METHODIST COLLEGE FINALIZING PLANS FOR NEW RESIDENCE HALL

FAYETTEVILLE, NC—The Building and Grounds Committee of the Methodist College Board of Trustees continues to study the design and plans for a new residence hall. The committee will take bids Dec. 16 and present a recomendation to the full Board of Trustees Dec. 17.

The new residence hall, which will house 56 students in suites of four students each, is designed to avoid long corridors and to offer a special quality of life for students. A fundamental purpose of the building is to enhance a sense of community.

"This building represents a bold step for us," said Dr. Elton Hendricks, college president. "It is the first step in a long-range plan to expand our residential enrollment by 300 students over the next six years. We believe we need to grow and we believe we can attract additional resident students."

Methodist's fifth residence hall will be built adjacent to and southeast of Garber Hall. LSV Partnership Architects-Planners of Fayetteville designed the building. The targeted completion date is Fall 1994, although President Hendricks noted that this may be optimistic. The design phase has required extensive work.

The long-range plan calls for the construction of four additional residence halls of similar design at the rate of one a year through 1997-98, subject to annual reviews of enrollment data. When the five new residence halls are completed, Methodist will be able to accommodate 900 resident students.

Four existing residence halls built in 1963 and 1964 have a capacity of 600 students; the college enrolled 610 resident students this fall—430 males and 180 females. The college placed 44 students in renovated faculty apartments, now known as Honors Hall.

Mike Safley, vice president for student affairs, said recently he will recommend that the new residence hall, along with Weaver Hall and Honors Hall, house females. He said he would further recommend that Cumberland, Garber, and Sanford halls house males next year. He stressed that these are only recommendations, subject to administrative approval and enrollment projections.

EDUCATOR URGES METHODIST GRADUATES 'TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE'

FAYETTEVILLE, NC—The Hoke County Schools superintendent urged 104 winter graduates of Methodist College December 17 to plan for their future by adopting a personal mission statement and setting lifelong goals.

"Take a chance and dare to make a difference," said Dr. William Harrison, a 1974 graduate of Methodist. He told the winter class that successful people learn from adversity and have a strong sense of mission.

The former public school principal and teacher advised class members to: 1) Be all you can be — work hard to develop competence, credibility, and a value system; 2) Do the right thing — do not let the desire for short-term goals jeopardize long-term goals; and 3) Do unto others as you would have them do unto you — help and support your fellow man.

NEW RESIDENCE HALL UNDER CONSTRUCTION AT METHODIST COLLEGE

FAYETTEVILLE, NC—Construction began December 23 on a new \$1.2 million residence hall at Methodist College.

Sigma Construction Co. of Fayetteville, the general contractor, has guaranteed completion by August 10, 1994. Bulldozers began clearing the site December 23.

"This new facility reflects our faith in the future," said Dr. Elton Hendricks, college president. "Our residential enrollment has grown significantly in the last few years and we expect this trend to continue."

A site plan places Methodist's fifth residence hall on the south side of Garber Hall. If enrollment growth continues as expected, an identical unit will be built in 1994-95. Both will be linked to Garber by a patio or commons area.

LSV Partnership Architects-Planners of Fayetteville designed the building. Current plans are that it will house 56 female students and a hall director; the two-story design includes 25 double rooms, six single rooms, and a two-level director's apartment. The hall includes an elevator and other features which make it accessible to the handicapped.

Completion of this building will enable the college to house approximately 700 resident students in 1994-95. The new residence hall represents the first step in Methodist's long-range plan to expand residential enrollment to 900 students by 1998. Four additional residence halls of similar design will be built during the next four years, subject to annual reviews of enrollment data.

Four existing residence halls built in 1963 and 1964 were designed to house 600 students—300 males and 300 females. Methodist began the current academic year with 610 resident students. Last summer the college renovated a campus apartment building, a 12-unit structure originally designed for married students and faculty, to house an additional 44 students.
