
# KIRSTEN PUE NAMED DEVELOPMENT ASSOCIATE AT METHODIST COLLEGE

### METHODIST COLLEGE SALUTES IRVING BERLIN

**FAYETTEVILLE, NC**—The Methodist College Departments of Music and Theatre will salute one of America's greatest composers February 24-27 with an original musical revue entitled *Young Mr. Berlin.* The revue will feature 40 songs written by Irving Berlin between 1907 and 1930.

Dr. Paul Wilson, professor of theatre at Methodist, will direct the revue. Mrs. Betty Neill Parsons, associate professor of music, is the musical director. The cast includes: Jessica Baldwin, Jonathan Barber, Christian Baumgart, Shelley Bennett, Shaun Bowman, Melissa Ann Cain, Andy Dickerson, Brad Laub, Emmaline Taylor, Krystal Taylor, and Brenda Janine Vandervort. Ten of the 11 cast members are music students and nine are members of Rainbow's End, Methodist's scholarship vocal ensemble.

Young Mr. Berlin will be staged Feb. 24-26 at 8 p.m. and Feb. 27 at 2 p.m. in Reeves Auditorium. Admission is \$7 for adults, \$4 for students and senior citizens, and \$3 for children 12 and under.

Wilson decided to put together a musical revue after studying two Charles Hamm collections of Irving Berlin's early songs. "These were songs Berlin wrote for song pluggers, vaudeville singers, and parlor piano players," said Wilson. "Some were tremendous hits in their time and are still standards, like "Alexander's Ragtime Band,: "Play a Simple Melody," "I Love a Piano," and "Everybody's Doin' It."

The director said other songs: "That Mesmerizing Mendelssohn Tune," "When the

Midnight Choo-Choo Leaves for Alabam'," "Snookey Ookums," or "The Girl on the Magazine Cover" have faded a bit from the collective memory, but do reflect the popular culture of their day and Berlin's musical genius.

Irving Berlin wrote more than 900 songs, 19 musicals and the scores of 18 movies during a career that spanned eight decades. He is still remembered today for the "patriotic" songs he wrote during World Wars I and II, and the shows and films *Annie Get Your Gun, Top Hat and Easter Parade.* Some of his most famous songs include: "There's No Business Like Show Business," "This is the Army," "White Christmas," and "God Bless America."

Irving Berlin was the son a Jewish immigrant and was one of eight children. His father brought the family to America from Russia in 1893; the Berlins lived on the Lower East Side of New York City. In the early 1900s, while he was in his teens, Berlin began working as a singing waiter and writing songs. Later dubbed "Mr. Jazz," Irving Berlin died in 1989 at the age of 101.

# TOUR GUIDE FROM CHARTRES CATHEDRAL TO LECTURE AT METHODIST COLLEGE

FAYETTEVILLE, NC—Malcolm Miller, a tour guide-lecturer at Chartres Cathedral in France, will give a one-hour lecture entitled "The Medieval Stained Glass and Sculpture of Chartres Cathedral" Friday, Feb. 25 at Methodist College.

Miller will be returning to Methodist—he last spoke here in 1984—as part of the Womack Endowed Lecture Series. Each winter, he gives lecture tours about Chartres in the United States. His Methodist lecture is scheduled for 7 p.m. in Yarborough Auditorium, Clark Hall. It is free and open to the public.

Using color slides taken at Chartres, Miller will explain how the 12th and 13th century stained glass and sculpture at Chartres form a vast iconographic text, beginning with the Creation and Fall and ending with the Last Judgement. He has written three books about Chartres Cathedral; given several hundred lectures in Britain, The United States and Canada; and made six television documentaries on medieval stained glass for the BBC.

For the last 40 years, the British-born scholar has made the Gothic cathedral at the center of Chartres a religious experience for thousands of visitors. Twice a day, almost every day of the week, Miller has stood at the rear of the church and invited English-speaking visitors to accompany him on a 90-minute tour. He has also made the city of Chartres his permanent home. Many Fayettevillians and Methodist College Chorus alumni who toured France in 1997 were deeply moved by Miller's tour of the cathedral and his description of its icons.

#### CHARTRES TOUR GUIDE TO LECTURE AT METHODIST COLLEGE

A huge Gothic edifice with twin spires, Chartres was built between 1194 and 1221. It replaced a Romanesque structure that burned in 1194. While most of the stained glass windows were completed by 1221, stone masons and sculptors worked for nearly two centuries to complete the stone statues that adorn the porches and exterior doorways. Two small chapels were added in the 14th and 16th centuries.

Elaine Porter, Distinguished Professor of French, said Miller has devoted his life to exploring every surface and passageway in the cathedral. "He shows each visitor just where to stand and look in order to learn the various aspects of Christianity depicted in colored glass and stone symbols," she said. "He explains how medieval artists and craftsmen revealed the Christian faith to the masses who sought refuge and consolation within the church walls."
