METHODIST COLLEGE PRESENTS 'GODSPELL' FEBRUARY 21-23

FAYETTEVILLE, NC—The Theatre and Music Departments at Methodist College will present the musical *Godspell* Feb. 21-23 at 8 p.m. and Feb. 24 at 2 p.m. in Reeves Auditorium.

Godspell is a modern re-telling of St. Matthew focused on Jesus' parables and storytelling. The show utilizes clowning, pantomime, charades, and vaudeville to tell the story of Christ and the joy he imparted through his teachings. The show was originally conceived by John-Michael Tebelak for his master's thesis production at Carnegie-Mellon University. Stephen Schwarz wrote the musical score. He also scored *Pippin, The Magic Show, Children of Eden, Working, Pocahontas,* and *Prince of Egypt.*

Dr. Evan Bridenstine, assistant professor of theatre, is directing the show, with musical direction by Mrs. Betty Neill Parsons, associate professor of music.

"For this production, we're departing from the standard 'Christ as clown' interpretation," said Dr. Bridenstine. "This is more about how people use religion and how foolish that use can become. We've chosen the nature of Mardi Gras as a sort of lynch pin: a big party with bright colors, yes, but with a deeper meaning that often goes overlooked. We've created a style that reflects the manner of the parables—teaching in a way that both reveals and conceals the truth. You'll see a parable enacted in a humorous way near the front of the stage, but at the same time you'll see actors behind a scrim curtain enacting the same parable in a more symbolic style."

"This show is a lot of fun," said Mrs. Parsons. "It's a 2002 take on a 1971 show. We

have a talented cast, and rehearsals are going very well."

Jesus will be played by Christian Baumgart, a Methodist College senior who played the lead in *Bye Bye Birdie* last year and appeared the season before in *Young Mr. Berlin.* Bryan K. Reed will play John the Baptist, and Andrew Dailey, who played in last fall's *Just So Stories*, will be Judas. The large ensemble cast includes a mixture of Methodist College stage veterans, as well as MC and Cape Fear Regional Theatre alumni. These include: Melissa Anne Cain, Chuck Heaton, Andy Dickerson, David Morton, Kinsey Stuart, and Emmaline Taylor.

ECONOMICS PROFESSOR TO PRESENT PAPER ADVOCATING "VOLUNTARY SIMPLICITY"

FAYETTEVILLE, NC—Dr. Spencer G. Davis, assistant professor of financial economics, will present a paper entitled "An Economist's Argument for Voluntary Simplicity" Thursday, March 7 at the College's sixth annual B. F. Stone Endowed Lyceum.

The lyceum is slated for 7 p.m. in Yarborough Auditorium, Clark Hall. Admission is free and the public is invited. A reception will follow in Clark Hall.

Dr. Davis said "voluntary simplicity" describes a growing trend among Americans to consume less and work fewer hours. "I support this lifestyle," said Dr. Davis, "because it allows more time for 'life's intangibles': family activities, volunteer work, reading, and spiritual contemplation. About a year ago, the government released a study which showed that Americans work more hours per year than the workers of any other nation."

The lecturer said he has been active in the voluntary simplicity movement for about four years. "This movement is tied closely to environmental and conservation groups," he noted, "and I'm definitely a tree hugger." After Dr. Davis' presentation, two other faculty members—Dr. Jeff Zimmerman, professor of economics and finance, and Dr. Rebecca W. Wendelken, assistant professor of history, will respond to the paper.

The B. F. Stone Endowed Lyceum honors the late B. F. Stone of Elizabethtown, NC. A pharmacist and an active United Methodist, Mr. Stone made a large bequest to Methodist, portions of which have been used to create a scholarship and to endow this event. Faculty members selected to give papers at the lyceum are expected to focus on interdisciplinary subjects. Presenters receive an honorarium from B. F. Stone funds.

FAYETTEVILLE, NC—Curtis W. Stephens III, a senior art major at Methodist College, will present "Crossroads", his senior art exhibition, March 18-April 14 in the Mallett-Rogers House at the College. An opening reception is slated for Monday, March 18 from 7-9 p.m.

