the city of Fayetteville; Cumberland County; the students, administration, faculty and alumni of the college; and the general contractor.

Phase I of the Physical Activities Center will total 46,600 square feet and contain a 1,200-seat gymnasium, locker rooms, a training room, a conference room, a handball court, and offices for the athletic staff and coaches. Phase II--a swimming pool--will be built later as funds become available.

Completion of this facility will mark completion of all the buildings originally planned for the Methodist campus. Player, Inc. of Fayetteville is the general contractor for the PAC, which will be built on a site east of the Student Union near Cumberland Hall. Hayes, Howell, and Associates of Southern Pines, NC designed the building.

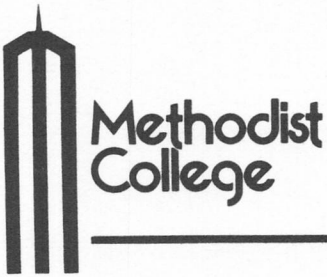

DR. SCOTT PECK WILL CONDUCT SEMINAR AT METHODIST COLLEGE

FAYETTEVILLE, NC--Dr. M. Scott Peck, M.D., a nationally recognized psychiatrist and authority on the relationship between religion and psychiatry, will conduct a one-day seminar Tuesday, Oct. 4 at Methodist College.

Designed to coincide with National Mental Illness Awareness Week, the seminar is being co-sponsored by Cumberland Hospital and Methodist College. Dr. Peck will give three lectures totalling 4 1/2 hours. The seminar begins at 9 a.m. and concludes at 3 p.m.

Perhaps best known as the author of The Road Less Traveled (1978), a book that sold over two million copies, Dr. Peck has written three other books and is in great demand as a lecturer. A graduate of Harvard College and Case Western Reserve University School of Medicine, Dr. Peck was engaged in the private practice of psychiatry in Litchfield County, CT from 1972-83. From 1963-72, he served in the U.S. Army, resigning from the position of Assistant Chief, Psychiatry, and Neurology Consultant to the Surgeon General with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel.

Dr. Peck's lecture topics at the Oct. 4 seminar are: "A Taste for Mystery," "Faith or Foolheartiness in Action: Development of a Social Action Organization," and "Togetherness and Separateness in Marriage and Families."

The costs for the seminar are: \$35 for registration, \$3 for renewal credits (CEU/RC,CME) and \$4.75 for lunch. The deadline for registration is Sept. 29.

The seminar carries renewal credit as follows: .5 CEU/RC and 1 CME (through the Duke-Fayetteville Area Health Education Center).



**M. Scott Peck, M.D.**

Dr. M. Scott Peck is a nationally recognized authority on the relationship between religion and science and on religion and psychology in particular. He speaks widely on these subjects and related topics and promotes scientific research at the interface of psychiatry and religion. He is also deeply involved in the disarmament movement and was the recipient of the 1984 Kaleidoscope Award for peacemaking given by Creative Ministry Associates of Durham, North Carolina.

Dr. Peck received his B.A. *magna cum laude* from Harvard College in 1958 and his M.D. from the Case Western Reserve University School of Medicine in 1963. From 1963 until 1972, he served in the United States Army, resigning from the position of Assistant Chief Psychiatry and Neurology Consultant to the Surgeon General of the Army with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel. He received the Meritorious Service Medal with oakleaf cluster. From 1972 to 1983, Dr. Peck was engaged in the private practice of psychiatry in Litchfield County, Connecticut.

Dr. Peck's first book, *The Road Less Traveled*, was published by Simon and Schuster in 1978 and was brought out in a quality paperback edition by Touchstone Books (a subsidiary of Simon and Schuster) in January, 1980. The book has sold two million copies to date.

*People of the Lie: The Hope for Healing Human Evil*, Dr. Peck's second book, was published in hard cover by Simon and Schuster in October of 1983 and in paperback in February, 1985. Though controversial, it has sold over 500,000 copies and is already widely recognized as a groundbreaking contribution.

*What Return Can I Make? The Dimensions of the Christian Experience* was published by Simon and Schuster in December of 1985. It contains Sister Marilyn's singing and Patricia Kay's art, as well as Dr. Peck's essays and audio commentary.

A fourth book, *The Different Drum: Community Making and Peace*, appeared in June, 1987 from Simon and Schuster.

METHODIST COLLEGE THEATRE DEPARTMENT ANNOUNCES OFFERINGS

FAYETTEVILLE, NC--The Methodist College Theatre Department and Green and Gold Masque Keys will offer three touring productions and three on-campus productions during the first semester, 1988-89.

Two Circuit Players companies will be touring November-April. A troupe directed by Scott Enerson will stage "The Passion Pantomime" Oct. 30-April 1. A troupe directed by Robin Westbrook will offer "Through the Eyes of Clowns" Nov. 6-April 8.

Circuit Players' productions are drawn from biblical literature and are designed primarily for church audiences. Last year's production, "A Funny Thing Happened On My Way Through The Bible" was completely booked before the tour opened in November. Because each company can give only 20 performances, persons interested in booking a performance should contact Bill Lowdenmilk at the college as soon as possible.

"For the Love of Shakespeare," a touring show suitable for school groups, includes excerpts from four Shakespearean plays--"A Midsummer Night's Dream," "Antony and Cleopatra," "Othello," and "Much Ado About Nothing." 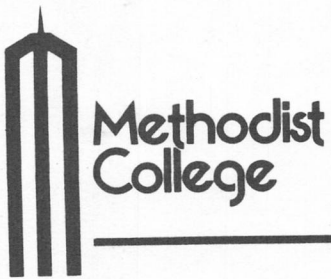
