

Former Ambassador to Turkmenistan To Give Inaugural Terry Sanford Lecture

FAYETTEVILLE, NC—Former U.S. Ambassador to Turkmenistan Michael W. Cotter will deliver the inaugural lecture in the Terry Sanford Lecture Series Monday, Oct. 29 at 11 a.m. in the Science Building Auditorium at Methodist College. His lecture is entitled, "Tracking Down the Terrorists: Afghanistan's Neighbors Have Their Own Axes to Grind!" The lecture is free and open to the public.

Sponsored by the College's Department of Governmental Studies, the new lecture series honors the late Terry Sanford, who was the first chairman of the Methodist College Board of Trustees. "Terry Sanford's lifetime of public service as a state senator, North Carolina governor, U.S. senator, and president of Duke University still inspires students today," said Dr. Drew Ziegler, associate professor of political science and head of the Governmental Studies Department.

Mr. Cotter was U.S. ambassador to Turkmenistan from 1995-98. Most recently, he was a senior researcher and lecturer at the Smithsonian Institution, Washington, D.C., from 1998-2001. He previously served as the senior Turkish desk officer at the U.S. Embassy in Turkey. He holds a law degree from the University of Michigan, a master's degree from Stanford University, and a B.S. in International Relations from Georgetown University.

Methodist College To Exhibit 66 Works Entered In Juried Art Competition For Senior High School Students

FAYETTEVILLE, NC—The Methodist College Art Department will announce the winners of its first Juried Art Competition for Senior High School Students Sunday afternoon, Nov. 11 at the Mallett-Roger House Gallery on the College campus. Awards will be presented to six area high school artists during the opening reception for an exhibition of 66 selected works.

The opening reception will be held from 2-4 p.m., and the public is invited. First, Second, and Third Place awards and three Honorable Mention awards will be presented at 3 p.m. In addition, all 66 artists whose works were selected by the jurors will receive certificates of recognition. Following the opening on Nov. 11, the exhibition will be open to the public from 3-5 p.m. daily at the Mallett-Rogers House Gallery.

Methodist's first Juried Art Competition drew 130 entries from 13 high schools in Cumberland, Harnett, Bladen, Robeson, Hoke, and Moore counties. Six Cumberland County high schools were represented. The jurors who selected the works to be shown and the award winners were Tom Grubb, executive director of the Fayetteville Museum of Art, and Ralph Steeds, professor of art at the University of North Carolina at Pembroke.

"We were very pleased with the response to our first juried art competition for high school students," said Silvana Foti, professor of art and head of the Methodist College Art Department. "The students submitted a wide variety of media, from two-dimensional to three-dimensional. I encourage everyone who enjoys art to join us for the opening Sunday, Nov. 11."

Juror Tom Grubb said all the works submitted for the competition were "of very good quality" and he considers all the participants to be winners. "Often young artists have limited opportunities to exhibit their work, " he said. "Through this competition young artists also are exposed to the process of formalizing their work to be judged by knowledgeable jurors.