Stephens' art works deal primarily with Christian subjects and his own spiritual experiences; he is a United Methodist and a member of Salem United Methodist Church in Goldsboro, N.C. He took the theme of his show from Jeremiah 6:16, which reads: "This is what the Lord says: 'Stand at the crossroads and look; ask where the good way is, and walk in it, and you will find rest for your souls."

His exhibition includes about 20 pieces: drawings, prints, pen and ink sketches, and a unique altar piece. "Curtis is very sensitive to his subject matter," said Silvana Foti, professor of art at Methodist. "His work has a remarkable 'cleanness' to it."

Stephens said he became "a serious artist" while attending Charles B. Aycock High School in Goldsboro where he also played baseball. A pitcher for the Monarch baseball team, he started the Methodist College chapter of Athletes in Action during his sophomore year at Methodist. Two years ago he was part of a U.S. baseball team assembled by Athletes in Action which played national teams in Nicaragua and Mexico; team members witnessed for Christ following each game.

"I'd like to go into graphic design or advertising," said Stephens. and I'd like to be known as a Christian artist. I think there's a growing market for Christian art and churches are becoming more visually-oriented." Stephens' work can be seen at his Web site—http://christianart.topcities.com.

DR. RONALD NUMBERS, WISCONSIN HISTORY PROFESSOR, TO DELIVER 3RD ANNUAL TEMPLETON LECTURE AT METHODIST COLLEGE



Numbers, chair of the Department of the History of Medicine at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, will deliver the third annual John Templeton Endowed Lecture in Science and Religion Monday, April 22 at Methodist College. He will speak at 11 a.m. in Yarborough Auditorium, Clark Hall. The event is free and open to the public.

Numbers will speak on the topic "Creation and Evolution in America: From Natural Selection to Intelligent Design." A native of Boulder, Colorado, Ronald Numbers has written or edited more than two dozen books, including, most recently, *Darwinism Comes to America* (Harvard University Press, 1998), and *Disseminating Darwinism: The Role of Place, Race, Religion, and Gender* (Cambridge University Press, 1999), co-edited with John Stenhouse.

From 1989-1993, Professor Numbers edited *Isis*, the flagship journal of the history of science, and is co-editing, with David Lindberg, the eight-volume Cambridge History of Science. He is a past president of both the History of Science Society and the American Society of Church History. He holds a B.A. degree from Southern Missionary College, a M.A. from Florida State University, and a Ph.D. from the University of California at Berkeley.

Methodist's Templeton lectures honor Sir John Templeton, a renowned international investment manager. A native of Tennessee who now resides in the Bahamas, Templeton was educated at Yale University and was a Rhodes Scholar. He holds many honorary doctorates and is the author of several books, including *The Humble Approach* and *Laws of Life*.

Four years ago, Methodist College received a grant from the Templeton Foundation to establish a course entitled, "Religion in an Age of Science: Supplemental Spiritual Information." Dr. Lloyd Bailey, a retired religion professor and former faculty member at Duke Divinity School, developed and teaches the course.

SILVANA FOTI HONORED AT METHODIST COLLEGE

FAYETTEVILLE, NC—Silvana Foti, professor of art and head of the Art Department at Methodist College, received the Professor of the Year Award during the College's annual Awards Day ceremony April 1, 2002. She previously won the award in 1998.

A committee of faculty and students selected Foti for her teaching excellence, promotion of learning beyond the classroom, professionalism, and continuing professional growth.

College President M. Elton Hendricks presented her with a plaque and a \$500 cash award.

"It is amazing to watch the drive and motivation levels rise to meet her high standards," said one of the two students who nominated her. In the last year, Ms. Foti and her art students conducted a paper sculpture workshop for local preschoolers and staged the College's first annual Juried Art Competition for Senior High School Students. Her students also exhibited their works at the Fayetteville Museum of Art and at the Cape Fear Regional Theatre.

