CRAIG STEWART TO CHAIR 1994 FUND DRIVE FOR METHODIST COLLEGE

FAYETTEVILLE, NC—Craig Stewart. vice president and general manager of Stewart Olds/Nissan/Suzuki, will chair the 1994 Community Loyalty Campaign for Methodist College.

He has served on the boards of the Methodist College Foundation, the Fayetteville Kiwanis Club, the Fayetteville Area Educational Foundation, the Fayetteville Area Chamber of Commerce, and the Olde Fayetteville Association. He also chaired the Parish Council at Saint Patrick's Church from 1988-91.

Methodist's 1993 Community Loyalty Campaign, chaired by Bob Exum, netted \$480,725—more than double the Foundation's goal of \$200,000. "Community support for Methodist grew significantly last year," noted Summer Brock, executive director of the Foundation, "and we are grateful for that."

Counting funds raised in 1993, the Methodist College Foundation has raised a total of \$6.5 million in sustaining funds for Methodist since 1957. The Foundation was formed in 1955 to bring a church-related college to Fayetteville.

While the concept grew out of a concern for small membership churches, participation was not limited to those congregations. The academy met for the first time in January, 1991. Members committed to spend ten hours together each quarter, working with the Reverend Carrie W. Parrish, director and instructor.
