METHODIST ENROLLS 1,280 FOR FALL SEMESTER

FAYETTEVILLE, NC--Methodist College enrolled 1,280 students for the fall semester. The college began its 31st academic year with 972 students in the day program and 308 students in the evening program.

Day enrollment fell two percent from fall 1989, while evening enrollment declined 34 percent. College officials had expected a slight decline in the day program, because the number of high school graduates has been declining nationally since 1988. The recent deployment of troops from Fort Bragg to the Middle East caused substantial losses to the evening program.

The number of students living on campus reached 495, the largest number since 1969. "Methodist has experienced its eighth consecutive year of increased residential enrollment," noted College President Elton Hendricks. "This can be attributed to continued improvement in retention and to a large freshman class."

Methodist enrolled 405 new students for the fall semester, four percent more than last year. The new students represent 29 different states and 10 foreign countries.