Dr. Sue Snyder, director of the College's Fine Arts Division, describes Foti as "a dedicated and devoted teacher and colleague whose primary goal is the good of the students and the improvement of the Fine Arts Division." Silvana Foti joined the Methodist College faculty in 1980. A native of Youngstown, Ohio, she is an honors graduate of St. Mary's College in Indiana, earned an M.F.A. from the University of Notre Dame, and completed advanced studies in art education at Youngstown State University and Meredith College.

In her 22 years of teaching, Foti says she has sought to "push students to their true abilities and promote artistic growth and development beyond the norm." Of her art, she says her goal has been to express "harmony through equivalence of relationships of lines, colours, and planes, but only in the clearest and strongest way."

An accomplished printmaker, Foti has exhibited and judged works throughout North Carolina and in other states; studied non-toxic printmaking in Canada; and studied art and architecture in England, Italy, and France. Her next solo exhibition is slated for May 19-June 15 at the Somerhill Gallery in Chapel Hill.

"She did arts and crafts with me as a child," she recalls. "When I was in kindergarten, one of my crayon drawings was used on the program cover for a school music concert. I took six art classes in high school and developed a love for silk screening and batiquing."

After graduating from Methodist, Wisniewski plans to move back to Cleveland and marry her fiancé, a golf professional at Sand Ridge Country Club in Chardon, Ohio. Her career goals include teaching private art lessons and/or working in an art gallery and pursuing a master's degree in art.

METHODIST COLLEGE TRUSTEES TO ANNOUNCE MAJOR FUND DRIVE MAY 2

FAYETTEVILLE, NC—The Methodist College Board of Trustees has scheduled a press conference for Thursday, May 2 at 10 a.m. to announce a new three-year fund drive for the College. The announcement will be made in the auditorium of Clark Hall to invited guests.

Trustees Ramon L. Yarborough and Richard R. Allen, Sr., co-chairs of the campaign, will reveal an overall goal, the amount raised to date during the "silent phase" of the campaign, and how campaign funds will be used. The co-chairs will also unveil architectural sketches of two proposed buildings.

Methodist College President M. Elton Hendricks will explain how the campaign originated, and two current students will discuss the College's capital needs. Campaign literature and an official press release will be distributed by the Development Office.

The newest campaign will be the third conducted during Dr. Hendricks' 19 years as president of Methodist College. The only major fund drive prior to that occurred in 1956-60, when the Fayetteville community and the North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church each raised \$2 million to start construction of their new college. From 1986-90, the "Come of Age" campaign raised \$3.5 million to build a new physical activities center. From 1994-98, the "Expanding the Vision" campaign netted \$8.5 million; those funds were used to build an addition to Davis Memorial Library and a classroom building for the Reeves School of Business, and also to build the College endowment.

METHODIST COLLEGE TO RAISE \$11 MILLION

FAYETTEVILLE, NC—The Board of Trustees of Methodist College announced today the beginning of a comprehensive campaign to generate \$11 million. Themed "Seeds On Good Soil, A New Season," the campaign will enable Methodist College to further its growth by investing in both its physical and financial resources.

"Methodist College has enjoyed incredible support from the community and our growing number of alumni," said Dr. M. Elton Hendricks, president of the College. "In return, we have worked hard to develop a College and programs worthy of this community and that support. In that same spirit, we have very specific goals for this \$11 million — goals that will be a benefit to our students, to our College, and to this community."

According to Board of Trustees members and campaign co-chairs, Ramon L. Yarborough and Richard R. Allen, Sr., the \$11 million will be invested in strengthening the College's annual fund (\$1.5 million), building the College's endowment (\$1 million), funding a state-of-the-art addition to the Science Building (\$5 million), and creating a fitness center and intramural field house (\$3.5 million). "Each of these investments was identified in the strategic plan for the College, which was adopted by the board in 1999," says Allen.

"Building both our endowment and our annual fund will make Methodist College less tuitiondependent and allow us to further develop our programming and our student body," adds Yarborough.

