FAYETTEVILLE, NC—The Kate B. Reynolds Trust of Winston-Salem has awarded Methodist College a \$59,255 grant for its new physician assistant program.

College President Elton Hendricks said the grant funds will be used to purchase medical teaching resources and to furnish a state-of-the-art electronic classroom in the College's new Allied Health Building scheduled for completion this spring.

Methodist College's physician assistant program admitted its first class in May of last year after receiving provisional accreditation in February. Methodist is the third institution of higher learning in North Carolina to offer such a program.

"The grant from the Kate Reynolds Trust will give us additional resources to train and educate quality health care professionals for southeastern North Carolina," said Ron Foster, director of the physician program. "I am excited that we will have some of the newest medical education materials on CD-ROM, as well as a video/slide projector, cameras, and monitors for use by our instructors."

Methodist College is a senior, coeducational college of liberal arts and sciences with a current enrollment of 1,700 students. Now in its 36th academic year, the College offers 44 majors. The six-semester physician program began with a class of four students; 18 additional students will be admitted this spring and will begin classes in May.
