

METHODIST COLLEGE ANNOUNCES WINTER COMMENCEMENT EXERCISES

FAYETTEVILLE, NC--Methodist College's Seventeenth Winter Commencement will be held Thursday, Dec. 14 at 2 p.m. in Reeves Auditorium.

One hundred and eleven (111) students have declared their candidacy for graduation and are expected to receive degrees from College President Elton Hendricks. The college will give two honorary degrees—a Doctor of Humanities to Charles Mercer Reeves, a Sanford businessman, and a Doctor of Divinity to Thomas Sidney Yow, III, president of Martin Methodist College in Pulaski, Tennessee.

Mr. Yow will deliver the commencement address. A 1966 graduate of Methodist, he is a United Methodist minister who held administrative positions at Methodist and Louisburg College before being named a junior college president in 1985. He holds master's and doctoral degrees from Duke University. He is a native of Rockingham, NC.

METHODIST COLLEGE TO ANNOUNCE NAME OF NEW BUILDING

FAYETTEVILLE, NC--Methodist College will name its new Physical Activities Center in a special ceremony Sunday, Dec. 17 at 3 p.m. The public is invited.

The ceremony will be held at the entrance to the new building and the person for whom the building has been named will be present for the unveiling. A reception will follow the ceremony.

Now in the final stages of construction, Methodist's Physical Activities Center totals 46,600 square feet and includes: a 1,200-seat gymnasium; locker rooms for men, women, and staff; a training room; a weight room; a conference room; two classrooms; a handball court; and offices for the athletic staff and coaches.

College officials have scheduled men's and women's basketball games for Jan.

15 in the new facility. While these events will be the first athletic contests held in the PAC, the coaching staff anticipates moving in prior to that date. Subcontractors are in the process of laying the floor in the gymnasium and installing the basketball goals.

Built at a cost of \$3.8 million, the Physical Activities Center will replace a steel building that has been used as a gym since 1963. More than 1,146 persons have pledged a total of \$3,525,736 toward the new building.

THOMAS YOW DELIVERS COMMENCEMENT ADDRESS, RECEIVES HONORARY DEGREE


FAYETTEVILLE, NC--Graduating seniors at Methodist College were called to a lifetime of truth and virtue during commencement exercises Dec. 14.

Dr. Thomas S. Yow, III, president of Martin Methodist College (a junior college) in Pulaski, Tennessee, was the commencement speaker. The Methodist College alumnus entitled his address "Veritas et Virtus"--(Truth and Virtue), using the motto of his alma mater.

Dr. Yow expressed the hope that each of the 110 winter graduates would leave Methodist with: a commitment to truth and virtue; a willingness to grow, change, and adapt; a commitment to excellence; a commitment to the faith of the Lord Jesus Christ; and a commitment to values based on concern for others.

After delivering his commencement address, Dr. Yow was awarded an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree by College President M. Elton Hendricks. He was cited for "24 years of exemplary service to the United Methodist Church, his alma mater, his family, and the cause of Christian higher education."

CANNON FOUNDATION GIVES METHODIST \$50,000 TOWARD PHYSICAL ACTIVITIES CENTER

FAYETTEVILLE, NC--The Cannon Foundation, Inc. has awarded Methodist College a \$50,000 grant toward construction of the college's Physical Activities Center.

College President Elton Hendricks received notice of the award in a Dec. 5 letter from Dan L. Gray, executive director of The Cannon Foundation.

Including the Cannon gift, the college now has pledges totalling \$3,581,651 toward the \$3.8 million facility. The college must still raise \$227,861 by March 1, 1990 to receive a \$250,000 challenge grant from the Kresge Foundation.

"The recognition and support from The Cannon Foundation is a major step for Methodist College," said President Hendricks. "It is a major development in meeting the Kresge challenge. The leadership of the Methodist College Board of Trustees in this project is now beginning to bear significant fruit."

Construction of the Physical Activities Center began in August, 1988 and the project will be completed within the next 30 days.

The Physical Activities Center will replace a steel building that has been used as a gym since 1963. The facility totals 46,600 square feet and includes: a 1,200-seat gymnasium; locker rooms for men, women and staff; a training room; a weight room; a conference room; two classrooms; a handball court; and offices for the athletic staff and coaches.

The Cannon Foundation, based in Concord, North Carolina, awards grants for religious, charitable, literary and educational purposes. It was established in 1943 by the late Charles A. Cannon, who was president of Cannon Mills Company for more than 50 years.

FAYETTEVILLE, NC--Methodist College awarded 198 degrees to 195 persons at its 17th winter commencement Dec. 14.



METHODIST COLLEGE REAFFIRMED BY SOUTHERN ASSOCIATION

FAYETTEVILLE, NC--The Southern Association of Colleges and Schools has reaffirmed the accreditation of Methodist College.

The regional accrediting agency announced Methodist's reaffirmation Dec. 11 at its annual meeting in Atlanta. The reaffirmation was the end result of a comprehensive self-study undertaken by the college two years ago. Such studies are required every 10 years of all SACS members.

A 12-member SACS committee visited Methodist last April, evaluated its 495-page self-study, and subsequently recommended reaffirmation to the SACS Commission on Colleges. The visiting committee offered a number of detailed recommendations to which the college responded in October.

Methodist's third Southern Association self-study involved all college employees, students and alumni and required thousands of man hours of work by nine committees. Dr. Garland Knott, professor of religion, chaired the steering committee for the self-study.

Dr. M. Elton Hendricks, president, and Dr. Lynn V. Sadler, vice president for academic affairs, said they were proud of the reaffirmation and grateful for the teamwork that led to it.

Three important documents produced as part of the self-study are: "A Strategic Plan for Methodist College: 1989-1994," "The Institutional Fact Book of Methodist College," and "The Educational and Unit Goals of Methodist College."