"The Science Building addition and the fitness center are greatly needed to keep up with the caliber of students we are now attracting and our advancing curricula."

The "Seeds On Good Soil" campaign will occur over a three-year period. The silent phase of the campaign began 18 months ago, with solicitation of the College trustees. 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A Brief History of Methodist College

In 1955, a group of Fayetteville citizens joined together to bring a private college to the city. They formed the Fayetteville College Foundation and began to secure pledges of land and money toward their goal.

In March of 1956, foundation leaders met with and invited the North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church to establish a four-year, coeducational college in Fayetteville. The foundation pledged 600 acres of land, \$2 million for capital projects and \$50,000 annually for sustaining funds. The Methodist Church pledged \$2 million for capital construction and annual sustaining funds of \$180,000. By July, the first Board of Trustees of Methodist College was formed and Fayetteville lawyer Terry Sanford, a future governor of North Carolina and U.S. senator, was elected chairperson. Methodist College was chartered in November of that year.

Methodist College opened its doors in the fall of 1960, serving 88 students with 12 faculty members and four buildings on campus.

Today, Methodist College remains a four-year, coeducational institution related by faith to the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, The United Methodist Church. The College serves more than 2,000 students and employs more than 400 faculty and staff. Fifty-two majors and eight degrees—one master's, five baccalaureate, and two associate—are offered. The campus has grown to include 29 buildings.

More than 8,000 people now call Methodist College their alma mater. Two thousand of them have chosen to remain in and lend their talents to the Fayetteville area. Because of the alumni who live in Fayetteville and because the College was created and sustained by the efforts of the people of Fayetteville, Methodist College is closely intertwined with the community. The College strives to be a premier resource for intellectual discourse, cultural events, and intercollegiate athletics for the area.

KIRK, EDWARDS URGE THE CLASS OF 2002 TO PUT VALUES INTO ACTION

FAYETTEVILLE, NC—Addressing the Class of 2002 at Methodist College's 39th spring commencement exercises May 11, a business leader and a religious leader extolled the traditional "family values" of character and compassion for others.

Reflecting on things he had learned in his 57 years, Phillip J. Kirk Jr., chairman of the State Board of Education and president of N.C. Citizens for Business and Industry, urged members of the Class of 2002 to, "Live so that when your family and friends think of fairness, caring and integrity, they think of you."

Citing a book by the late Adlai Stevenson, *If I Knew Then What I Know Now*, Kirk said he agreed with the author that the knowledge gleaned from people, places, actions, faith and "things you cannot see" is much more important than "the knowledge of formula, forms or words." Kirk said he had learned that "after God, one's family is the most important thing." He advised members of the graduating class to spend more time learning from and listening to their families, to relax more, to schedule time for themselves, and to do what is right.

Kirk said America needs leaders who trust God, do what is morally right, and are willing to make tough decisions without regard to "popularity polls." He said good leadership skills can be learned at any age. He said effective leaders: develop goals and a vision, inspire trust and confidence, have a sense of humor, are resilient, and "know that life has a lot of chapters."

The former state legislator and Cabinet official concluded his speech by urging class members to have a positive but realistic outlook on life, pick their battles, establish flexible

goals, reach out to those in need, stand up for their beliefs, and take part in community affairs.

In his baccalaureate sermon, Bishop Marion M. Edwards, resident bishop of the North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church, told the graduating seniors the most important thing they would take from Methodist College would be their character. He said his mother had taught him and his brother that character was "the one thing the world can never take from you." She defined character, he recalled, as "what you do when you think no one else is watching."

Saying "Your character will define your future," Bishop Edwards asked the seniors sitting before him, "Are you living well and loving much? Are you nurturing and growing your character? Crises and hard times will reveal your true character, which consists of the capacity to give, to create, to be proactive. Character is a development of the human soul."

Bishop Edwards based his sermon on Psalm 1, which he paraphrased as: "If you delight in the law of the Lord, you will grow in character and be like a tree planted by the rivers of water, a tree which will blossom in its season and bear fruit." He concluded by saying, "My hope and prayer is that as you graduate that you will remain childlike—learning, full of eager imagination, searching for truth—but that you will never become childish or immature. The one thing that will carry you will be your character."

- —Army ROTC candidates Karl E. Gregory and Anthony R. Hanson took the Oath of Allegiance and were commissioned second lieutenants.
- —College President M. Elton Hendricks received the flag of Bosnia-Herzegovina from Milan Savic and the flag of Norway from Arild Visth.
- —President Hendricks presented the L. Stacy Weaver Award to Carole Blanc, denoting her selection by the faculty as the senior who best exemplified academic excellence, spiritual development, leadership and service.
 - —Dr. Hendricks presented a Methodist College Medallion to Thomas F. Miriello, a 1970

graduate of Methodist, in recognition of his 31 years of outstanding service in North Carolina as a mental health clinician and program manager.

- President Hendricks awarded an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree to Bishop Marion M. Edwards for 42 years of exemplary service to the United Methodist Church, his diligent and inspired leadership of the North Carolina Conference, and his strong support of United Methodist institutions of higher learning.
- Among the 183 spring graduates, 46 graduated with honors, eight *summa cum* laude, 10 magna cum laude, and 26 cum laude.



Methodist College Expecting 2,000 Students This Fall

FAYETTEVILLE, NC—Methodist College officials expect approximately 2,000 students to enroll for the Fall 2002 semester which starts next week.

Methodist begins its 43rd academic year August 12 when evening and online courses get under way. Regular day classes start Tuesday, August 20. A total of 1,496 students were registered for the day program as of Aug. 8; in Fall 2001, the College enrolled 1,429 day students. Another 500-600 students are expected for the evening program.

New resident students arrive Saturday, August 17, and returning resident students arrive Sunday, August 18. Members of the Monarch football team return to campus Sunday, Aug. 11, followed by the soccer, volleyball, and cross country teams Aug. 14. College employees will gather for their third annual Family Day Picnic on campus Saturday, Aug. 10.

As of Aug. 2, a record 864 students have been assigned living space on campus. Because Cape Fear Commons II, the new apartment-style residence hall now under construction, will not be ready for occupancy until mid-September, approximately 40 students will be living three to a room on a short-term basis. When Cape Fear Commons II opens, the College will have a total residential capacity of 869.

In addition to Cape Fear Commons II, students and staff will encounter a totally renovated cafeteria in the Berns Student Center. Sodexho, Inc., which operates the cafeteria, paid for most of the renovation; College maintenance workers assisted with wiring, plumbing, and carpentry. College maintenance workers recently expanded the irrigation system to green spaces north and east of Horner Administration Building and finished renovations to a third floor bathroom in Cumberland Hall.

Talley's Folly was winner of both the 1980 Pulitzer Prize and the New York Drama Critics

deals with the courtship of the not-quite-young-anymore Sally Talley and her middle-aged

Matt refuses to accept Sally's rebuffs and her fears that her family would never approve of their marriage.

Charming, easygoing, but indomitable, he gradually wears down her defenses, telling her his innermost secrets, and, in return, learning hers as well. Gradually, he awakens Sally to the

the possibilities of a life together until, in the final, touching moments of the play, it is clear that they are two kindred spirits who have truly found each other-two "lame ducks" who, in their union, will find a wholeness rare in human relationships.

The Methodist College production of *Talley's Folly* will feature member Paul F. Wilson as Matt and distinguished almuna Pam Thibodeaux as Sally. Both actors have appeared in many productions of *Footloose* and *Twelfth Night*, and Ms. Thibodeaux also appeared in *Twelfth Night* before joining a new local improvisational comedy group and performing in their staging of *The Complete Works of William Shakespeare (Abridged)*. For Methodist College, she appeared in *The Glass Menagerie* and *Knight of the Burning Pestle*, among others.

METHODIST COLLEGE ENROLLS 1,953 STUDENTS

FAYETTEVILLE, NC—Methodist College began its 43rd academic year by enrolling 1,953* students. The number of freshmen and the number of students living on campus were the highest in the history of the College.

As of September 4, Drop/Add Day, fall day enrollment stood at 1,438, up 1 percent over a Fall 2001 figure of 1,429. Evening/weekend enrollment totaled 559, down 9 percent from last fall's 612.

Methodist enrolled 593 new day students—390 freshmen plus 203 transfers and readmits. The number of returning day students numbered 847, an increase of 30 over last fall's 817.

"This was our largest freshman class to date," said Rick Lowe, vice president for enrollment services. "We are most pleased with the academic quality and the fact that 29 percent of our freshmen received academic scholarships."

A record 819 students are living on campus, 35 more than last fall and 21 students over the current capacity for the College's eight residence halls. Some initial overcrowding will be eliminated during the next three weeks when 71 students move into Cape Fear Commons II, a new apartment-style residential hall which is nearing completion.

College officials expect another 100-200 students to enroll in Term II of Evening/Weekend College, which begins October 14. In Fall 2001, after enrollment in both evening/weekend terms was tabulated, Methodist enrolled 2,143 students.



METHODIST COLLEGE ADDRESSES HAZING INCIDENT

FAYETTEVILLE, NC—Amidst allegations of hazing, one Methodist College student has been suspended, effective immediately, for the remainder of the academic year. Suspension, as defined in our student handbook, results in the student being separated from the college both academically and socially. The student is not allowed to complete his ongoing academic studies and is placed on a "withdrawn failing" status for all classes. The student is not allowed to return to campus without the written approval of the dean of students and also forfeits all tuition and other fees that have been paid.

Three other students have received all of the following sanctions: they have been placed on disciplinary probation status, prohibited from all future participation in Methodist College athletics, been assessed a substantial monetary fine, required to perform community service, required to formally apologize to the victim, and must enroll in a formal counseling program. One student whose involvement was deemed less serious, received all of the above sanctions, except for the substantial monetary fine. Due to the introduction of new evidence, the cases of two students have been re-opened and continue.

Dean of Students George Blanc has conducted a lengthy and thorough investigation into all allegations. The students involved have been notified of the disciplinary actions. In addition, an appropriate communication regarding this incident has been made to the football coaching staff.

The incident occurred on Monday, November 11, 2002 in the football team's locker room after practice. The victim did sustain minor physical injuries but was examined at a local hospital and released.

"This entire situation has been both sobering and disturbing," said college president, Dr. M. Elton Hendricks. "I'd like to express my deepest concern for the victim and any other students who felt endangered or bullied. Methodist College deplores any activity which causes anyone to feel unsafe."

Campus officials said they believe the situation began as horseplay but then escalated. "This incident is completely out of character with the mission and beliefs of Methodist College. What resulted should not occur in civilized society, and certainly not in an academic community," Hendricks said. "There is no justification for what occurred; it was unacceptable."

Each year, the director of athletics and coaching staff present the college's policy and the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) rules regarding hazing to all student athletes. "This incident has made us acutely aware that our presentation and enforcement of the college's policies regarding inappropriate behavior and hazing need to be reexamined," Hendricks stated.

The review process is currently underway. Changes to the policies will take effect in the spring 2003 semester which begins on January 14, 2003.

"There is a dual tragedy here – first and foremost, the violation of the victim, and then the fact that the other students involved, in the latter part of their college careers, have brought pain to the victim and to the entire College community," Hendricks said. "They have embarrassed themselves, their families and Methodist College. I am extremely disappointed in these young men, many of whom have been good campus citizens throughout their time here.

"Again, I wish to convey to the victim and his family my sympathy and concern. I would also like to express my deep appreciation to the many friends of Methodist College who have communicated their support and concern for our students and the College during this incident," he continued. "In our 40-year history, we have never had to deal with a situation like this. I hope we never do again."

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
